Student Eligibility:

- Indicate on a Home Language Survey that a language other than English is spoken at home.
- Students that score below 4.8 on the WIDA Screener
- Receive supplement services to improve English Language Proficiency
- EL Plan for district

Funds to Support:

- Salaries and Benefits for ESL certified teachers
- Software for English Language
 Acquisition
- Serving over 300 students

Title IV: Student Support and Academic Enrichment (SSAE)
Program

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District Eligibility:

Formula grant based on student population

Funds To Support \$151,642.00:

- Security improvements: adding cameras for improved visibility
- Supporting summer programs to extend learning opportunities.

Title IX: McKinney Vento Act-Homeless Education

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Grant:

- Competitive grant based on need.
- Funds Cover Homeless Liaison
- Support for students and families:
 academic, non-academic, medical,
 transportation, short-term housing

Student Eligibility:

- means individuals who lack a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence (within the meaning of section 103(a)(1))
- Serving approximately 100 students and families

Educational Stability and the Every Student Succeeds Act

The provisions emphasize the importance of limiting educational disruption by keeping children who move in foster care (due to entering the foster care system or changing placements) in their schools of origin, unless it is determined to be in their best interest to change schools.
