





Important Yearly Reminders

- Supervision is available on the playground each day starting at 8:10 am and ending at 3:30 pm.
 Please do not drop off your student(s) prior to 8:10 unless they are in Boys & Girls Club. Any students that are not picked up by 3:30 will be sent to the office, and a phone call will be made.
- If you are submitting an absence request for your child or leaving a message that they will be late, please also include their lunch choice for the day if they need to order hot lunch.

K-3 Literacy Screener Jan 2025

Early Reading Skills

2023 Wisconsin Act 20 requires that K-3 students are assessed in the early reading skills of alphabet knowledge, letter sound knowledge, phonemic awareness, and decoding. These skills are assessed differently depending on the student's grade level. You can learn more about these important early reading skills below:

- Alphabet knowledge: Knowing the names of printed letters.
- Letter sound knowledge: Knowing the sounds of printed letters.
- Phonemic awareness: Hearing, saying, and manipulating individual sounds in spoken words.
- Decoding skills: Connecting sounds to written letters to read printed words.
- Oral vocabulary: Understanding the meanings of words when speaking or listening.

aimswebPlus Early Reading Screening Assessments

The *aimswebPlus* reading screeners that measure the skills above are based on a student's grade level. You can learn more about these assessments below:

- Letter naming fluency (5K): Measures a student's knowledge of upper-and lower-case letters. Your child will have one minute to say the names of visually presented upper-and lower-case letters that they know.
- Letter word sounds fluency (4K-1st grade): Measures a student's letter sound knowledge. Your child will have one minute to say the sounds of visually presented letters, syllables, and words that they know.
- Initial sounds (4K-5K): Measures a student's phonemic awareness. Your child will be provided a page with four pictures. Your child will be asked to either point to a picture of a word that matches the initial sound the teacher says or make the initial sound of a word spoken by the teacher. This assessment will take 2-3 minutes.
- **Phoneme segmentation (1st grade):** Measures a student's phonemic awareness. Your child will listen to a word that is spoken by the teacher and then say each sound they hear in the word. This assessment will take 2-3 minutes.
- Auditory vocabulary (5K-1st grade): Measures a student's knowledge of words commonly found in 5-year old Kindergarten and Grade 1 reading materials. Your child will match a picture to an orally presented word. This assessment will take 2-4 minutes.
- Vocabulary (2nd- 3rd grade): Measures a student's knowledge of the meanings of grade-appropriate words. Your child will choose the meaning of target words by selecting from multiple choice options. This is an untimed, computerized assessment that typically takes 4-7 minutes.
- **Oral reading fluency (1st-3rd grade):** Measures a student's decoding skills. Your child will read two stories aloud, each for one minute.



K-3 Literacy Screener Jan 2025

As previously shared, Wisconsin recently passed an educational law, commonly known as "Act 20." One of the requirements of that law requires each student in grades 4K-3 to take an assessment called the *aimswebPlus* early reading screener. A screener is an assessment that quickly checks a student's reading skills to determine if additional individualized instruction is needed. Should a student score below the 25 percentile on the screener, the law requires schools to give an additional diagnostic assessment and use the data to create a Personal Reading Plan (PRP) to address the identified literacy skills. Teachers will be contacting you based on the results of the screener. If your student is identified as needing a Personal Reading Plan, it will be sent home on Jan. 30-31 in the progress report envelope. Your child's teacher will be reviewing this literacy data with you, and if needed, your child's reading plan, at the upcoming parent-teacher conferences.

What skills will be tested on the new state screener? The screener will check important literacy skills including alphabet knowledge, letter sound knowledge, phonemic awareness, decoding, and oral vocabulary. The skills are tested differently based on the student's grade level. Please see the back of this letter for information about these skills and options to be assessed in languages other than English.

When will the reading screener take place?

The *aimswebPlus* early reading screener will be administered to all 5K-3 students between January 15-January 29, 2025. Because this is a state law, there is no opt out option. If your child scores below the 25 percentile, your child's teacher will contact you and administer an additional diagnostic assessment. A personal reading plan will be created for your child.

If your child scores at or above the 25 percentile on the screener, no additional assessment is needed and no personal reading plan will be designed.

How can I prepare my child for the early reading screener?

No special preparation for *aimswebPlus* reading screener is needed.

Please follow these guidelines for dropping off and picking up your student(s):

- You may park in any of the areas on the map shown in **blue**. Remind your student to use the crosswalks and crossing guards when crossing the street and to cross with caution.
- Please **do not park** in areas marked in **red** or **yellow** as they are designated no parking zones or bus zones.
- Areas marked with blue dashed lines are designated hug n' go zones. Cars should pull over, students should exit on the passenger side, and the car should exit the area.
 Cars should not be in this area for longer than one minute and cars should never be parked or left unattended.
- Please note that the canopy doors (Main Entrance) are for students/families with disabilities only and cabs; a parking pass is needed for this area. We have barricades up starting at 8:10 in the morning until the bell rings, and after school until 3:30. Only vehicles with parking passes will be allowed to enter during these times.


