
"AP for All" encourages all Orono High School students to complete at least one AP course during high school.

Orono High School recently restructured its AP program, providing earlier access to AP courses. This year, 45% of Orono's freshman class enrolled in AP Human Geography, widely recommended as an introductory-level AP course. When OHS opened the AP Seminar course to sophomores for 2024-25 (earning English credit), 42% of the class enrolled. When coupled with the AP Research course taken junior or senior year, students are eligible to earn an AP Capstone Diploma.



Welcome Changes at the Middle School

Orono Schools remains deeply committed to providing a safe and secure environment for our students, staff, and community members while also fostering a welcoming atmosphere for all who walk through our doors.


This summer, we undertook a major reconstruction of our middle school entrance to enhance both security and hospitality. The new design includes secure entrances that provide better control over building access. Our reconfigured office spaces not only provide appropriate work areas for administration and counseling teams, but a direct view of the parking lot and main entrances. These changes further strengthen our security measures by allowing staff to monitor the flow of visitors in real time.

Our revamped lobby area supports our district's strategic goal of fostering connectedness. The newly designed, welcoming lobby entrance and desk areas now serve as a warm, inviting space where guests, students, and families can feel at ease.

In addition to these enhancements, we were excited for our students to start school this fall with enhanced performing arts spaces that reflect our commitment to enriching the student experience through the arts including band, choir, and theater.

At OMS, the Link, and our elementary buildings, crews also installed replacement HVAC systems that are improving air quality and comfort.

We want to extend our gratitude to Orono's Business Services department that oversaw facilities and finance, buildings and grounds, and the multitude of contractors who spent the summer bringing our dreams and plans to life. Many years of thoughtful planning and resource management made these improvements possible. Thanks to everyone's hard work, we are able to offer a safer, more secure, and more welcoming space for all.

Proficiency Based on Multiple Measures of Success

New analysis of MCA scores, ACT exam scores, and course grades offers a complete picture

In today's educational landscape, the measurement of student proficiency extends beyond a single standardized test. In our state, the Minnesota Comprehensive Assessments (MCAs) are administered periodically to help measure student progress toward meeting state academic standards. The MCAs provide valuable data, but they are just one piece of the puzzle.

An holistic approach to measuring growth. Orono Schools embraces an holistic approach to measuring student proficiency, relying on multiple measures of success to understand a student's progress and help determine appropriate academic pathways.


MCA opt-outs impact score reports. A statistically significant number of Orono families choose to opt out of the MCAs. When they do, district proficiency percentages decline. In our June 2024 newsletter to the community, we shared that our Class of 2025 opt-out percentage for MCA math (taken junior year) was nearly 31%. We understand students and families are choosing to prioritize their time preparing for more rigorous coursework and national exams.

Impact on national rankings. In previous years, Orono High School (OHS) has ranked #1 among traditional high

schools in Minnesota. In 2024, the ranking fell to #5 among traditional high schools. When you compare OHS to other neighboring schools, Orono outpaces others on nearly all other criteria; however, the proficiency data on standardized tests lowers the high school's national ranking.



Ensuring all students are on track for success. Orono is committed to ensuring that all students are on track for success, regardless of their participation in state testing. By evaluating multiple measures, we create a balanced view of student achievement that reflects their day-to-day learning and readiness for future challenges. This approach supports our mission to foster academic growth and to tailor pathways for all students, empowering them to reach their full potential. Ultimately, our focus remains on creating a well-rounded and fair evaluation system, while also respecting family choice.





STEM Opportunity Shines a Light

In Mr. Doug Jetton's technology education classes at Orono Middle School (OMS), eighth-grade students have been engaged in deep learning this fall. They recently completed a unit building Solar Suitcases from kits donated by We Share Solar. Each Solar Suitcase includes everything required to build a stand-alone, 12-volt DC solar power system including step-by-step instructions. The Solar Suitcase project will be repeated each quarter as students rotate through their exploratory courses.

In early October, Ms. Gigi Goldman, co-founder of We Share Solar, visited the classroom and brought additional perspective to the project. She shared the history of the organization whose mission was to light women's clinics to reduce maternal and infant mortality and improve health outcomes. Later, the organization added an education focus to help students gain the light they need after sundown to study; in particular, for mandatory high school entrance exams.

During this unit, students learned about solar and renewable energy, circuitry, service learning, geography, global issues, and the barriers to learning experienced by students their very own age.

Thanks to a generous donation from the Orono Foundation for Education (oronofoundation.org), one solar suitcase will be built in March 2025 through OMS WIN (What I Need) time. Students will self-select to spend their WIN time building the suitcase that will be deployed to a refugee





camp. Mr. Jetton is actively seeking eighth-grade students to volunteer for a number of experiential leadership roles for this project. Please check in with him at OMS!
