FAMILY & CONSUMER SCIENCE

All Family/Consumer Science courses meet the Fine and Practical Arts graduation requirement. Courses cover life skills and family relations, foods and nutrition, child development and careers.

EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION 101 (ECE 101) -099080GUIDANCE STRATEGIES FOR YOUNG CHILDREN (ECE 103) – 099090 (2 Period- Block)



1.0 credit (0.5 credit for ECE 101 and 0.5 credit for ECE 103)

This introduction to Early Childhood Education course is designed to provide the skills needed to secure employment as a teaching assistant in a childcare center, preschool, or elementary school. It focuses on ages birth to eight. It explores theories, applications, goals, and techniques as well as factors that influence behavioral expectations of children. Students enrolled in the program receive training in the classroom setting and in a licensed childcare facility. Learning throughout the semester is focused on the eight key areas of professional knowledge: Child growth and development; Health, nutrition, and safety; Developmentally appropriate practices; Guidance; Family and community relationships; Diversity; Professionalism; Administration and supervision. Students may earn 0.5 credit for ECE 101 and 0.5 credit for Guidance Strategies for Young Children (ECE 103).

**Students will need to register for both of these classes for the semester for CTE reporting purposes.

CULINARY NUTRITION - 7608

11, 12 .5 credit

The purpose of this course is to develop lifelong, healthy individuals with an understanding of healthy nutritious preparation techniques utilizing various resources and skills. Emphasis is placed on implementing healthy nutritional choices, preparing nutrient-dense seasonal foods, sports nutrition, exploring careers related to culinary nutrition, and practicing wise consumer decisions.

LIFE MANAGEMENT - 099190

11, 12 .5 credit

Students will develop decision-making skills to become educated consumers with an understanding and academic knowledge of consumer resources and financial organizations. The course focuses on personal and family resources, job and career, personal and family finances, and wellness. (Relevant topics include: independent living, healthy lifestyles, career research and job portfolios, personal financial literacy, investments, credit, insurance, leasing vs. purchasing of autos).

Students in the following classes are given the opportunity to observe and work in the Early Learning Center:

Additional credit is given for students working in the Early Learning Center during ECE Practicum.
