Outdoor Education: cultivating real-world experiences

Outdoor learning is fundamental to our educational philosophy, aligning with our commitment to real-world experiences that enhance academic knowledge. Year 6's residential trip exemplified this, as students enjoyed the countryside while developing friendships and life-enhancing skills such as resilience and teamwork. The trip fostered not only outdoor adventure but also independence and personal growth – an experience that will remain with them for years to come.

Meanwhile, Year 3 had their first RGS residential trip similarly focused on nurturing independence, problem-solving, and creativity. They enjoyed catapult making, arts and crafts, shelter building, bushcraft skills, and communicating with walkie-talkies. The trip really boosted their independence and resilience, students showcased their *Able* superpower by working collaboratively and thinking critically, while developing their sense of responsibility.

Year 6 Art and Technology Day

Year 6's Art and Technology Day was a wonderful example of RGS Junior School's ethos of nurturing creativity and problem-solving. The children spent time with a very talented visiting artist, Julia Patton, and took part in a 'save the planet' themed workshop. Each student made a recycled rainforest bird card which was then sold at the RGS fair. Year 6 children also worked with RGS Robotics Teacher Dr Bunce, in a robot themed workshop, learning how to programme iPads to direct spheros to travel along a set route, showcasing how technology and art can intersect in meaningful, impactful ways.





Year 4 students showcased their *Able* superpowers throughout the year in computing lessons, honing their programming skills through hands-on problem-solving with LEDs, inputs/ outputs, and coding sequences.

In small groups, they embodied the RGS ethos of perseverance, debugging code with determination and calmness, which prepared them for more complex challenges ahead.



Magical Mathematicians

Year 6 students harnessed their *Able* superpowers during the UKMT Junior Mathematical Challenge. They demonstrated intellectual resilience as they tackled maths problems well beyond their age group. We are especially proud of **George C** who was invited to take part in the Junior Mathematical Olympiad. In addition, **Bruce L**, **Oorja C** and **James B** were all invited to take part in the Kangaroo follow on challenge. RGS Junior School celebrates not only academic achievement but also the courage and perseverance it takes to tackle new challenges.

5C and 5B investigated volume in maths, working out the best volume container for 279 pieces of popcorn, having been given 10 pieces to work from. They planned, designed and problem solved using lots of maths until it was time to test their calculations, and celebrate their success with a snack!

Meanwhile, Year 3 students got creative learning maths too. It was great to see so many children enjoying themselves and competing both athletically and mathematically in the inaugural Mile to Maths event. Our friends at Dame Allan's School made the trip across the Town Moor and we managed to dodge the showers to enjoy an Olympic themed event. All the children collaborated with new friends and completed a run, throw and jump event whilst practising their mathematics.



Pi Day was an explosion of creativity for our Year 5 and 6 students, who engaged in activities inspired by the mathematical constant. Year 6 created circular art inspired by Kandinsky, while Year 5 constructed city skylines using the digits of Pi.

Their enthusiasm and willingness to stretch their imagination perfectly encapsulated the *Able* spirit. The day was a reminder of how maths, much like art, can foster creativity and innovation.


Please, Sir, I Want Some More...

Roll of Honour

We were proud to unveil two new plaques on our Memorial Organ for Remembrance Day. They contain the names of 17 Old Novocastrians who were not previously commemorated on our Roll of Honour. For the first time this includes two individuals who died on active military service since 1945. We also launched our new digital Roll of Honour, available to search on the RGS Archives Catalogue. For the first time this contains information on those names from the Second World War Roll. We are incredibly grateful to our Old Novo community for all the help and support they have given to this project, it means so much to the school.



RGS Therapy Dog

As part of #MentalHealthAwarenessWeek we introduced the latest member of RGS, our school therapy dog, Storm. Pets As Therapy (PAT) is a national charity that enhances the health and wellbeing of thousands of people in communities across the UK.

All pets who are enrolled in the scheme are temperamentassessed and are accompanied by a qualified volunteer. Storm spent time with staff and students in both our Junior and Senior Schools on a weekly basis. RGS Equity, Diversity and Inclusion: RGS culture week

A group of passionate pupils formed the student EDI Committee at RGS, with the vision of educating and empowering their peers on the importance of equality and equity, diversity and inclusion in society.

The students and staff organised a week-long, vibrant celebration of the range of world cultures here at RGS, celebrating our community's diverse backgrounds and ethnicity. Staff and students alike were blown away by the participation throughout the whole week.

Kicking the week off with stalls, from saree draping to calligraphy in different languages as well as the outdoor game Kho, which was played in PE lessons later in the week following students' request.

The movie screening piqued the interest of many and the cultural food menu throughout the week in the dining hall excited students each day as they tried new flavours from around the world.

The dance show towards the end of the week was a big hit, with a bustling crowd of students supporting the amazing dancers with styles from different nations, including a group from the Junior School. Friday saw a traditional Agora Gig, but with a cultural twist, with music from Colombia, Sudan and India being performed; including a performance by our school's Ceilidh Band.

In a highlight of our neurodiversity celebration week, Alex Partridge, founder of Unilad, Ladbible and the chart-topping ADHD Chatter podcast, captivated RGS Senior School students in an extended assembly.

Alex shared his journey to being diagnosed with autism and ADHD. He gave insights into his early experiences of anxiety at school and dealing with over-stimulation, as well as his helpful revelation that 'masking' to hide who he really was affected his self-esteem and consumed his energy.

"A day spent trying to not be yourself is a day wasted, just be yourself!"

Despite many years wondering why he was different and trying not to focus on the negative stereotypes attached to neurodivergence, Alex has since found comfort in the validation of his diagnosis. Learning to refocus on his vast number of individual strengths, from resilience to spotting patterns which others miss, spring boarded his creative career including launching the chart-topping podcast 'ADHD Chatter'.

"The moment I stopped trying to fit in, was the exact moment I started to thrive."

Alex went on to a small session with a select group of students, to explain how he now manages his personal organisation to maximise productivity, giving real-life hacks which he may have previously felt ashamed to reveal. Everyone left with a better understanding of themselves and others, and the message that our community thrives when we have different types of thinkers.



Connecting with RGS History

The annual RGS Founder's Service at Newcastle Cathedral connects Year 7 students with the nearly 500 year history of the RGS. For a largely secular school, where we celebrate the diversity of those of all faiths and none, whatever personal faith our students may or may not have, it's important to be able to engage with, to understand and to be tolerant of the faiths of others.

A member of the congregation emailed afterwards:

"The Founder's Service was absolutely incredible. All the symphonia, brass ensemble and intermediate choir all joined together to create an amazing performance in front of all of Year 7 and several classmates. The Headmaster and many others made speeches about the RGS's history and how it was formed. And then there were points when we played songs such as jubilee deo canon which the Intermediate choir sung to. All the music was played spot on even though some of it was complex. All the music was beautiful, and all the audience was entranced by the whole thing. I think the whole thing was a complete success and we should do things like it again."

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Olympic Endeavour

In july the RGS community came together to celebrate Old Novo Kate Waugh's tremendous Olympic debut as she finished 15th in the women's Triathlon. Thank you to everyone who joined us to watch the race unfold live from the 2024 Paris Olympic alongside Kate's friends, former teachers, and fellow Old Novos.

There was an electric atmosphere in the Agora as Kate crossed the finish line and cheers from the crowd as her Team GB team mates Beth Potter won Bronze, and Georgia Taylor-Brown finished 5th.

It was great to welcome BBC Radio Newcastle, BBC Look North, ITV Tyne Tees and Hits Radio North East to the school to capture the atmosphere and speak to Angela Ponton, Director of Sports at RGS, about her memories of Kate as a dedicated and determined student.

We are immensely proud of Kate, who is a truly inspirational Novo for our students – especially those who want to follow in her footsteps.

Holocaust Memorial Assembly

To recognise Holocaust Memorial Day we welcomed Deanna Van der Velde to share the story of how the freedom and rights of her family in the 1930s, along with thousands of other Jews, were gradually taken away from them. Students listened intently to her description of how citizenship was stripped, businesses were boycotted and lives were torn apart, as Deanna encouraged our students to think about the experience of Jewish children in Germany during the Second World War. Joining us as Mother of two Old Novocastrians and whose parents married at the Jewish Synagogue just down the road from RGS on Eskdale Terrace, this gave a relatable perspective from within our community as to the scale of the impact and the fragility of freedom.

Swimwear for All

Our latest initiative has been reviewing our swimwear provision to ensure swimming is as accessible as possible to all students.

New items have been added to our sports kit list, stating that burkinis and hijabs are a recognised part of our uniform alongside swimming costumes, trunks, shorts and triathlon suits.

Similarly, we have introduced RGS 'SoulCaps' for students who need to keep afro-textured hair (and other hair with volume) dry. These additions are in keeping with our gender-neutral uniform, catering for different preferences and celebrating different cultures in our school community.

International Women's Day

From Stowell's House assembly, capturing inspiring female figures in our students' lives, to an International Women's Day (IWD) themed Agora Gig, we celebrated this most important of international days. Students also wrote personal poems and filmed a video for their peers. There was a powerful message delivered in assembly, by one of the first cohort of girls to walk through the Eskdale Terrace school, when the school became co-educational back in 2001. Helena Strettle-Davis shared her RGS experience and beyond:

'I didn't appreciate how much the next two years in RGS Sixth Form would shape my entire life. Crucially, how my experiences, as a minority at that time, would set me up for a world of work in ways I could not imagine. As individuals, it is vital we recognise and confront inequality, to create a world where acceptance and empathy triumph over division. So here at school, and in any walk of life, be a cheerleader for anyone you see on the outside."

"Welcome them in. Celebrate their difference. Let's make being unique, or, otherness, the norm here."

Agora Gigs

The termly Agora Gig displayed a wide variety of music and skills ranging from solo pieces to band performances. At every gig, a crowd gathers in the Agora to listen to our brave musicians get on stage and perform the piece of their choice. This year, we have had several genres of music as well including pop, rock, classical and even musical numbers. A highlight of this series would be the Culture Day Agora Gig where we had music and dances from several different countries representing the wide variety of culture in the RGS. Whether you are joining the crowd or just passing by, these gigs are always there to provide a bit of entertainment and joy as music is something we all love. These performances provide an opportunity for anyone to perform in an informal setting and next year, we hope to see even more new talents emerge!

Senior School House Music

As always RGS radiates the warmth of our school community through our annual singing Christmas card, however this year had an even extra special dynamic...

The mighty 'Kat's Chorus' (led by the formidable Mrs Clappison) spread its wings beyond the RGS school gates in this year's unique Christmas collaboration. A partnership which has blossomed over a number of years between RGS and nine primary schools in the west of Newcastle (the Outer West Learning Trust), sparked the genesis of the 2023 Big Festive Sing.

Earlier this year RGS music teachers delivered workshops to 1,500 children in the west Newcastle partnership schools on the theme of the song, 'Best Day of My Life'. Interesting conversations around what the best day of their lives would be were explored and a common theme emerged: music and its power to uplift, football – and more specifically Newcastle United – and the sense of belonging in our great city. This led to there being only one location suitable to fulfil the brief – St James' Park!

RGS believes great things are possible when schools work together for the greater good of the region, through sharing moments of joy, inspiration and innovation. Our collective efforts were nationally recognised when RGS won the national 'Independent School of the Year' in particular recognition for our outstanding educational partnerships. This accolade was a driving catalyst to produce this year's video as one which represents our integral, wider community; including our commercial partners who provide essential funds to support these important projects and programmes which benefits young people across the North East.



Choir and Orchestra Paris Tour

This year Biology students engaged with nature firsthand at the Farne Islands, while Year 12 students learned about environmental history at Newcastle University. Whether it's visiting Newcastle Crown Court for a lesson in the legal system or exploring the publishing industry with professionals from New Writing North, these real-world connections not only deepen understanding but also build critical thinking and problem-solving skills.

This year we also used learning opportunities to foster creativity and collaboration, with students participating in activities like Dungeons & Dragons to build teamwork and imagination, or engaging in Scalextric engineering challenges that showcase innovation and technical skills. All these activities underscore our dedication to nurturing well-rounded individuals with a lifelong love of learning, preparing students for a successful future, both academically and in their personal lives. Learning through Languages: a cultural journey at the Hancock Museum

Year 7 students had an exciting day at the Hancock Museum, exploring both Ancient and Modern Languages. **William G** shared his experience:

"I was really excited for this trip because I love learning about different languages, and I believe the best way to truly understand them is to experience their culture firsthand.

"Throughout the day, each class rotated through a series of engaging activities, including German worksheets, a word-collecting trail, and cracking the code of Egyptian hieroglyphics.

"One of the highlights was going upstairs to identify animals based on their German names, which helped us learn about word endings and proper tenses in a fun way.

"The final challenge was translating tough Latin inscriptions from Hadrian's Wall. It was exciting to realise we already knew more vocabulary than we expected from our Latin lessons!

"By the end of the day, we were exhausted, but we had learned so much and had an amazing time!"

This hands-on experience not only deepened students' understanding of languages but also highlighted how culture and history are intertwined with language learning.

Bringing History to Life: the story of Thomas Becket

Year 7 students dove into the fascinating history of Thomas Becket and his tumultuous relationship with Henry II for their latest History project. After conducting thorough research, four groups wrote and performed their own plays, creatively showcasing what they had learned.

Students embraced the chance to get into character, bringing historical figures to life in a fun and engaging way. This dynamic approach not only deepened their understanding of the topic but also added an exciting, hands-on element to their learning experience. The performances highlighted the power of storytelling in making history memorable and engaging.

Exploring Environmental History at Newcastle University

A group of Year 12 students visited Newcastle University for a History Discovery Day, hosted in the stunning Armstrong Building, named after Old Novocastrian Lord William Armstrong. The event offered students a firsthand look at what it's like to study History at university, with engaging lectures and seminars led by expert faculty.

The day's theme, "Historical Perspectives on Humanity and Nature," focused on the vital role of environmental history across different periods. Students explored fascinating topics such as the links between disease, environmental factors, and early 20th-century tuberculosis treatments, as well as the evolving politics of environmentalism inside and outside Parliament. This enriching experience deepened students' understanding of how history shapes our relationship with the natural world.



Battlefields Trip: a journey through history and its lasting impact

The Year 10 Battlefields Trip provided students with a profound opportunity to explore the key sites of World War I, gaining firsthand insight into how history has shaped the world today. The journey began with an overnight ferry, leading to an immersive exploration of the Ypres Salient. Highlights included visits to Tyne Cot Cemetery, Langemark, the Cloth Hall Museum, and the deeply moving Menin Gate, where students witnessed the Last Post ceremony – a powerful reflection on the sacrifice of past generations.

The second day brought the group to the Somme battlefields, where they visited iconic sites such as Newfoundland Park, the Thiepval Memorial, and Notre Dame de Lorette Cemetery. These visits allowed students to reflect on the enormous scale of the war and its human cost, fostering a deeper understanding of its impact.

The final day was spent exploring Ypres, giving students time to contemplate how these historic events continue to influence today's world.

Hustings at RGS: shaping critical thinkers and future voters



Students at RGS were given a unique opportunity to dive deep into the UK political system by directly engaging with Newcastle North's Parliamentary candidates ahead of the general election. A group of Year 10 and Year 12 students participated in a lively hustings event, held in the Miller Theatre, where four of the seven local candidates presented their party's vision and policies.

This event was not just about listening – it was a chance for students to sharpen their critical thinking skills. The candidates fielded challenging, pre-submitted questions from a Year 12 host, offering students the chance to compare party stances on important issues. While none of the students in attendance were yet of voting age, many were particularly interested in Labour's proposal to lower the voting age to 16. The event sparked thoughtful discussions on how political parties can better engage younger generations and left students better equipped to navigate and evaluate political discourse. This hands-on experience of democracy in action provided invaluable insights into the political landscape, encouraging the students to become informed, active citizens.



Budding Biologists: bringing learning to life beyond the classroom

Year 10 biologists stepped beyond the classroom to explore the stunning natural beauty of the Farne Islands, taking full advantage of the rich Northumbrian landscape right on our doorstep. This immersive field trip brought textbook biology to life as students witnessed the remarkable biodiversity of bird and seal species in their natural habitats.

From puffins to grey seals, the experience offered a unique, hands-on opportunity to study ecosystems up close. Blessed with perfect weather, the trip allowed students to deepen their understanding of wildlife and ecology in a way that no classroom lesson could match, making the wonders of biology both tangible and unforgettable.

Unveiling the Secrets of the River Derwent: a dynamic fieldwork adventure

As part of their GCSE course, students embarked on an exciting Geography Physical Fieldwork trip to the River Derwent. Over several days, four classes explored three diverse sites along the river, immersing themselves in hands-on data collection.

From measuring the river's width and depth to gauging its velocity and examining the bedload, students became real-life river detectives. Back in the classroom, they analysed their findings, uncovering fascinating insights into how the river's characteristics transform as it journeys downstream. This adventure brought the textbook to life, turning theory into thrilling exploration!





The RGS Economics Society (EconSoc) continued to thrive under the outstanding student leadership of **Jacob C** and **Kunjal G**. The active society was buzzing with insightful talks and unrivalled access to prominent economics experts, providing students with valuable knowledge and context to help them prepare for their A-Level exams. These guest speakers, each an expert in their field, have shared their experiences, discussed macro and microeconomic concepts, and explained the real-world applications of economics across various industries.

Rajat Samal, Global Operations Director at Tfp & Tfp Hydrogen, kicked off with a talk on the economics of operations. He delved into the different stages of production – from suppliers to manufacturing to customers – highlighting the costs involved and demonstrating the practical applications of microeconomics in business operations.

Old Novo Nicholas Fawcett, Director at BlackRock Investment Institute, brought his expertise in global financial markets to the table. His career insights, including his time at Goldman Sachs and the Bank of England, offered students a deep dive into financial economics and investment strategies.

Sofia De Martin, from the Centre for Economics and Business Research, discussed how economists measure the economic costs of social issues such as women's health and minority representation. Her talk helped students grasp the broader societal impacts of economic policy and the role of social economics.



Old Novo Dr Amrit Ray, former head of R&D at Pfizer, shared his extensive experience in private equity and healthcare economics. His perspective on the role of innovation in economic growth provided a comprehensive look at the intersection of health economics and business.

Claus Vistesen, Chief Eurozone Economist at Pantheon Macroeconomics, provided an in-depth analysis of Brexit and the Eurozone. By discussing global shocks and policy responses in the UK and Eurozone, he helped students understand the intersection of macroeconomics, policymaking, and regional economic integration. Geoff Riley, Former Head of Economics at RGS Newcastle and Eton, and co-founder of tutor2u, visited twice to speak about UK macroeconomic trends and policies, particularly in the context of the upcoming elections. His talk offered students insight into the broader economic landscape and how policy changes can influence national and international economic conditions.

Nicola Coleman, Audit Partner at UNW, gave an engaging talk about accountancy and the critical role of auditing in the UK economy. She provided valuable insights into career paths within accountancy, helping students understand its connection to both micro and macroeconomic theory.

Richard Hutton, Chief Financial Officer at Greggs, discussed macroeconomic trends such as high inflation and their impact on business operations. His insights into how inflation affects Greggs' sales and costs were particularly useful for students understanding the challenges businesses face in a volatile economic environment.

Dr Natalia Blagburn, Venture Capital Investor at Mercia Asset Management, shared her experiences in venture capital, explaining the economic principles behind nurturing growing companies, making investments, and fostering successful exits. Her talk gave students a unique perspective on the financial sector and investment strategies.

Old Novo Pia Gupta, now studying at King's College London, spoke on the 2024 macroeconomic outlook, summarizing key events from 2023. Her analysis of critical indicators and real-world case studies gave students practical tools for tackling their exams.

Vinay Sagar, a Durham University undergraduate, shared insights into behavioural and experimental economics, giving students a glimpse into how psychological factors influence economic decision-making and markets. **Mohammad Jamei**, *Director of Economic Policy at CBI*, discussed his diverse career path and the role of economics in policy development. His talk offered students a broader view of the different career avenues available with a background in economics.

Geoff Westmoreland and James Pomeroy,

Senior Economists from HSBC, provided insights into corporate banking and a global economic update. Their session helped students understand the practical challenges businesses face and the macroeconomic forces that shape financial decisions.

Old Novo Gianfranco Rosolia,

current Apple Inc. executive, shared his experiences working at a tech giant, offering a unique perspective on innovation and global business strategy in the context of economics.

Oliver Millican, Chairman of Bute Energy, gave a joint talk with EngSoc about energy economics, highlighting the role of energy in economic development and policy.

Edoardo Palombo, an economist at Deloitte with a PhD in Economics, gave a talk on the latest economic research and methodologies, equipping students with analytical tools for their exams.

Josie Anderson, Managing Economist at CEBR, discussed her career journey and what it's like to work as an economist, providing students with a personal perspective on pursuing a career in economics.

These sessions not only offered real-world insights into economics, but also provided students with crucial context for their A-Level exams, helping them understand how economic theory applies to current events and global trends.

Dungeons & Dragons

Students share their experience of D&D club, supported by the renowned Dungeon Master (DM) and Old Novo Chris Hately, where they ran a detailed campaign full of thrilling adventures and unnerving monsters:

"Each and every time he runs D&D with us his storytelling, world building and imagination as a DM just adds to the experience of playing with him. Our hearts are still racing at the thought of four creatures (two of which being an efreeti and fire elemental) grappling the avatar of a god!"

Editor's note – We had to look this up! Efreeti are powerful, intelligent fire genies capable of magic and wish-granting. Fire Elementals are primal, elemental beings made of fire, embodying destruction and chaos. Both creatures can be major threats or interesting allies, depending on the story being told in the game!

Scalextrics

We took two teams from Year 8 and Year 9 to the 'Scalextrics 4 Schools' final at Silverstone, where our Team Velocity won best engineered car and **Edison W** won racer of the year.

Students worked on the car for the whole year as part of RGS's Scalextric co-curricular club. Below are some of their highlights from the experience:

"We stuck to our roles and played an important role in the success of our team. During the competition, the judges were very pleased with our engineering used in the car from seeing our pit display and our portfolio.

"We learnt a lot from different teams including different approaches to making our car and even some racing tips. One of the best parts of the trip was getting pointers from some professionals and of course seeing Silverstone."





Project Art: a creative journey at the Baltic Centre for Contemporary Art

A group of students from across Senior School who are passionate about the creative arts, were selected to visit the 'Project Art' exhibition at the Baltic Centre for Contemporary Art, ahead of its move to Copenhagen. The programme manager led an insightful tour, explaining the vision behind the exhibition, which showcases the work of a collective of neurodiverse artists.

After the tour, students had the opportunity to collaborate on a giant canvas, immersing themselves in the vibrant project space. Digital Solutions: exploring technology's impact with Lancaster University

Year 10, 12, and 13 RGS Computer Science students were visited by experts from Lancaster University, who shared valuable insights into the advantages and disadvantages of technology. This visit complemented the students' curriculum, connecting with key topics in GCSE and A-Level studies, such as the impact of technology, data protection risks, and the consequences of tech use. Students also explored how to streamline workflows and improve efficiency, gaining a deeper understanding of the realworld challenges and opportunities in the digital landscape.

Careers in Publishing: insights from industry experts

We were thrilled to welcome representatives from New Writing North and Hachette Books to speak with our Year 10 and Year 12 students about the diverse opportunities in publishing. Author Daniel Tawse shared their journey from drama to creative writing, offering insights into the challenges of promoting and editing multiple books simultaneously. Publisher Isobel Freyley discussed their own career path since leaving school, highlighting the variety of roles available within the publishing industry.

Students engaged in a lively Q&A session, asking about the qualifications and skills required to pursue careers in writing and publishing. The event provided invaluable guidance for aspiring authors and industry professionals alike.

Insight into the Legal System

Our Forensic Psychology Complementary Studies class visited Newcastle Crown Court to gain a deeper understanding of the legal system in England and how criminal cases are handled at the Crown Court level.

Students were able to meet like-minded peers, discover hidden talents, and learn how these activities complement and enrich their academic experience.

From Newcastle to Tokyo, they set the scene in various locations, adding new characters and storylines to explore the complexities of Christopher's world.

This hands-on, interactive learning not only brought the novel to life but also raised awareness about how to support peers who may experience similar challenges, fostering empathy and understanding among students.







Year 8 Girls Celebrate Women in STEM

A group of Year 8 girls from RGS, along with students from local schools including Benfield, Consett Academy, Kepier, Kenton, Kings Priory, Sacred Heart, and Westfield, gathered to celebrate the achievements of women in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics). The event, inspired by Ada Lovelace – the first computer programmer – offered a unique opportunity to hear from women who have carved successful careers in these fields.



The day featured a series of insightful talks from a diverse group of professionals:

Janet Onyia, from Opencast Software, shared her journey, highlighting the wide range of opportunities in STEM, from designing graphics for the Barbie movie to developing cutting-edge technology used in sports and exercise to monitor posture and movement.

Old Novo Emilia Ward, Senior Value Communications Writer in pharmaceuticals, spoke about her role in getting one of the Covid vaccines approved and how she integrates her background in English literature into the world of STEM.

Emma Henderson and Leanne Dee, from TSG, discussed their transitions into STEM careers, showcasing how diverse career paths can lead to fulfilling roles in the field, even from seemingly unrelated industries.

Lonie Sebagh, currently on the SCITT programme with our Maths department, shared her experience working in cybersecurity and as a coding instructor for Code First Girls, illustrating the various ways to enter STEM careers.

The event provided invaluable industry insights and inspiration, empowering students to see the vast potential of STEM careers and the diverse pathways to success within these fields.



The Art and Science of Drawing

Year 8 and Year 9 Art students explored the world of Product Design in a hands-on workshop led by Old Novo Richard Malcom, Senior Lecturer at Nottingham Trent University. With 20 years of industry experience designing everything from power tools to headphones, hearing aids, and fire service equipment, Richard brought a wealth of knowledge back to the RGS Art Department – where his journey first began.

The day started with the seemingly simple task of drawing a cuboid, but soon evolved into the greater challenge of designing a sports trainer. To their surprise, students were prohibited from using rulers – forcing them to draw straight lines freehand and estimate angles rather than measure them precisely. The exercise demonstrated how creativity and design can thrive even with the most basic of shapes, and the students learned firsthand the precision and imagination required in the world of product design.

Linguistic Triumph

Six teams of Year 9 linguists and code-breakers from RGS took part in the prestigious GCHQ National Language Competition, facing a series of challenges that tested their skills in both European languages and less commonly taught dialects, as well as even invented languages. Throughout the competition, students "captured flags" to earn points, all while climbing the ranks on a national leaderboard.

Thanks to their dedication and teamwork, one of our teams amassed an impressive 8,865 points, securing victory as regional champions. The competition saw participation from over 500 schools across the UK, with students devoting several hours of their co-curricular time to cracking codes and solving language-based puzzles. This remarkable achievement highlights not only the linguistic talent at RGS but also the commitment and problem-solving abilities of our students.

Team 39457B triumphed as Tournament Champions and advanced directly to the National Finals, while Team 39475D earned the Judges Award for their thorough research and welldocumented portfolio. Team 39475C won the Skills Award for their outstanding solo performance, thanks to a highly effective catapult design. Team 39475G performed well but fell short of advancing to the later rounds, and Team 39475H impressed with their functional yet visually appealing robot design, featuring a clever face constructed from robot parts.

The competition tasks included designing, building, and operating robots, as well as documenting the entire process in a portfolio. Students drew from various subjects, including art, computer science, and engineering, and collaborated effectively, combining their strengths to solve problems. Their preparation, spanning a month of intense work, involved adapting to a new game each season and testing various mechanisms under tight time constraints. Despite limited practice time on the game field, the teams demonstrated exceptional teamwork and adaptability, learning from both successes and setbacks.

As the competition season progressed, RGS's robotics teams confidently interacted with judges, sharing their team roles, lessons learned, and the methods they used to stay connected and efficient despite their busy schedules. With regional competitions ahead in December, the teams are refining their strategies and designs in hopes of advancing to the National Finals. In a thrilling first for RGS, four teams, made up of 21 students from Year 10, Year 11, and Year 12, qualified for the VEX Robotics National Finals. Competing alongside nearly 60 schools, they put their robots to the test in a series of timed challenges and alliance-based tasks. The teams developed their robots, refined their tactics, and tackled both technical and strategic aspects of the competition, with some students even taking on multiple roles, from coding to construction and documentation.

Reflecting on their experience, the teams celebrated their growth and achievements. Tanish K, from Team 39457B, shared, "Our goal was to showcase the dedication and innovation we put into our robot design. Beating the #1 and #2 ranked teams in qualifying matches and placing in the top 8% was a huge accomplishment." Emil B, also from Team 39457B, added, "After finishing Day 1 with a low ranking, we worked late into the night to upgrade our robot. Our hard work paid off, and we saw significant improvements." Nina L, from Team 39475D, remarked, "It was our first time at this event, and even though we didn't perform as we hoped, we learned invaluable skills that will help us in robotics and beyond."

The competition not only tested their technical skills but also fostered valuable life lessons, including teamwork, resilience, and creative problem-solving. As the teams continue to develop their robots and strategies, they are already looking ahead to future competitions with renewed enthusiasm and confidence.

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Private View: celebrating artistic talent

The Private View exhibition was an inspiring event that showcased the incredible talent of our Art exam students. Peers, families, and teachers were invited to explore a diverse range of pieces, each reflecting the students' unique creativity and vision.

The exhibition was a celebration of artistic expression, with guests engaging in insightful conversations with the students about the inspiration behind their work and the creative process involved. It was a wonderful opportunity for the students to share their journey and for visitors to appreciate the depth of thought and skill behind each piece.



Inspired by Life of Pi

Our Year 7 students visited the Life of Pi production at Newcastle Theatre Royal to enrich their English studies. The trip provided an exciting opportunity to experience the live dramatisation of the novel, sparking inspiration for their classroom work.

As part of their current curriculum, students are exploring the differences between the conventions of drama and novels. Following the performance, they will engage in both analytical and creative writing tasks based on the script, deepening their understanding of how stories transform across mediums.

Specialised Support for Future Medics: MMI practice at RGS

Thirty one of our Upper Sixth Form students, including 6 talented individuals invited from our Partnership schools, participated in practice Multiple Mini Interviews (MMI), a unique opportunity designed to simulate the rigorous interview process they may face when applying to Medicine, Dentistry, or Veterinary programmes.

RGS is one of the few schools nationwide to offer this specialised support, equipping students with the essential skills and experience needed to excel in their interviews. During the MMI, students rotate through a series of stations, each focusing on different aspects of the interview process. These stations include role plays, numeracy tasks, and in-depth interviews on topics such as medical ethics, professional conduct, personal qualities, and motivation to pursue their chosen career.

Immediately following the event, our internal team of interviewers provides detailed verbal feedback to each student, pinpointing their strengths and areas for further improvement. While the day is intense, it offers invaluable experience, helping students refine their interview techniques and build the confidence needed to succeed in highly competitive medical, dental, and veterinary interviews.



RGS Profit for Purpose & Winterwonderland: a celebration of <u>entrepreneurship</u> & charity

In an inspiring display of creativity and philanthropy, RGS Year 8 students took part in the Profit for Purpose initiative, where they pitched innovative fundraising ideas to a panel of "RGS Dragons." A total of 33 groups presented their plans, from cake sales, to fundraising games, to bauble crafts. All teams successfully secured 'investment' to bring their ideas to life, with the RGS Dragons offering valuable business insight and feedback. The project not only showcased students' entrepreneurial skills but also highlighted the importance of using business for social good.

Following the pitches, students brought their ideas to life at their fundraising stalls, which ran at RGS's magical Winterwonderland. This annual event, organized by RGS students, transformed the school grounds into a festive hub, featuring a Christmas market, Art of Hope display, games, and seasonal attractions.





New Parents Connect


We welcomed all our new parents to our annual start of term curry night, for an opportunity to meet our friendly Senior Leadership Team and fellow new families over some tasty cuisine.

It's been another busy and exciting year in the RGS Archives, using our wonderful collections to bring to life the history of the school.

Our collections have grown – we took in 56 new donations of material to the Archive, 25 of which from Old Novocastrians. This included a route map and film from the May 1990 RGS & Barnardos Roman Run. This was a charity run pitching a team of Old Novos against RGS staff, running from Westminster to Gateshead International Stadium!

A highlight was our extra-special Remembrance Service in November 2023. With help from Old Novocastrian David Goldwater, we researched and produced a new Roll of Honour for 17 – previously unsung – Old Novos who fell during WWI, WWII and Old Novos who died on active military service post-1945. Two beautiful new hand-carved wooden plaques were unveiled on Remembrance Day, installed on our 100year-old Memorial Organ.



We also celebrated the enduring legacy of NOVO magazine, an RGS student-led publication that dates back to 1885! A new vinyl wall display was installed in school, showcasing the striking magazine covers over time.

A wonderful annual event run by the RGS Junior School is the Year 6 WWII Day in May. In between visits to Victoria Tunnel and other activities, students visited the Archives to view some original documents and objects. They learnt all about the experience of RGS students who were evacuated to Penrith during WWII.

Students used the archives in some really creative ways this year. One Year 7 English class were given a selection of archive items to inspire some fantastic creative writing. Year 12 Drama students took the archives as inspiration for their Devising Performance coursework, producing a fantastic drama piece. A letter from the archive was the source for a Drama Club project earlier in the year too. Finally, Junior HistSoc students have spent months researching and creating some brilliant posters all about different aspects of school history, which went on display in the Main Hall.



<u>Social</u> Impact





The foundations of our sense of social responsibility belong in our 500 year-old history; Thomas Horsley, the original settler of RGS pledged his legacy in 1525 to create the city's first learning institution.
