Lodi has Highest District School Accountability Score in History

On November 19, 2024, the State of Wisconsin released the 2024 state accountability report cards for schools across the state of Wisconsin. All five schools in the school district of Lodi fell into the "Exceeds Expectation" category. The district also had their highest score in the history of the district on the state accountability system in 2024, surpassing the 2023 rating which was the previous highest ranking. It should be understood that these ratings are a point in time reflection of our schools and district and don't reflect the full picture of what happens in the district on a day to day basis. That being said, it makes sense to take a moment and congratulate our students, staff, and families for their hard work and partnership which makes these scores possible. These results would not be possible without the community supporting our educational programs through that passage of the latest operating referendum.

Board/Community Engagement Session

The School District of Lodi's Board of Education held an informative and stimulating community engagement session on November 6, 2024, to discuss the work that has been done in the district with the funds that were approved in the 2022 operating referendum. The session, held at Lodi High School, was an opportunity for board members to engage in conversation with community members about issues that matter most to them. The Board held a community engagement session in December of 2023 as well.

The event showcased the board's commitment to openness and community involvement in shaping the future of education within the district. Attendees started the evening with an informal meet and greet with school board members and school administrators. Participants were then provided with a comprehensive overview of the 2022 operating referendum that was supported by the community. The presentation portion of the meeting started with board members sharing information about why the School District of Lodi needs referendum funding. Information was shared on the state school funding formula which was initially intended to fund schools with revenue limits while also being indexed to inflation. Board members were able to show information from the Wisconsin Association of School Business Officials indicating that when the state disconnected the state school funding formula's connection to inflation it had a significant negative effect on school funding in Lodi and across the state.

Board members then highlighted how the funds approved by the community in the 2022 referendum have been used to maintain programming, stabilize class sizes, and support staff. They discussed how this work has been in alignment with priorities set forth in the

strategic plan that was developed by the community in 2021. In addition, the board was able to share some of the maintenance and technology upgrades that have occurred since the passing of the referendum, including updated wifi and student/staff devices, the upgraded track, and the new roof on the Lodi Elementary School/OSC building. Board members also shared several upcoming referendum projects that are scheduled including a new roof for Lodi High School. The board closed the presentation by showing the progress that the district has made in several areas since the passage of the referendum, specifically in communication and in academics. The academic progress was highlighted by sharing the 2023 state school accountability report cards in which every school within the district was rated in the exceeds expectation area. The district also had their highest score in the history of the district on the state accountability system in 2023. *Note: the 2024 state accountability report cards were not out at the time of the community engagement session.*

At the end of the presentation, board members opened up the floor for questions. There were several questions from community members about staffing, staff retention, school funding, and the process used for assessing facilities and taking projects out to bid. Those in attendance also gave the board feedback on additional information they would like to see in future presentations.

The Board of Education for the School District of Lodi remains dedicated to fostering open communication channels with the community, ensuring that stakeholders have a voice in shaping the educational landscape. Future sessions and engagements are anticipated to further strengthen this collaborative approach towards educational excellence and community enrichment.



Each of the following forms must be completed and filed on time by candidates for School District office in order for the candidate's name to be placed on the ballot at the **February 18, 2025 Spring Primary** and the **April 1, 2025 Spring Election**.

The filing officer for school district office is the School District Clerk. Candidates should contact their filing officer or designee for further information or to obtain any of the necessary forms.

All School District Candidates must:



Complete and submit a Campaign Registration Statement (Form CF-1L) to the filing officer prior to raising or spending any funds, and no later than **5:00 p.m. on Tuesday**, **January 7, 2025**, or the candidate's name will not be placed on the ballot. If the form is faxed or emailed, the original document must follow postmarked no later than January 7, 2025. Wis. Stat. §§ 8.10(5), 8.21, 8.30(4), 120.06(6)(b), Wis. Admin. Code EL § 6.04.

New Candidates

File a campaign registration statement before campaign funds are collected or spent. Wis. Stat. \$\$ 11.0202(1)(a), 11.0101(1).

Continuing Candidates

Amend your current registration, including the office sought and the new primary and election dates. Wis. Stat. §§ 11.0202 (1)(a), 11.0101(1).



Complete and submit a *Declaration of Candidacy* (Form EL-162sd) to the filing officer no later than 5:00 p.m. on Tuesday, January 7, 2025, or the candidate's name will not be

placed on the ballot. If the form is faxed or emailed, the original document must follow, postmarked no later than January 7, 2025. Wis. Stat. §§8.10(5), 8.21, 8.30(4), Wis. Admin. Code EL § 6.04

For those of you who didn't know, this will be my last article as I'll be retiring from the School District of Lodi in January 2025. As I prepare to retire a wave of nostalgia washes over me. It feels like just yesterday that I began this journey in 2005 as the Business Manager. The years have flown by, filled with countless challenges and success stories.

I've had the privilege of working with exceptional colleagues, supporting dedicated educators, and serving a community that truly cares about its schools. My own children have thrived in this district, receiving a top-notch education that has prepared them well for the future.

While I'm excited to embark on a new chapter, I'll cherish the memories I've made in Lodi. The friendships, the shared experiences, and the collective effort to provide the best possible education for our students – these are the things that truly matter.

As I say goodbye, I'm filled with hope and gratitude. I'm confident that the School District of Lodi will continue to flourish, and I wish everyone involved continued success.

District Introduces Health Savings Account Option

The school district has implemented a second health insurance plan, that is a health savings account. What is a health savings account?

A Health Savings Account (HSA) is a tax-advantaged savings account that can help you save for future medical expenses. To be eligible, you must have a high-deductible health insurance plan.

With an HSA, an employee can deduct contributions from his or her taxable income, invest in savings, and withdraw funds tax-free for qualified medical expenses. This includes doctor visits, prescriptions, and more. Unused funds can be carried over to future years, making HSA's a valuable tool for long-term financial planning. To provide greater flexibility, the district now offers several health insurance plans, allowing staff to choose the plan that best aligns with their individual needs and preferences.

New Retirement Savings Plan Available to District Employees

In January 2025, the district will be implementing a new savings program for staff, titled the mandatory contribution Tax Sheltered Annuity program. A Tax-Sheltered Annuity (TSA) is a retirement savings plan offered by certain employers, often in the public sector, but is very similar to the 401k in the private sector. Contributions to a TSA are made with pre-tax dollars, reducing current taxable income. The funds grow tax-deferred within the account, and withdrawals are generally taxed as ordinary income upon retirement. TSAs provide a valuable way to save for retirement and potentially lower your tax burden.

Annual Meeting Recap

On October 21, 2024, the School District of Lodi convened its annual meeting and budget hearing. Positive outcomes from the previous fiscal year include a balanced 2023-2024 budget. Looking ahead, the district projects a balanced 2024-2025 budget. Additionally, a reduction of .72 mills in the mill rate is expected to lead to a decrease in 2025 property taxes. For instance, owners of \$100,000 properties may see a reduction of approximately \$72 in their annual tax bill. However, the district advises that the specific impact on individual taxpayers may vary depending on municipal factors.

<u>Preparing for the Future</u> - Once Again, The School District of Lodi Receives Its Highest State Report Card To Date, And Another Designation of *Exceeds Expectations*!

Since 2012, the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction (DPI) has been required by state statute (Wis. Stat. 115.385) to produce report cards for every publicly funded school and district in the state. These report cards are designed to help schools and districts celebrate success and focus

improvement efforts to better prepare students for their futures. They include data from multiple years across four priority areas: Achievement, Growth, Target Group Outcomes, and On-Track to Graduation.

Based on these measures, schools and districts receive one of five ratings, ranging from *Fails to Meet Expectations* to *Significantly Exceeds Expectations*.

Once again, the School District of Lodi has earned a rating of *Exceeds Expectations* from the state! Impressively, every school in the district also received the same designation. The district achieved its highest overall score to date, surpassing its previous record, and Lodi Middle School set a new high score as well. These achievements further solidify **Lodi's reputation as one of the top-performing districts in Dane and Columbia counties.**



Internally, our teams have thoroughly analyzed these reports to celebrate our successes and proactively address areas for growth.

<u>District Workforce</u> - Strengthening Education Through PLCs

At Lodi Schools, we are committed to continuous improvement in teaching and learning. One of the ways we achieve this is through Professional Learning Communities (PLCs), where educators work together to enhance student outcomes. PLCs provide our teachers with structured opportunities each week to collaborate, share strategies, and focus on key questions that help guide instruction. These questions include the following:

- 1. What do we want students to know and be able to do?
- 2. How will we know if they have learned it?
- 3. How will we respond when some students do not learn?
- 4. How will we extend learning for students who are already proficient?

Through these collaborative sessions, teachers are able to refine their teaching practices, address student needs more effectively, and ensure that all students are challenged and supported. This ongoing professional development is essential to providing a high-quality education for every student at Lodi Schools.

On November 1, our middle and high school educators participated in their third PLC training session of the year, led by a facilitator from the Association of Wisconsin School Administrators. These sessions focused on practical strategies to strengthen our PLC teams, helping educators make the most of their collaborative time. Teachers left the session with new tools and a refreshed focus on improving learning outcomes for all students.

Through these accounts, students gained a real-world perspective on the sacrifices made by our military personnel and the impact of service on the lives of veterans and their families. Throughout the event, 6th grade students were eager to engage, asking thoughtful questions that showcased their curiosity and respect. They inquired about daily life in the military, the skills veterans gained from their service, and the challenges of returning to civilian life. The veterans spoke about qualities like resilience, teamwork, and sacrifice; values that resonated with our students and which they can cultivate in their own lives. It was heartwarming to see our students genuinely connect with these remarkable individuals, gaining valuable life lessons beyond the classroom.

As a community, we extend our heartfelt thanks to the veterans who visited us. Their willingness to share their experiences not only educated but inspired us all. We are so grateful for their time, service, and continued dedication to fostering understanding in our next generation. In case you haven't noticed the *Ice Age Trail Campus* signs at each of our schools, the School District of Lodi has become the first ever K-12 Ice Age Trail Campus! This means our schools are working closely with the Ice Age Trail Alliance to learn about and help take care of the amazing Ice Age Trail right in our backyard. There has been a long-standing partnership between the School District of Lodi and the Ice Age Trail Alliance and we are excited to expand upon that partnership while increasing opportunities for our students to learn about and from this amazing resource.



In case you didn't know, the Ice Age Trail is a 1,200-mile hiking path that goes through Wisconsin. It's named after the Ice Age because it follows the edge of where the last big glacier was in our state. Last year the Ice Age Trail became part of the National Park System when it became one of eleven National Scenic Trails. It is so amazing that the trail is part of our community.

The recent trail campus designation was part of the special agreement our school district signed with the Ice Age Trail Alliance last spring. The coolest part? Lodi students actually built a brand new piece of the Ice Age Trail! This section goes from the high school bridge all the way to Industrial Drive. It's the only part of the whole Ice Age Trail in Wisconsin that was made completely by students. How awesome is that?

This partnership between our schools and the Ice Age Trail Alliance is super important because it helps us do all of these things:

- 1. Learn about nature and Wisconsin's ice age history
- 2. Unplug, get exercise and enjoy the outdoors
- 3. Work together as a community to serve
- 4. Take care of our local environment
- 5. Learn from local experts and build connections



In closing, all of this wouldn't have been possible without help from lots of different people. The trail is developed and maintained by countless volunteers throughout the

state. Through our long-standing partnership with both the Ice Age Trail Alliance and our local chapter we have been able combine the work of people and groups like Kurt Wilson and his Cross Country teams, our hiking clubs, Summer Saunters, the Ouisconsing School of Collaboration, our Chamber of Commerce, and of course, all the hard-working Lodi students into becoming the first ever K-12 Ice Age Trail Campus! Primary Pride

We are very busy at the Lodi Primary School engaging in lots of learning opportunities! As a school we are working on implementing strategies to work towards the five pillars of the District Strategic Plan. Below are some highlights of things we have been focusing on for Pillars one, two, and three.

Pillar 1: Preparing for the Future

- <u>Wisconsin Act 20:</u> Certified staff that teach literacy continue with the Keys to Literacy Training. This training is required as part of the Wisconsin Act 20 Legislation. Our staff have worked on this training during our pre-session and collaboration days as well as additional hours through the school year that we carved out for them. The staff complete modules independently and then come together for facilitated sessions by Donica Goodwin from CESA. After these sessions, we came together with our literacy team to reflect on our current instructional practices and how they align with the foundational skills that we are required to teach. We are currently 65% through our training and we have completed these areas: reading basics (Science of Reading), oral language, phonological awareness, phonics, fluency, and vocabulary.
- <u>Math Facts</u>: This past year the Math Department recognized a need to add a structured math fact routine into our weekly practice at the K-5 level. This summer we had a team of teachers come together to develop that routine, determine guidelines for staff to use with students, and create a plan for implementation. This past fall we started this Math Fact routine to support students learning into our daily instruction. We know that this additional instruction will create the foundation that students need to help them in the area of math.
- <u>Word of the Week:</u> One of the ways to help support our students vocabulary development, a critical foundational skill, is by including a "word of the week" in our daily announcements. Each day students hear the word, the definition, the word in a sentence with a matching picture. To extend this, we have added how to divide the word into syllables and synonyms and antonyms for the word. We encourage the students and staff to use this word and find it in the books and stories they are reading/listening to. Some of the words we have focused on so far:



respectful, responsible, safe, adjust,, gratitude, kindness, promise, express, and perseverance.

• How Can Families Help their Child at Home? As a way to help our families better understand how to

help their child's learning at home, our staff have created designated sections in the bimonthly agendas that they send home to families as well as in our monthly newsletters to families. Partnering with families allows us to continue learning at home and at school.

How can I help my child at home?

Daily Reading Together

- Read aloud: Take turns reading a favorite storybook or discover new genres together.
- Create a reading corner: Designate a cozy, fun spot for reading, encouraging your child to develop a love for books.
- Storytelling: Encourage your child to tell or invent their own stories, which fosters imagination and language skills.



Pillar 2, Nurturing the Whole Student

- **Primary School Families** We are continuing our Primary School Families again this year. The "families" are vertical groups of students and staff across grades 4K-2. Students will stay in these groups as they progress through the grades and we will introduce new students from 4k to the families each fall. As "families" we will complete a variety of activities each month that build positive relationships with other students and adults in our school and to help foster the sense of belonging, inclusion, and collaboration.
- <u>Mileage Club:</u> We are continuing our Mileage Club during K-2 lunch recess thanks to Mrs. Chantel Steinhorst and other parent volunteers. All students are invited to participate in running around the playground along a course that they track. As students run, they will earn prizes along the way. This opportunity is one of our goals on the Primary School Balanced Scorecard as a way to promote physical well being.

Pillar 3 Innovative Communication Connection

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- <u>Monthly Pride Pillars:</u> Each month we will be facilitating learning, activities, and opportunities on what Lodi Pride is and looks like by establishing Pride Pillars each month. The traits will relate to being proud of who you are. The first one for October and November is kindness. This coordinates well to celebrate Bullying Prevention Month and World Kindness Day (November 13). Students learned that one way they can be proud of themselves is by being kind to others. Here are some of the things that we did to highlight this.
 - <u>Kindness Lesson and Quilt:</u> During SEL Lesson, Mrs. Val Bilkey is doing a kindness lesson and building a Kindness quilt.
 - <u>Kindness Extension Activity</u> We sent home a Kindness challenge to families with activities students can do to spread kindness at home.
 - <u>Kindness Challenge Video Clip</u> We created TOP SECRET KINDNESS MISSION and added to the daily announcements email.



• <u>School Families</u>: The activities that we are doing with our School Families are focused on revitalizing the Lodi Pride initiative. In order to do this, we are talking to students about what pride is. During our first family gatherings, students talked about being proud of yourself and what it means. Then they colored a picture of themselves and wrote or drew some things that they are proud of in the speech bubble.
