BUDGET SEASON IS UNDERWAY

A Message from Superintendent Tony Gasper

Some of the most important work that any school superintendent can do is to prepare a budget proposal for the local Board of Education to consider and then to support the Board as they deliberate what they will request from the City's elected officials.

We are now in the heart of our budget season. After hearing my presentation and recommendations, the New Britain Board of Education submitted a request to the City of New Britain for an increase of 8.33%. While this number may seem large at first look, it is important to remember that CSDNB has not received any additional increase in local funds since the 2016-2017 school year. Since that budget increase, we've seen cumulative inflation costs rise by 23%. Just like in any household, this means we've seen a 23% decrease in buying power with those dollars.

The school district has used state and federal grants to make up the difference during these budget years. Similarly, even though we are requesting a budget increase, we are also reducing a large number of staff that were hired under the temporary ESSER federal recovery funds.

The budget proposal is the result of hundreds of hours of work by dedicated professionals at the school and district levels. More than 200 educators had a voice in the process for the first time in recent district history.

Our team feels confident this budget best represents the needs of the children and educators of New Britain, and look forward to our discussions with the New Britain City government.

THE HIT FACTORY HITS BIG!

PULASKI AFTERSCHOOL PROGRAM GAINS TRACTION ON SOCIAL MEDIA

Marquan Shumpert-Reid is a Behavior Support Assistant at Pulaski Middle School who happens to also be a talented music producer. The Beat Coach found a new way to share his passion with others when he started 'The Hit Factory,' an after-school program, last year with Mr. Erik Flores, Pulaski Family School Liaison.

"One thing led to another, and social media kind of gave us a chance to grow this to be bigger. I'm seeing, at least for me and my job, then with the kids, I've seen more of a passion," said Shumpert. "This is more of an incentive to give to the kids to do the right thing, to maintain grades, to maintain attendance, and everything else. If an afterschool program is that type of incentive to keep these kids in line and get them to do what they gotta do then, I'm all for that."

The program has become a place where the talents of both Shumpert and Flores, particularly in music and supporting children, have been able to truly shine and people are taking notice. Shumpert, or @chillshump on Tik Tok and Instagram, has built up a following of nearly 160,000 people across social media platforms. His most viral video, "Teaching My Students How to Make a Sturdy Beat" currently has over 6.1 million views on Tik Tok. Students appearing in the photographs and videos handed in permission slips with parent or legal guardian approval to be featured.

"My mom sent me a video of it, and I was surprised at how many views and likes there were. I thought that's cool," said a student in the program, Jeremah . "I thought people were going to start following me around a lot."

The purpose of "The Hit Factory" is to create a mentoring service for students who want to learn how to use the FL Studio and iMovie programs and to encourage them to make good decisions toward a positive future. The main objectives are to instill and develop leadership skills and responsibility, create a contribution to the community

through service, learn life skills, enjoy fellowship, and develop self-confidence. The Hit Factory aims to create a culture of competence and belonging to build positive relationships and positively impact school attendance, behavior, and engagement.

"Knowing that you can make money off this, but you don't have to," said Jeremah when asked what he found to be the most rewarding part of the program. "You can use it as a hobby but if you want to or you can use it as a side hustle."

"The most rewarding part of the program is when everything comes together and the reaction the student gives," said Flores. "It's almost like they can't believe they did that themselves."



Shumpert has produced music for over 15 years, making beats and instrumentals for Lil Wayne, Joyner Lucas, French Montana, Snowprah, and many more elite artists with Recording Industry Association of America (RIAA) plaques to show for it. Flores has done videography production for rappers, sports teams, clothing companies, attorneys, and more.

Student of Chamberlain Elementary School Oversees School's Renovation Project

(70 Years Later)

aul Salina, City of New Britain Director of City/School Relations and Business, is no stranger to Chamberlain Elementary School. Salina started kindergarten at Chamberlain in 1953, just a year after the school was initially opened. Today, he is a part of the team overseeing the renovation 70 years later.

Salina graduated from New Britain High School in 1966 before kicking off his own teaching career in New Britain in 1970. By 2003, Salina was ready to retire from his role as Principal of New Britain High School. In 2011, Salina came out of retirement for a 'one-year' stint as Interim Superintendent. He stayed on as Assistant Superintendent and Chief Operations Officer for CSDNB until

2018. Since then, Salina has worked for the City of New Britain, representing Mayor Erin Stewart's office on multiple school construction and renovation projects and as a liaison to the Superintendent. In January, he led several CSDNB staff members on a tour around the construction site with Newfield Construction Senior Project Manager Matt Glaser.

"I have always had a special place for Chamberlain in my heart as my first school experience as a student," said Salina. "To have been a student at Chamberlain in the second year of its opening on Newington Avenue and then to be involved in the total renovation of the building 70 years later has been a great experience. At the flag raising of the last piece of steel that went into place at the new Chamberlain, I was proud to sign the steel beam."

The renovation project at Chamberlain Elementary School broke ground In the summer of 2021 after New Britain benefited from a state package that ensured funding reimbursement for 95% of the project through the state's school construction grant program.


When the project is complete, Chamberlain will be equipped to best support students with hearing impairments throughout the district, with classrooms specifically designed and equipped to support student needs and an audiometric testing booth allowing staff to administer hearing tests on-site. From the classrooms to the playground, the team focused on the smallest details. Even the playground equipment was specifically chosen to ensure the materials used wouldn't interfere with assistive listening devices.

"In our new building, Chamberlain will be the school where all students with hearing impairments from the district will attend. The new building has acoustic squares. They will absorb reverberation for our students with hearing loss," said Chamberlain Principal, Manuel Zaldivar. "However, the most wonderful part of this is how the entire school community will benefit from a more comfortable experience in the cafe, auditorium, and gymnasium."

A major goal of the project was to improve accessibility and ease traffic congestion around the school. The new design includes separate entrances and drop-off areas for bus and family traffic.

"In all of our school renovations are looking at the current needs of our population," said Salina. "When our schools were built, almost everyone was walking to school. School buses didn't start until around 1972 in New Britain. As we've added busses and parents driving, traffic has really become a concern. All of our school projects solve some of these issues by moving the school bus traffic away from parent traffic."

Salina noted many new construction schools lump auditoriums, gymnasiums, and cafeterias together into one all-purpose room. That isn't the case for Chamberlain. The new building has two classrooms for instruction in music, conventional classrooms, an auditorium, a cafeteria, a media center, and a gymnasium.

The Chamberlain Elementary School renovation is expected to finish in the next couple of months, with students and staff eager to start the 2023-2024 school year in their new home.

"To the Chamberlain School community, the new building means an opportunity to have a welcoming, modern and safe place for learning," said Zaldivar. "We are looking forward to making this building the pride of our community by making a place where learning, love, and engagement are a priority."



Religious freedom is a right.


We each have our own path to take.

A district team is attending a professional learning series on the teaching of reading in grades K-3 sponsored by the Connecticut Association of Public School Superintendents (CAPSS) and the Connecticut State Department of Education (CSDE). The class is a combination of in-person and online learning with 12 other districts in CT. New Britain also receives specialized coaching from the course to review how we are building the systems that contribute to improved outcomes for students, including professional development, materials, schedules, and ongoing collaboration among teachers on the seven elements of reading.

Gaffney, Pulaski, and NBHS are piloting a new First Report of Injury/Illness process to reduce the time between when an incident occurs and the reporting of the claim. Kudos to Nick Lagana for initiating this pilot process, and thanks to participating schools.

Did you know February is Children's Dental Health Month? Kudos to Nebbie Sanchez, Family School Liaison at Smalley, who was recently selected as an Oral Health Hero of the Connecticut Dental Health Partnership. Ms. Sanchez will be receiving an award for her work advocating for oral health education and exemplary service to children. Ms. Sanchez has used her role at the Smalley Family Resource Center to support families with young children participating in Play and Learn sessions and emphasize the importance of visiting the dentist at an early age.

Kudos to Mayra Rodriguez, Manager of Partnership Programs, for being honored by New Britain's Local Prevention Council for her important role in the success of ensuring that our students took last year's Youth Voices Count survey. 72% of our youth responded to the survey making it the most successful survey of this type the most successful we have ever done.

Have You Heard About the Local Prevention Council?

The mission of the Local Prevention Council is to engage community partners through collaboration while leveraging resources that educate and empower youth to be responsible by living a positive and substance-free life. In December 2020, we were granted a multi-year grant welcoming us into an even larger community with the Drug-Free Communities award from the feds. Youth Voice is the center of strategic decision-making when it comes to what works best for our youth."





A Focus on Math

Math walkthroughs have been scheduled and are occurring in all elementary schools to support teachers' implementation of the Illustrative Math curriculum. Teachers are focused on developing their Math block to include student-centered learning to build a deeper understanding of Math concepts and curriculum implementation. Students are spending more time grappling with important concepts, what we call productive struggle, in order to build their understanding of Math and Numeracy rather than have them lean on memorization.

Dos En Uno Students Gain Momentum!

Early data for DiLoreto's Dual Language program classrooms, Dos En Uno, is showing great progress on the district's assessment of English reading. Although classes are currently instructed 100% of the time on the reading of Spanish, the skills they are learning are to transfer to English reading.

Srs. Galeano's class started in the fall, with 61% of students scoring in the lowest levels for reading, meaning they were two years behind in reading. In the winter test, nearly 40% of the same students showed significant progress, scoring in the mid-level band on the test, indicating one year or less behind in reading.

Sra Minano's class had similar growth. In the fall. 53% of her students were in the lowest levels for reading, but now NO students scored in that lowest level. Her class also grew from 5% of students reading at or above grade level to 10% of students reading at or above grade level, despite receiving no formal instruction in English. As these students enter the next grade up, they will continue to receive more English and Spanish instruction until there is a balance between the languages. It's great to have this early data show us that instruction and outcomes are headed in the right direction.

This speaks to the hard work and dedication of these teachers, but also speaks to the structure, data, and support embedded in the American Reading Company program, which the district is recommending for the entire district.

Career Technical Education students use learning to build model houses

Middle and High School students in Career Technical Education (CTE) classes participate in culminating projects that vertically align skills from middle school to high school.

Students in the woodworking and construction courses recently demonstrated academic skills and competencies through a "Model House Project." Teachers began by building a conceptual understanding before students applied mathematical skills in measuring, designing, and building. Students in middle school created a two-story house with spiral stairs. High School students began their project by designing blueprints and creating floor plans that incorporate utilities, elevation, and building to scale.

CSDNB Middle Schools Roll Out Student Success Plans

Student Success Plans are rolling out in middle schools across the district. The district will implement six suggested lessons per grade level to assist students in creating their individualized plan, as mandated through Public Act 11-135. Each student in grades 6-12 will have an opportunity to work on their individualized student-centered plan to identify strengths and areas of improvement to successfully identify and implement a plan for adulthood. Completing these lessons and activities will lay the groundwork for students to complete the senior project graduation requirement. Topics include collaboration, critical thinking, goal-setting, and self-advocacy.

This unit will focus on unplugged as well as digital learning for students.


Curl up and Read at Smith Elementary


