### Attendance

Students who live in communities with high level of poverty are *four times more* likely to be chronically absent than others often for reasons beyond their control, such as unstable housing, unreliable transportation, and lack of access to healthcare.

### Ongoing concerns and focus areas

- Collaboration with Magistrates
- Absences are high before and after holidays and breaks
- Absences are high during inclement weather
- Chronically absent students (Excused/Unexcused)
- John Harris and Camp Curtin continue to be a focus

### **Strategies**

- Principals, Assistant Principals, Director of Student Support Services and the Assistant Superintendent receive daily and weekly attendance reports
- Bi-weekly attendance meetings at each school required
- Monthly attendance meetings with school teams and the Director of Student Support Services,
   Director of Enrollment and Child Accounting to address attendance concerns and errors
- Student Attendance Improvement Plans and meetings
- Citations are being processed
- Attendance policies have been updated
- Procedures and protocols have been standardized and enforced (document shared-TEAMS)
- Parent contacts by teachers for students who are absent are expected and documented (OnHands)
- Counselors conducted classroom meetings with students to discuss the importance of attendance at the elementary and middle schools
- Harrisburg Virtual Learning Academy- K-12 as an option
- High School Student Focus group

### School Discipline

Our goal is to create physically safe and emotionally supportive environments for all students by using evidence based approaches that are focused on building and repairing relationships, while still holding students accountable for their actions.

### **Noticings**

- Suspensions and incidents have increased each year at Camp Curtin
- Increase at John Harris from previous year 23-24
- Significant decreases at Ben Franklin, Melrose, Rowland, Scott, Cougar Academy
- Slight increase at SciTech
- Slight decrease at Marshall Math Science, Downey and Foose from the previous year

### Strategies

- Suspension reports are generated bi-weekly for review
- Discipline data reports are sent to building leaders monthly
- Alternative interventions to suspensions are reviewed by school teams and implemented according to individual needs
- Use of Second Steps curriculum to teach lessons on SEL
- Fidelity checks for implementation of Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS), updating the Multi-tiered System of Support (MTSS) model, Restorative Practices (RP) and Responsive Classroom (RC)
- Individual and small group support facilitated by School Counselors, Social Workers and community partners
- Updated Student Code of Conduct, Parent and Student Handbook

### Information on Graduation rate and Noticings

- Data includes summer graduations prior to October 1
- Graduation rate is a 4 year cohort -based on 9th grade entry date
- Four year data is what is used and enforced in reporting by the state

- Our graduation rate has decreased since 21-22
- Enrollment increases at one school which is impacts the rate
- It appears we are only graduating ⅓ of our students in outplacements
- There may be slight changes in 23-24 data, attributions must be reviewed and updated
