
Early Care and Education

- Oversees \$60 million of funding for subsidized child care through the Alternative Payment Program
- Delivers training opportunities for ECE and TK professionals
- Operates 11 childcare centers
 - California State Preschools (8)
 - Infant & Toddler Centers (2)
- Administers the Child Care Food Program
- Manages the Santa Barbara Child Care Planning Council and Quality Counts

Serves 5,000 children from birth to 12 annually.

Juvenile Court and Community Schools

- Delivers instruction for at-promise youth who l been adjudicated, expelled or benefit from a si alternative school setting
 - Dos Puertas Court School
 - Peter B. FitzGerald Community School



Career Technical Education (CTE)

- Provides grant funding to middle and high schools for CTE programming
- Offers CTE teachers professional learning and field experiences
- Connects schools, businesses and institutions of higher education to build career pathways
- Operates an Early Care and Education Apprenticeship to help meet workforce demands

In 2023-2025, CTE has been awarded and disseminated **\$4.82 million** in grant funds



Transitional Youth Services

- Supports schools in improving outcomes for students experiencing homelessness and foster youth
- Provides necessary resources to students and families
- Offers training and technical assistance
- Builds relationships between schools and community organizations that serve students experiencing homelessness and foster youth.

Behavioral Health and Wellness

- Delivers training opportunities through the Behavioral Health Learning Network
- Oversees and disseminates \$4.2 million in grant funding to LEAs
- Connects schools with resources and programs to increase access to community services

School Climate and Student Engagement

- Supports districts with attendance programs, expulsion appeal hearings, and interdistrict attendance transfer appeals, and oversees the implementation of the Countywide Triennial Expelled Youth Plan
- Provides opioid overdose prevention resources and materials to schools
- Manages the Tobacco Use Prevention Education (TUPE) County Technical Assistance Grant
- Provides 504 plan resources and training to SBCEO program staff
- Develops the SBCEO Local Control Accountability Plan (LCAP) for the JCCS and TYS programs

School Safety Liaison

- Facilitates communication between law enforcement and schools during emergencies
- Provides school safety related professional development
- Oversees SBCEO emergency preparedness and response
- Supports the countywide implementation of Standard Response Protocols (SRP) and the Standard Reunification Method (SRM)



Districts Funded Under LCFF • Local property taxes do not reach LCFF level • The state provides money to the district up State aid to the LCFF funding level Property taxes 11 of 20 Community Funded (Basic Aid) Districts community-funded, • Local property taxes exceed LCFF level school districts • Local district keeps excess property taxes Property taxes statewide. • Unlike local districts, county education offices do not keep excess property taxes, and **Excess property taxes** instead return funds to the state. (above LCFF)
