



Principles of Computing:

<u>First Place at Portage</u>

The Michigan City High School (MCHS) Marine Corps Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps (MCJROTC) earned a first place trophy at the Portage military drill meet on Saturday, December 7th in the Color Guard category. The Wolves defeated larger schools, to include perennial powerhouse schools Ben Davis and Warren Central from Indianapolis. Three of the four cadets in the Color Guard plan to enter the military. Cadet Major Marcus has enlisted in the Marine Corps for Reconnaissance, which is the Marine equivalent of Navy SEALS or Army Special Forces. Cadet 2nd Lieutenant Matthew Wilson plans fo enlist in the Navy for their nuclear submarine program. Cadet Sergeant Jordon Staples plans on enlisting in the Army for infantry. He replaced Cadet Gunnery Sergeant Daniel Kohn, who was wrestling for the MCHS team which had a tournament on the same day. Kohn, a junior, plans on attending the U.S. Naval Academy. An education there is valued at \$350,000. Upon graduation, he wants to become a Navy SEAL Despite having to replace some of our usual starters for a variety of reasons, our younger cadets stepped up and made us competitive in the other categories," said Marine Instructor <u>Master Sergeant Jeff Benak.</u> Senior Marine Instructor Major Tom McGrath noted the


enrollment.
