Students share their votes on Election 2024


With the presidential election coming up, we are hearing about how important it is to vote for the right candidate and which candidate is the right one.


You may have seen him the hallways during in passing periods, or on the

How much do we really know about the Holocaust? School should teach more about the cataclysm that defined modernity

In history class, one of the things students must have learned about was WW II. And specifically, the Holocaust. We definitely know about the Holocaust, and how and why it happened. But do we truly understand the gravity and emotional weight of this event?

And more importantly, do we take the **Holocaust seriously?**

This past summer during a trip to New Orleans, I visited the WW II Museum with my family. Throughout my visit, not only did I learn so much more about the war itself, but about the Holocaust. I was horrified.

One of the exhibits that we spent the most time watching were the eyewitness accounts of the Holocaust. The exhibit was not only about the victims of the Holocaust, but also about the former soldiers who liberated or toured those concentration camps!

Even if I had already seen the same exhibit twice or thrice, I would watch them again. I just couldn't believe it. Upon returning home, I realized just how

specifically the Holocaust," He said. "We also watched motion pictures in class that demonstrated some of the atrocities that occurred in places like Dachau, which was one of the main German concentration camps during WW II."

Afterwards, Rudy told me about how he had visited both the Holocaust Museum in Washington D.C., and the Holocaust Memorial Museum at Dachau, in Germany. "(As a success coach) we are focusing on (getting) every Billie on track to graduate. So (this means) 8th graders and 9th graders passing all their classes, attending school regularly, and making sure that we're not building bad habits in 8th grade so that when we get to 9th grade, we don't fall behind."

Born and raised in Marcola, Oregon, Mr G. went to Thurston high school. He got a degree in counseling at Western Oregon University.

"I went and got my school counseling degree because I wanted to keep working with kids. I wanted to further my career, but I didn't want to be in a classroom all day. So school counseling is the route I went."

He heard about Pleasant Hill through his friends.

"Mr. Miller, the girls' basketball coach, is a good friend of mine, and he was coming out here to teach PE. Mr. McClain, the high school principal, used to work with Hamlin."

Mr. G. has started something called Work Completion Lab to help kids with missing work.

"Kids either get assigned to come in and hang out with me or some kids want to come in and do work because they are gone or they didn't have enough time. So during lunch time, kids can come to work with me, get caught up, and turn those assignments into me. I'll make sure they get to the teachers."

One of the other things Mr G. does is he helps out kids with 504's. A 504 is a set of accommodations that help students with medical limitations learn. Growing up, Mr G. had a 504.

"I have what they call achromatopsia, so my cones have no color." This affects his vision which makes him legally blind.

"I look very close at things. You probably see me read my phone or read my computer or my screens. Right? So I get to get real close, because that's, like, where my eyes naturally focus. And, yeah, I was on a 504 going through school."

Even though he has this he doesn't let this stop him.

"The only thing I can't do is drive."

Mr. G. is a helpful addition to our school and will help 8th and 9th grade students with 504's and help them pass classes.

It's called Escaramuzas.

"Escaramuzas is a group of eight girls riding horses working in a team and we do twelve exercises, lots of the exercises include many types of turns."

We do the routines in the Lienzo (arena) and the whole event is called an Acharya. Once you're done with your routine the eight of you line up in a straight line whichever way the crowd is facing and you (it's called the personas) you go like this with your right hand (cross over chest) so you thank God, then the horse and pet it and then you thank the people." Emily said "The last competition that we had in Mexico we got top 10. Basically your judge has a paper that your trainers have set up with every routine has their own name so like Uno con Puesto and on that paper it says who and who comes into the ring at the same time who turns this way who turns that way.

Project 2025 sets up Trump as an authoritarian, pushing for a Christian nationalist plan to steer the U.S. toward autocracy. Legal experts have said Project 2025 would undermine the rule of law, separation of powers, separation of church and state, and civil liberties.

The main points of the project are to cut Medicare and Medicaid and urge the government to explicitly reject abortion as health care. The project seeks to eliminate coverage of emergency contraception and use the Comstock Act to prosecute those who send and receive contraceptives and abortion pills.

Trump seeks to control women's bodies while Kamala Harris advocates for women's right to their bodies. Trump has said with the Supreme Court ruling allowing states to decide on abortion, that the matter is settled. But he has refused to oppose any national ban on abortion. .

Harris strongly rejected efforts at banning abortion including the national ban and she blamed Trump for the reversal of Roe v Wade. She made reproductive health her top priority in her 2024 presidential campaign.

Her stance on human-caused climate change is that it's an existential threat and we need to act urgently and address it. Harris proposes investing in renewable energy and holding polluters accountable.

On the other hand, Trump says "he is not a great believer in man-made climate change. He has also long rejected climate science, sometimes calling global warming a "hoax." leading a majority of Trump supporters not to believe in human caused climate change at all.

Harris supports Ukraine in its fight against Putin's war crime land grab. The US is the main backer of a free Ukraine, and if Trump gets his way, he will sell Ukraine out, giving Putin, a major victory and permission to swallow up other countries. China is watching and if Putin wins, it is likely that they will move against Taiwan, our key ally.

Harris's stance on her support for Israel is a little questionable to me because she has suggested that US military aid to Israel would continue if she wins the election. She has stated, "I will always stand up for Israel's rights to defend itself and I will always ensure Israel can defend itself." That statement in itself could have an entire other story written on it, but, I don't believe Israel is defending itself at this point so that's why I find her choice of words questioning and not necessarily agreeable.

This goes to show how not every candidate's actions will always align with our personal beliefs. Despite there not being the "perfect" politician, but of the two running this fall, only one is the right choice and I believe that it is Kamala Harris.

The Billie Bulletin in its first years: the 1950s and 1960's

The first Billie Bulletin was very different from how we write them today. The Billie Bulletin of the early 1950's covered different topics, had a different layout, and no pictures. The first editor for the Billie Bulletin was Edith Smith, Ms. Devish's grandma She and her fellow journalists did things differently than how we do them today.

One of the things she and her team covered differently was the topics they wrote about. They wrote about book club meetings, the "Y-Teens", required military enrollment, and parades at the school. PHHS was also much smaller in number than today, and few kids had cars. Most rode the bus.

The Y-Teens was mentioned several times in the Billie Bulletin, and it seemed that it was widely known throughout the community. I couldn't say that I had heard of it. In doing some research, I found that the Y-Teens was a club for girls that was provided by YWCA. Young women in the group developed leadership skills and made differences in the communities where they lived. There were Y-Teen clubs in several different communities which would meet and talk about discrimination shown to certain races or nationalities. They wanted to change this

The people who wrote for the Billie Bulletin also wrote stories of members from the Marines, Marines Reserves Army, Coast Guard, and Naval Reserve who came and talked to junior and senior boys about their obligations to the military. Members of the Armed Forces also came and talked to the junior and senior girls on February 1st about joining the Army as well.

Later, in the 1960's Billie Bulletin, problems like war and discrimination were written abou. Kids in the 1960s must have had to deal with these problems in their daily lives.

The first Editor of the Billie Bulletin: Edith Smith

Everyone brought their own lunch; very few students drove to school; sometimes staff used physical punishment on misbehaving kids and almost half of the kids who began school as freshmen, actually graduated as seniors four years later.

ear almost all students attending at that time will report a pretty happy experience in high school. School was simpler, more intimate, and seemed to feature more shared values.

Edith Smith (Grandma to Ms. Devish and mom to Mr. Steve Smith) granted an interview about her life and times at PHHS circa 1948-1951. Incidentally, she became the first student editor of the Billie Bulletin which will be celebrating its 75th birthday next year.

Smith has only vague memories of creating the very first typed and mimeographed Billie Bulletin. The advisor, Mr. Bob Officer was also a coach. The stories were charming and short, often accounts of what is going on at school with students and clubs. It was homemade and sincere. To our eyes, the 1950's Billie Bulletin reads like a glimpse from a very different time.

Edith's own story is fascinating.

She grew up in Eugene, finally transferring to Pleasant Hill by sophomore year in high school. Her father wanted solitude and the farm life. Her mother preferred the city. Their

different desires led to their eventual divorce. Edith, sensing that the Eugene folks had more money, chose the country life.

Once at Pleasant Hill High school, a top athlete, Paul Smith noticed her and began to tease her. He was popular with the girls, a four sport athlete, a good worker and "fun to be around." Edith admits she was not an athlete and just an average student. By senior year she and Paul got much more serious and on graduation day, Paul proposed with a ring.

Edith's father was not pleased.

Paul's willingness to work hard landed him jobs at Mt. June Sawmill, then Hills creek Lumber where he became "one of the best saw filers" around. After their marriage on October 11th of 1951, they moved into Eugene, but then moved to the mill camps for the affordable, if spartan, housing. Edith took work at the First National Bank and then getting pregnant with Steve saw them move back to Pleasant Hill.

"I did not want to leave Pleasant Hill. This is home to me."

But Edith had to deal with the fact that most families had mom and dad, her folks had split. That meant that her parents did not socialize, especially her father, like other parents did.

Edith did confess to some "rebel" action. The school district had a derelict building on campus, and she and her friends decided they were not going to go into this "unsafe" building. So they called for a sit down strike. While they struck sitting on the lawn, the principal talked to them about their action. But he did not force them into class. They did, however, get an F for the day and her dad told her that she would never, ever, do that again.

Edith liked school and had positive memories of teachers like Mrs. Smith, Ms. Cash, Mrs. Thyme, Anna Lou Parr and Mrs.Pogue. She recalled that the wooden desks were all carved up, but they did have lockers, blackboards and discipline was strict. They sat in rows and often ate lunch with the teachers.

Paul Smith was something of a prankster and eventually got kicked out of the school bus at a place near the Dexter Lake Club and had to walk home. Paul and his friends also liked to remove doorknobs from doors. Pranks were not uncommon, but school was, as today, the center of community life for many and for Edith.

Sight to the Blind!

What would you do if you lost your eyesight? What would anyone do in that scenario? It would be terrible to lose the sense that allows you to see the world.

But technological advancements are already being made that can give a person losing their sight hope. Neuralink, the company you think of when you hear "brain computers," has received an FDA break through device designation on its new project "Blindsight."

As technology progresses, these surgeries will undoubtedly become safer, but in their current form, they could be dangerous.

Many people also have concerns that Neuralink chips might not be secure enough and will get hacked. This could threaten devices connected to Neuralink and, by extension, a person's privacy and safety.

Medical devices have had vulnerabilities before that allowed for them to be hacked. A good example would be in 2016 when Johnson & Johnson reported flaws in their insulin pumps that could allow unauthorized people to control a patient's insulin doses.

Even though this science has not been perfected, it still shows a path to a better future where people won't be defined by their disabilities. I hope this technology continues to grow and helps create a better world for humanity.
