





Since COVID, chronic absenteeism has increased substantially. Up to 30% of Minnesota students are considered chronically absent. The criteria for being considered chronically absent is missing 10% or more of school days. request sessions with students during their core classes. Sessions last from 45-60 minutes and, unless needs require otherwise, are held weekly.





RMS-CES | POINTS OF PRIDE Language Arts with Udalla


Seventh grade Language Arts students have recently completed the dramatization of A Christmas Carol. Lessons include an essay comparing and contrasting A Christmas Carol dramatization to The Muppets Christmas Carol movie. Students also participated in creating "chains" similar to those carried by Jacob Marley - Scrooge's old business partner. Marley carries chains that represent his greed, wealth, and other wrongdoings he committed. Seventh grade students created "chains" in areas of their lives that are weighing them down or in which they might struggle. Examples included - being kind towards others, stop procrastinating, less screen time, respectful towards adults, read more, and many more. Their "chains" will be destroyed in a special ceremony during class after winter break.





Seventh grade students are also required to independently read a certain number of books throughout the year. For each book they read - they get a star. Stars include the students name, the title of the book, and a rating of the book. Students also have the option of making their star sparkle and shine with glitter. The Language Arts classroom will soon be completely filled with stars! Many students have completed their reading goals and are going above and beyond.
