With a steady increase since 2013, over 76% of FNSBSD students with disabilities learn in general education settings with their peers at least 80% of the day.

This is the highest rate of inclusive general education participation of any large district in Alaska.

Began training with district-wide program classrooms in January 2023.

Currently, all district-wide program classrooms and all but 3 building administrators (principals, lead teachers, APs have comprehensive training.)

All district faculty at 7 schools have participated in the de-escalation/communication portions of Ukeru training. More will participate in second semester.

- The Ukeru training consists primarily of instruction in effective communication for teachers and paraprofessionals interacting with students impacted by trauma and who experience stressful, or escalating behaviors. Building environments and individualized plans conducive to progressing students through social emotional and behavioral goals, will work to mitigate potential escalations. "Through trauma informed training, Ukeru helps providers explore and understand the effects of trauma on behavior and functioning. Participants will learn how to assess the impact of trauma, understand trauma symptoms, and take those symptoms into consideration when developing a support plan for each client who has experienced trauma."
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 Secondly, the Ukeru System utilizes mats for blocking and directing as opposed to hands-on physical restraint when students display aggressive behavior in attempts to harm themselves or others. "Physical techniques are taught by practicing effective use of protective equipment and soft, cushioned blocking materials custom made specifically for use with the Ukeru model—that keep both the employee and client safe."
