

## **School Events 2023-24**

The 2023-24 academic year at SIS was replete with activities and events, both schoolwide and divisional. In the fall, the school held its first Terry Fox Run, raising funds for the Child Leukemia Center in Korea. High school students organized the Fall Festival, while elementary students celebrated Chuseok with a student-run assembly, and a parade in traditional costumes. All three divisions had drama productions - *Peter Pan* presented by the elementary school, *Crazy Town* by the middle school, and *The Addams Family* performed by the high school. In the second half of the year, SIS was once again the organizer of National History Day Korea, welcoming 600 students from 26 schools across the country. The academic year concluded with the 47th Graduation Ceremony in May, and SIS' inaugural on-campus alumni gathering in June.











## **Curriculum and Professional Development**

In the 2023-24 school year, the school continued its focus on vertical and horizontal alignment across the divisions in all subjects. Emphasis was also placed on enhancing and strengthening all elements of the program by a review of the standards and the scope and sequence in every subject.

#### **Curriculum Highlights**

- 1. Comprehensive curriculum audit and review undertaken for English Language Arts in K-8.
- 2. Groundwork for the implementation of the UFLI Phonics program in K-2
- 3. Creation of Curriculum Overviews for parents for all elementary grade levels PK3 to grade 5
- 4. Introduction of three new HS courses which were responsive to student needs and interests, and which include a great amount of inquiry and engagement balanced with just-right challenges for students:
  - Communications. A new grade 9 course in 2023-24, which was revised to include a focus on practical ethics and complex real-world issues facing students today.
  - Design Thinking and Engineering (to begin 2024-25). A highly engaging course that will provide a structured application of science, technology, engineering, arts, and mathematics (STEAM) principles for students who are interested in hands-on experiences in the sciences. Students will learn about and explore design principles, mathematical modeling, robotics, and other topics throughout the year. Emphasis will be placed on principles of design and the modeling of behaviors and mindsets central to the application of science and engineering practices.
  - College Algebra and Trigonometry (to begin 2024-25). The school seeks to expand the high school offerings for Mathematics, including an AP Precalculus course to begin 2025-26. The new CAT offering will feed into that course.

#### **Professional Development**

It is a great source of pride for SIS to ensure that effective professional development is provided to support our curricular program and our teachers' continuous improvement, so they can be of greatest service to our students and their needs.

SIS faculty is highly engaged in professional development. In the school year 2023-24, SIS faculty engaged in over 200 highly relevant professional experiences, which included conferences, workshops, delivering presentations of their own, and more.

In addition, across SIS or within particular schools, staff engaged in the following collectively:

- 1. October 9 Mini-EARCOS PD Day, a teacher-led professional development day with a deep focus on identifying focus areas for the SIS Strategic Plan
  - Direct impact on student learning: each teacher walked away with a commitment to improve at least one practice, which students certainly benefited from across the entire school.
- 2. January 2024 On-site literacy training with Erin Kent Consulting
  - Direct impact on student learning: increased clarity and confidence in delivering a more robust phonics program, and provide curricular integration.
- 3. March 1 Autonomy-Supportive Teaching with Johnmarshall Reeve
  - Direct impact on student learning: as an outcome of this training, we delivered student surveys, met in focus groups, and had productive dialogue among staff to provide greater awareness of student perspectives and areas where we can strengthen relationships and confidence in students. This work is ongoing and we will continue to improve our support of student autonomy.

It is created by the College Board, which offers college-level curricula and examinations to high school students. Post-secondary schools typically consider a score of 3 or better a passing grade at the collegiate level.



## **Measures of Academic Progress**





## **High School Activities**

Seoul International School offered approximately 50 clubs for students to participate in at the high school in 2023-2024. Clubs offered students opportunities to explore specialty interests and pursue leadership roles.

#### AQT

The HS AQT team competed at 4 KAIAC events, including hosting one event. The team finished first or second at each event. In addition, this team participated in the Asia regional competition, finishing in second place.

#### Forensics

Our Forensics teams for speech and debate participated in 4 KAIAC events, including hosting one event. Our team had strong finishes at each event.

#### MUN

Our Model United Nations program sent delegations to two events - THIMUN at The Hague, Netherlands, and UNISMUN in Hanoi, Vietnam. These events provided the opportunity for our students to engage with students from international schools in the greater Asia and Europe international school community.

#### Performing Arts

Our Music Department and student-musicians continued the tradition of excellence at SIS, with honors such as the Platinum level ranking at KIMEA Large Group Festival, and having students selected for the prestigious AMIS international school music festivals for Band, Choir, and Strings.

Our Drama Department presented The Addams Family Musical, and sent a delegation to the ISTA Drama Festival in Vietnam.

#### AP Art Show

Every year in April, The Atrium of the Main Building is full of talented artwork from fresh young artsts at AP Art Show. More exciting events scheduled for the upcoming academic year, SY23-24.

#### **VEX Robotics**

Our Robotics team competed in the KAIAC VEX league, participating in 4 KAIAC events. Students demonstrated growth throughout the season, and with strong participation, SIS was able to field two teams to provide additional opportunities for student participation at events.

#### Mu Alpha Theta (Competitive Math)

Our Math competition team participated in a variety of local and regional events during the year. Highlights included winning the AISA Math Mania Tournament and having the honor of serving as host for the Asia Regional NEAMC Senior Division Competition.

#### **Alumni Open House**

A school's alumni represent its living legacy, serving as bridges between past, present, and future generations of students. With a vast pool of graduates both in Korea and overseas, SIS recognized the untapped potential of its alumni network and made alumni outreach a goal for the 2023-24 school year.

The school organized its first-ever overseas alumni event – a meetup in Boston in January 2024. This was followed by the inaugural on-campus alumni gathering in June 2024, which drew more than forty alumni and their families.

Beyond these social gatherings, alumni contributed to student learning by serving as guest speakers, sharing their knowledge, expertise, and experiences with current students. These interactions provided valuable real-world perspectives and strengthened the connection between past and present SIS community members.
