Mayfield Day

On Saturday 24th June we hosted over 1,000 people in our marquee for our annual Speech and Prize Giving ceremony. It was a wonderful occasion, and followed by a delicious BBQ, before the girls took part in track and field events in the afternoon as part of our Inter-House Athletics.

A number of records were broken; Emilia in Year 8 recorded a 4.2m jump in the Long Jump, while Deborah, also in Year 8, equalled the High Jump record at 1.4m, before breaking the 100m record with a time of 13.72s. Many congratulations to Glennie, who were overall winners.

The girls also showed off their amazing baking skills in the Mayfield Day Cake Competition with their creations to celebrate the School's 150th Anniversary.









Foundation Day

On Foundation Day in October, we celebrated the first 150 years of Mayfield! Over the course of the day over 400 acorns were planted - one for every girl in the School.

We began with the unveiling of an aweinspiring gingerbread model of the Old Palace, surrounded by a crowd of very smartly dressed gingerbread Mayfield girls. The project was the idea of the Head Girl Elizabeth and the model painstakingly created by our amazing pastry chef Megan. The gingerbread girls were painted by girls in tutor time and the best - or most interesting versions put forward for display (the rest were eaten of course!).

We welcomed Fr Richard Finn OP for Mass and this was followed by a series of Inter-House competitions, including General Knowledge, Music and Hockey. It was a day filled with fun and laughter!





Mayfield shortlisted for ISP Award

Mayfield was delighted to be shortlisted in the Independent Girls' School of the Year category by Independent School Parent for the second year running. The purpose of the awards is to highlight the excellence of the student experience that the UK's amazing independent schools provide.



IWD 2023

International Women's Day (IWD) is held on 8th March every year to celebrate women's achievements, raise awareness of discrimination and to drive gender parity. This year we held a special assembly to highlight some of these issues, featuring guest speaker OC Katherine Janikoun, Head of Product Engineering at Legal and General. During her talk on 'Working in the Male Dominated Environment of Technology' she gave great advice on how to hold your own in a male dominated environment and talked about inspiring women emerging in the world of technology.

GCSE results

This year, Mayfield celebrated an impressive set of GCSE results, with one in four of grades awarded being the top grade (grade 9).

Mayfield's Year 11 girls achieved exceptional results in Further Maths and IGCSE English, with over half being awarded the top grade 9. In addition, 43% of students taking History were awarded a grade 9. Students also excelled in Science, with over 25% of the cohort awarded a grade 9 in Biology, Chemistry, and Physics.

Jonathan Forster said: "I am delighted by these exceptional results, especially so given our Year 11 girls' education was severely affected by the pandemic. There were 15 subjects where over half the students achieved an 8 or 9, including modern languages, creative and performing arts. These results are testimony to the hard work of our girls and the support and encouragement they have received from their teachers."

Katie and Katrina both achieved the top grade in all 11 of their GCSE subjects. Katrina, who is a regular at Mayfield's Algebra Club, said: "I was overjoyed when I received my results. I would love to say a big thank you to my family and friends for supporting me throughout, and to all the teachers who have helped me through my GCSE journey at Mayfield, always there to answer my questions and mark my essays. It's a lot of hard work, but I know it has paid off!"

Rosie, who won an award at last year's Model United Nations Conference in Poland for her debating skills and had a leading role in Mayfield's recent production of 'The Lion, The Witch and The Wardrobe', achieved nine grade 9s and two grade 8s. She said: "I joined Mayfield in Year 7 with a hunger for knowledge and an enthusiasm to learn. Throughout my five years at the school, I have been supported through my academics, encouraged to pursue a myriad of opportunities, and inspired by the excellent teachers and staff. I am thrilled with my exam results and I am also so grateful for the person Mayfield has helped me to become: a woman with an inquisitive mind, who can be empathetic but is also unafraid to take up space and share her views on the world."

Twins, Francesca and Sophie, who joined Mayfield in Year 10, achieved a clean sweep of grades 9-7 across all their GCSEs. Sophie said: "I'm so happy with my results today, and I'm super excited to begin my A levels. Apart from all of the support from my teachers, I think what makes Mayfield so special is the opportunities that it has brought me outside of my studies, like Model United Nations and Drama Club." Francesca added: "I'm very pleased to get my results today and I'm excited to be going into the Sixth Form at Mayfield, where I'll be studying Maths, Economics, Chemistry and Psychology. I'm grateful for all of the additional academic support outside of the classroom and have enjoyed being part of the sports teams."



Katrina





In August, Mayfield celebrated another impressive set of A level results, with a 100% pass rate and over half the grades awarded being A* or A.

Mayfield's Upper Sixth girls secured places at prestigious universities throughout the UK and abroad, including Oxford, Cambridge, Bristol, Durham, Exeter, Imperial, UCL and King's College, with three girls heading to North America to study, including Sophie, who was awarded a Rowing Scholarship by the University of Iowa.

In keeping with the school's educational ethos the girls are going to study a wide range of courses including Animation, Architecture, Engineering, Fine Art, Law and Politics, Medicine, and Psychology, in addition to traditional subjects such as English, Modern Languages and the Sciences.

The most popular A level subjects were Biology, Chemistry, Maths, and Psychology, whilst all nine students taking Ceramics achieved an A* or an A. These included Amelia, who studied Maths and Psychology alongside Ceramics. She said: "I found Maths the hardest subject at junior school, I never would have believed I would take it for A Level and that's all thanks to Mayfield. I am incredibly proud of my results and getting into the University of Cardiff to study Architecture."

Yueshi, a talented musician and international boarder, achieved three A*s in History of Art, English and History and will be going on to study History at Oxford, where she has also been awarded a Choral Scholarship. Yueshi said: "I am absolutely thrilled with my results, and I would like to thank Mayfield for all the opportunities that it has offered to me along the way to cultivate my passions. I can't wait to embark on this new journey at Oxford doing the things that I love!"

Ines also achieved a place at Oxford, where she will be studying French and Beginners Russian. She said: "I remember being so excited when I first received my academic scholarship to Mayfield in Year 9, and it has given me so many opportunities as well as the confidence to apply to Oxford. I'm very much looking forward to starting university, and am extremely grateful for all the support I've received from my teachers, support staff, and peers during my time at Mayfield."

Charlotte and Mia both secured places to study Sciences at Imperial, continuing Mayfield's tradition of encouraging girls to forge careers in STEM, a traditionally male dominated arena. Head Girl Elizabeth was another to excel in STEM subjects, securing a place at Cambridge to study Engineering. She said: "I'm incredibly excited to be heading off to Cambridge to commence an engineering degree this October and I'm thrilled that my results have enabled me to get there.

However, these results don't even begin to demonstrate how much I've learnt during my time at Mayfield. Between the organisational challenge <image>

of Live Crib and tackling 14 exams in the space of a few weeks, I believe that I am thoroughly prepared for anything that university might throw at me!"

Honestly, I can't express my gratitude to Mayfield enough, and I look forward to hearing about what the current Mayfield girls will go on to achieve next!"


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


Farewell to our Upper Sixth

In Loving Memory

Antonia Beary

14th May 1970 – 25th October 2023

On a wet November day we gathered to say goodbye to a truly remarkable daughter, sister, aunt, niece, cousin, friend and our Headmistress, Miss Antonia Mary Beary.

Antonia was the epitome of Mayfield. A woman of great faith and humility, she lived her life by the Cornelian principles and was gifted with the ability to recognise someone's capacity and potential and nurture it with warmth and genuine pride in each and every girl.

A student at Trinity College, Cambridge, Antonia was always destined to be a teacher, a leader and a campaigner of girls' Catholic education.

It was - of course - a time of grief. But it was also a time of community and a time of gratitude. From the moment Antonia's coffin came through the top gate on the Friday evening, until she was interred in the graveyard in St. Dunstan's after Requiem Mass on Saturday, Mayfield was at its inimitable best. We said our goodbyes to our leader, friend and mentor in style. And while it's true what they say - that funerals are for the living - none of us was in any doubt that Antonia would have thoroughly approved of every bit of it.



You never expect your employer to become your friend, but that's what happened to me. You never expect your place of work to become your home, but that's what happened to me. And it's all because of Antonia Beary.

I'll never forget the first time I met Antonia. It was at a lunchtime meet-and-greet for applicants in the Courtyard, and I was waxing lyrical to a captive audience about my experiences in Lourdes. In my enthusiasm, I didn't notice another person join the group. In my misguided confidence, I turned to the person and asked, 'sorry, who are you?' She took great delight in informing me that her name was Antonia and that she was the head. I learned two things that day: that Antonia Beary had a wicked sense of humour, and that it's a really bad idea to choose the egg mayo sandwich during a job interview.

A lot of my memories of Antonia involve laughter. She could find something to laugh about in almost every situation, and she always made sure I left her office with a smile on my face (and usually a bit of Sr Jean's tablet in my hand!). The rest of my memories tend to revolve around either champagne, or prayer. During the Covid lockdowns, when she was under such immense pressure, but led our school community with such grace, she always made time to come to the chapel and pray the Rosary with me - and Tilly! And when we had prayed together, she always made sure to ask me how I was doing.

That was the thing about Antonia - she genuinely cared how people were doing. She genuinely cared about people. When I would go down to her house for a visit during her final months, she would always ask about the school, and how this teacher, or that student, was doing, and she would ask me to check in with so-and-so, or say a prayer for somebody. She was compassion personified, and she was love in action. She brought the Gospels to life, and she lived out her simple faith in a way I could only ever aspire to. Even in her illness, she found a way to grow closer to God, her faith strengthening even as her body weakened.

Antonia gave me a chance. She was my mentor, my supporter, and my inspiration. Above all, she was my friend. I'm truly grateful to her, for everything, and I - along with so many others - will miss her forever.

"This life is only a little dream that will pass away as a shadow! We are here today and gone tomorrow. What matters who is for us or who is against us? Let us only love and serve God." - Cornelia Connelly

n the part of Cornelia's rule dealing with the governance of the Society of the Holy Child Jesus, the ideals put forward for the First Prefect (Headmistress) are almost identical to those put forward in the 1863 Book of Studies for the mistresses teaching in the schools:

'They must regard them (the children) as the children of God, redeemed by His most precious blood, therefore as the most precious charge that the love of Jesus could confide to them, and they should cherish a truly maternal love for them.'

To Antonia, all were God's children, and so came under the same care, whether eight or eighty, student, staff or stranger; her concern for each was genuine, practical and comprehensive.

Life was for living, whether well or ill, and ideally, fun. Her headteacher colleagues paid tribute to her as the Honorary Treasurer of the Girls' Schools Association:

'A treasured friend, Antonia lit up a room with her wit and warmth and brought joy with her wherever she went. Her vibrant life, and laugh, inspired the best in us all. Whenever we think of Antonia we think of her bright smile, and as someone who lived her faith. We hope she would wholeheartedly approve of us still thinking of her smiling down upon us.'

Her annual participation in a pilgrimage to Lourdes was of major importance to her and one she wished for others; hence her request for a Lourdes bursary fund. To the end she loved and served her Lord with her whole heart. May she now rejoice eternally in his love.

Antonia started her teaching career at the Leys School Cambridge, where she taught English. She then moved to Ampleforth where she focused on the pastoral side of school life in her role as the Housemistress of St Aiden's house. Further promotion to Head of Sixth Form at New Hall School meant she was in a perfect position to take on the role of Deputy Head Pastoral at Mayfield in September 2006. On arrival at Mayfield, having always been a 'Toni' to many of her friends, a bursar with the same name meant she became Antonia to most of the staff and girls here. Two years later, Antonia become Headmistress of Mayfield and the rest is history!

Her love for Mayfield and all its guirkiness was legendary - over the seventeen years that she was here, she shaped and formed this school. Antonia was determined to put boarding back into the heart of Mayfield and during her time worked tirelessly to increase the numbers of boarders and improve the provision that the school offers through the now extensive extra-curricular and weekend programmes. She gave herself wholeheartedly to the community and involved herself in as much as possible, from watching sport matches, attending concerts and plays, supervising parties with local boys' schools, leading Lourdes pilgrimages, supporting the prefects with Live Crib and Muck Up Day and even one year lending a hand when we were short of an exam invigilator at the last minute! She was also a stickler for high academic standards, both in herself and others and during her time Mayfield's current strong position in school league tables was cemented. Her love of English and English literature remained with her throughout her life and even in the last few days we were testing each other by exchanging quotes from Lord Bryon to Margery Allingham! However, her love of a Cornelia quote was the most powerful of them all. No matter what the situation or occasion, there was always a fitting quote that firmly reminded everyone of the truly inspirational legacy that Cornelia gave the School.

Antonia lived her live through the school. An educationalist through and through she believed in every single one of the students who came through her care and she cared deeply for them. Over the years she has influenced countless lives. In particular, I was always impressed by how she always looked for the good in everyone; having a faith in them that at times they didn't have themselves. Antonia was always finding impromptu opportunities to inspire and encourage others to be themselves, but make that self what God would want one to be.

Antonia is owed an enormous debt of gratitude for her commitment to the whole Mayfield Community and right up until the end she remained invested in all Cornelians celebrating their successes, taking pleasure in their joys, and supporting those in need. She leaves an outstanding legacy, which we all need to play our part in carrying on so the Mayfield she knew and loved can continue to go from strength to strength. *"I thought to live to complete my work, but it will be done by others".* (Cornelia Connelly)

did not know Antonia before she came to Mayfield, but looking back I think that there was not a great deal of time between her starting and me feeling that she had always been here. This was quite unusual, because as a member of the catering team, we were not usually aware of anyone starting in any other department.

When Antonia became Head a couple of years after joining us, she still retained her approachability. In lots of ways, I feel that she was an open book. The school community - whether student, parent, guardian, support staff, or academic staff - all mattered to her greatly. In fact, I used to joke that if we were to cut her in half she would have St. Leonards-Mayfield written through her middle, much like a stick of rock. Of course, now it would just read Mayfield.

When Antonia started at the school, she was accompanied by her faithful spaniel Humphrey and he was never far from Antonia's feet, except when a ball had been thrown. You saw Antonia and knew that he was within a short distance. I remember how lost she was when Humphrey died, and it took quite a while to not look for him whenever you saw Antonia. She later when on to foster two spaniels who had been abused, unfortunately the younger one died, but Tilly is now with a friend of Antonia's, living her best life. Antonia without a dog was just wrong. It is wonderful to know that Humphrey is with her now.

Antonia was always helping to serve drinks at functions. Personally, I remember this most especially at the support staff Christmas party – absolute sacrilege if you had an empty glass, so she was always wandering around topping people up.

Her interest in you extended to your family. How she kept everyone and their families straight I have no idea, but she was very successful in this, and this made you feel even more valued as a colleague and friend. It was very rare to chat with no mention of family. I don't think there were many occasions when I passed Antonia's office that she didn't ask me in and check how everything was going for me and especially my parents, particularly once they moved to Norfolk. When Dad was taken to hospital with a chest infection, I was on my way there before I could draw breath with her complete approval, and again less than two months later when he had a stroke.

Being a little older than her, I had invited Antonia, along with a large proportion of the staff in school, to my 50th birthday celebrations. Unfortunately, she was not feeling great on the day and so she stayed away. I got home and found a lovely bouquet of flowers waiting outside my door for me, with a note saying how disappointed she was not to be able to attend. With my birthday being a few days before Christmas, she had made sure that the cold she was hatching was not passed on to anyone else, therefore hoping to keep everyone else fit and healthy to enjoy the festive season.

I know that she was most disappointed not to be there as I had a barn dance, so that Summer, at the end of year staff party, there was a barn dance held in the gym for us to enjoy!

Caroline started at Mayfield in January 2005 as a Teacher of IT, as well as immersing herself in the boarding community with a role as a tutor in St Dunstan's. When Caroline joined Mayfield, it's fair to say the IT infrastructure was in its infancy. Caroline embarked upon a process to revolutionise our IT infrastructure and make it fit for the age. Every single department within school benefited from her vision and hard work.

Having worked previously in industry with BP, Caroline was well equipped to project manage the detailed work she planned. She brought with her a vision and wealth of knowledge. Caroline led and built a superb team of professionals to support her. Each of these members of staff speaks genuinely about her knowledge, patience, empathy, compassion, warmth, vision, enthusiasm, hard work and kindness. All of her team were made to feel valued and important.

In recent years Caroline shouldered the responsibility of protecting the school from cyber-attacks. She also supported

and encouraged girls who expressed an interest in a career or degree in Computer Science or related fields. She has been an excellent role model as a successful woman working in IT in what is a largely male-dominated world.

In addition to all this expertise within the field of IT Caroline has an immense knowledge of child protection and pastoral care. She made Leeds a home-from-home for the girls and very quickly became a respected member of the House team. This role lasted for 2 years and only came to an end as Caroline's time was now more urgently needed developing and expanding our IT systems. Thankfully though she found the time and returned to a boarding tutor role with me in St Dunstan's. I was immensely grateful to have her support and loyalty. As a member of the boarding team, she was very generous with her time and always tactful and discrete. Caroline was always available, supporting the girls and her colleagues to the best of her ability.

Claire joined Mayfield on 1st September 2004, coming from St Bede's in East Sussex. Claire was initially employed as a Teacher of Food and Nutrition and boarding assistant in St Dunstan's House. In March 2005, Claire was appointed as Housemistress, a role she held for 11 years.

Claire loved the variety of her roles despite it being challenging and exhausting at times. There were

a lot of fun times with the girls including several trips to France and a lovely Christmas weekend in Bath. likes to be active and enjoys the English countryside through running and has also recently been learning how to crochet.







Isabella, Elizabeth and Megan win national engineering award



In April, three Sixth Form girls won a national engineering accolade for their plan to reduce carbon emissions and make Mayfield village more sustainable, placing second out of 140 Schools from across the UK in the ICE CityZen Competition. Isabella, Elizabeth and Megan won the Silver Award for a plan they created to implement heat pumps in order to cut carbon emissions at School. CityZen is a UK-wide competition in which student teams learn about civil engineering by completing virtual game challenges. They then take the lessons they've learned and apply them to their own civil engineering proposal and submit a video entry explaining their idea.

A level Maths Conference

In June, we were delighted to welcome students from Beacon Academy, Bexhill College, BHASVIC, Uplands Community College and Our Lady of Sion to our annual A Level Mathematics Conference. The focus this year was on developing problem-solving skills, which will be very useful at university and in the world of work.

The day started with an ice-breaking pairs game to encourage interaction between students from different schools and an introductory talk on why problem-solving skills are so important. Students then participated in a variety of workshops. Modelling and motion were the focus of the Mechanics workshop where students carried out experiments to calculate the effect of air resistance. In the Statistics workshop, they looked at the probability of winning Britain's Got Talent and why airlines always overbook their flights. A workshop on university admissions tests gave an insight into how they could help you transition into the next stage of education. All students had the opportunity to participate in a fun relay which enabled them to work interactively with other students. To round off the day we were very fortunate to welcome Ben Sparks as our keynote speaker who gave a thought-provoking talk on 'The Creation of Number'.



Sister Jean's Maths Challenge



Well done to all of the girls involved and thank you to everyone involved in a fun and festive concert.







They spent time interviewing members of the public about their views of how Stratford has changed and assessing the environmental quality of the area.

Sixth Form RS Trip to London

In December, Sixth Form Religious Studies' students attended the Ethiqa philosophy, ethics, and religion masterclass conference in London. They heard brilliant scholars address ideas in their A level course, including: Professor Keith Ward on 'Is theism rationally defensible?', Julie Arliss on 'Where does moral value lie?', Dr Andrew Pinsett on 'The problem of evil', and Professor Daphne Hampson on 'God and gender'.





Paris Trip

On the last morning of the Spring term 21 Sixth Form students (plus two younger members of Schola) left School for St Pancras International in London to catch Eurostar and encounter art, music, language and culture in Paris. They were accompanied by Dr Weddell, Head of History of Art, Dr Ward, Director of Music, Mme Testa, Head of French, and Mr Benians, Music Tutor and organist.

Dr Weddell had the following to say about the trip: "We stayed just near the Marais at Hotel Alhambra, close enough to walk down shopping streets to our first destination, the Musée Carnavalet, to study the history of Paris. On Thursday we visited the converted railway station that houses the Musée d'Orsay. Here there were many 19th century paintings studied for History of Art A Level, including Monet's 'Poppies'. We lunched at a typical Parisian brasserie where, as well as the usual 'frites', the girls tried snails!

"In the afternoon we walked to the Musée des Arts Decoratifs to see collections of jewellery and design from the medieval to contemporary period. There was time for shopping in the wonderful Grande Épicerie de Paris for food gifts as we walked to the Eglise Notre-Dame de Grâce de Passy. Here Schola Cantorum conducted by Dr Ward gave a splendid charity concert in aid of refugees. The Church had very good acoustics for their beautiful voices and for the organ, ably played



by Mr Benians. On Friday morning, we walked to the Musée du Louvre, enjoying the sights and sounds of Paris. Here we went first to view Leonardo's 'Mona Lisa' – with varied reactions from the group. Then we viewed the huge 19th century history paintings studied for History of Art A Level – even more impressive seen at first hand."

Year 10 Modern Foreign Languages Day

In July, Year 10 experienced a celebration of French and Spanish culture for their MFL day. Activities included: cooking Pisto Manchego, a traditional Spanish tomato and vegetable dish; learning to dance flamenco steps, including the 'llamada' and 'marcaje' steps, with Ana Dueñas from Academia Flamenca; and taking part in a Boules tournament.

Curriculum

A level Geographers head to the coast

In September, our A Level Geographers investigated sediment budgets along the Sussex coast between Newhaven and Seaford. Field data was collected to test a range of hypotheses. The girls also undertook flood risk mapping and interviewed residents about their perceptions of coastal flood risk.





Historians go back in time

Our Year 10 Historians paid a visit to the National Archives and Westminster Abbey for an investigation into the reign of Queen Elizabeth I, who they have been studying as part of their GCSE.

The day began at the National Archives, learning firstly about the purpose and work of the organisation. The main focus though was on using genuine Tudor documents, including handwritten letters from Elizabeth, to explore her rule and personality in more depth.

In the afternoon we travelled to Westminster Abbey, to understand further how religion changed in England under Elizabeth I. Our tour guides helped the girls to see how the Abbey buildings have changed and what can be learnt from the evidence inside, such as the many tombs and memorials.

Classics Trip to London


In the Summer term, Year 7 students went on a Classics Trip to London, visiting the John Soane and the British Museum, exploring the world of the ancient Romans. The girls enjoyed a tour of John Soane's house, looking at the rooms full of classical objects and learning about his passion for Ancient Greek and Roman history. The day finished with a trip to the British Museum, looking at many different aspects of the Roman Empire.





Battlefields Trip

During Enrichment Week, 31 of the Year 9 girls travelled to France and Belgium to experience the battlefields of the First World War. We visited the underground tunnels at Arras, which housed thousands of British troops before they launched a surprise attack in 1917. Then we drove to Ypres in Belgium to learn more about the battle of Passchendaele, before visiting both German and British military cemeteries at Langemark and Lijessenthoek. An obligatory stop at the chocolate shop in Ypres and a lovely dinner in a local restaurant was followed by the Last Post ceremony at the Menin Gate, which powerfully commemorates the fallen. On Wednesday we developed what has been learnt in History lessons about the Battle of the Somme by following in the footsteps of British and Newfoundland troops as they went over the top. Girls witnessed how hard it would have been to cross the deadly no man's land and at Thiepval memorial we paid our respects to those who sacrificed so much. Some cultural and retail therapy was appreciated by all after that and we enjoyed the picturesque Amiens before returning to Mayfield.





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






French café comes to Mayfield

English and Drama

Frantic Assembly Drama workshop

In the Spring term, the Year 10 GCSE Drama pupils took part in a workshop held by actor and practitioner, Cudjoe Asare from the Theatre company, Frantic Assembly. During the two hours the pupils learned to work together in the genre of physical theatre, which is the predominant style of the company. The techniques that they practised will now be used within their own work when creating drama. The pupils very much enjoyed the experience and gained a great deal.

Alexa in Year 10 said: "The Frantic Assembly practitioner was engaging, and I think that we really expanded our knowledge of physical theatre and our team skills. He taught us a few different lifts, the pocket and the hook, which allowed us to be more creative and move more fluidly."





In March, Evie and Phoebe, Year 13 Drama A Level students, performed an extract from Caryl Churchill's play, 'Top Girls'. It premiered in 1982 and is now a classic of modern theatre. Set during a period of British politics dominated by the newly elected Prime Minister, Margaret Thatcher, Churchill's play prompts us to question our notions of women's success and solidarity.

National Poetry Day

To celebrate National Poetry Day, girls in Year 7 transformed the novel 'Julia and the Shark' into performance poetry. They used voice, movement, and choral reading to bring short verses from the novel to life. Once back in the classroom, the girls were inspired to write their own poetry, using words and images from the novel as their inspiration.



Curriculum

World Book Day

World Book Day celebrations kicked off with a visit to the school by Carnegie Award winning author Anthony McGowan. He talked to Years 9 and 10 about the stories behind his books, often drawing on his personal experiences as a teenager at a difficult school in Leeds during the 1970s. The girls were able to ask questions about his life as a writer, his inspirations and methods. They learned about the research that he does for all his books, including the 2 years it took him to write his latest book, 'Dogs of the Deadlands', a tale about the survival of one pet dog abandoned after the Chernobyl disaster.

During A1, Anthony spent time with the winners and runners up in our 500 word short story competition. He spoke about the 'four questions' that may help structure a story, as well as how to use the 'hero's journey' and Freytag's Pyramid, telling a story from his teen years that he used for a book.





150 Petals By Lucie in Year 8

Arm-like branches reach up to the darkening, tranquil sky. The boughs are covered with teeming flowers, that have waited eleven months since the last blooming to fly daintily through the sky again. The air is filled with the laughter and smiles of the Hanami picnics below but most importantly, everyone has gathered to take in the sweet scent of the flower that brings joy to all. From one single tree, one hundred and fifty individual, unique petals are slowly taken away twirling to the tune of the birds flying high above the trees, dancing like ballerinas in the gusts of wind and taking turns to pirouette and leap across the night sky.

The first of many petals floats into a ruby, bamboo Kinchaku bag clutched by the elegant hand of a geisha. Camouflaged by the pink carefully stitched lining, the petal will lie there for generations. The second is chased by a playful puppy like a bouncing ball. The third, is drifting through the field, the petal never touched by the polar bear-like dog covered with long white fur brushing along the short freshly cut grass. A couple more perfect petals float peacefully to the floor while the wind catches one, spiralling it towards the northern suburbs to land on a businessman's shoulder. He brushes it off in a hurry.

National Youth Theatre





They all participated in the two-hour event, then had the opportunity to individually audition to be a part of the long-standing company. Approximately 6,000 young people audition every year, with the company offering just 700 places. Given those odds, we were delighted that five of our students were offered a place - congratulations to Evie, Alice, Breanna, Eloise and Eliza for their achievement at gaining a place.











In March, thirty-eight students took a LAMDA performance examination, ranging from Grade 2 to Grade 8 (the Gold award). These are practical examinations that take place within school between a certified LAMDA examiner and an individual student or a pair of students. We were delighted by the results, with 87% achieving a Distinction and 13% achieving a High Merit.

Cross-curricular days

The Cookie Project

In the Spring term, Year 7 girls took part in The Cookie Project, a team challenge to design, produce and market a cookie in just one day! The day began with a cookie tasting session. Teams had to consider the appearance, taste, texture and market appeal of five different cookies. This was followed by a planning session where roles were decided, cookie ingredients agreed and the logo was designed. The groups then divided between the bakers, who were tasked with producing the best possible cookie, the designers, who were responsible for the packaging and a promotional photograph, and the marketers who were in charge of writing a script for the advert and preparing the final presentation.

Communication between different parts of the teams was essential and in true Apprentice style this didn't always go to plan! In the afternoon, the teams came back together to film their advert and practise for the final presentation. Then it was time to present their product to the judges. Mr Smith, Miss Oliver and Maria (Year 12) made up the judging panel and were very impressed with the quality of the girls' work and how much they had achieved in a short space of time. The overall winning team was Sugar and Spice. Congratulations to all who took part!







Moon Camp Challenge

In the Summer term, the Year 8s embarked on a crosscurricular STEM project designed to develop their teamwork, communication and creative skills through a series of engineering, scientific and design challenges, with the aim of establishing a base on the moon.

Working in groups, girls began the challenge by choosing a purpose for their moon camp, before researching the various difficulties that they might encounter. Each team then split into smaller sub-groups to pursue further specialist enquiries:

- Structural engineers pressure tested different window shapes and sizes in order to determine which would be most suitable for space, as well as investigating optimal launch conditions for bottle rockets.
- Bio-engineers focused on the essentials such as food and water; finding that filtering recycled water was more effective than distillation, learning about hydroponic farming, and considering how to keep both physically and mentally-fit in space.
- Software engineers made excellent progress in their use of the Python programming language to code robotic buggies to navigate a lunar landscape and use machine learning to avoid aliens!
- Design engineers learnt how to use 3D computer aided design software to develop a model of their moon base, ensuring it reflected their group's purpose.

Throughout the project each team filmed their work, and then edited a final video to showcase their processes and findings. Staff were impressed by the engagement and enthusiasm shown by the girls and particularly enjoyed the quality of their films.









Olympics Day

In the Summer term, Year 7 took part in an Olympic themed day. After learning about the ancient Olympic games, the girls looked at the origin, and influences of, the modern Olympic games. Using the Tokyo games as a case study, Year 7 explored the events, mascots and values underpinning the Olympics.

Each group was allocated their own country to research, before being set the task of designing their own mini-Olympic games for Mayfield. They each produced a mascot, chant, event, and their own kit to be worn at the afternoon games where everyone had the chance to compete in all four of the different countries' events.



Codes Day

In November, Year 8 took part in a cross-curricular day based on the theme of Codes. After an initial introduction to why we need codes and how we use them in our everyday lives, the girls took part in a carousel of activities. These included British Sign Language, Braille, Semaphore, Codes in Chemistry and Musical codes.

The day culminated in an exciting Escape Room activity which all the girls enjoyed tremendously. The girls used the skills and knowledge that they had learned about in earlier sessions to unravel clues and questions leading to keywords. They entered into the spirit of the game with great enthusiasm and a lot of collaborative working. Once the keywords were all decoded and the code was cracked, these apprentice undercover agents had to tell the secret word to their Spymaster trainer (thank you to Mrs Bunce, Mrs Testa and Ms Gilpin), obtain their key, unlock a padlocked box and enjoy the surprise inside. As with all good spies after an incident, barely a trace of their presence was to be seen!



Fusion and Diversity Day

In December, Year 9 took part in their cross curricular day, with the focus on 'British Society' and celebrating fusion and diversity in the UK. The girls participated in four workshops, led by subject specialists, including 'People Power' (Geography), 'Food, Glorious Food' (Food and Nutrition), 'Festivals' (Religious Studies and Art) and 'Words, Words, Words' (English).

It was fantastic to see the girls so engaged with learning about how cosmopolitan the UK is as a nation at the same time as being able to celebrate their own heritage. This was done in a variety of ways in workshop activities: writing poems and raps, performing dances; taking part in a 'guess my heritage' game; and exploring a variety of festivals.

The day was rounded off with a British Tea Party and quiz, where the girls shared the cakes and treats they had made (Jamaican Ginger cake, Indian Sweet Treats, Ukranian Honey Cookies and Scones) and sampled a cup (or two) of good old English Tea.







Mayfield Festival of Ideas

March saw the launch of the first ever Mayfield Festival of Ideas. Mayfield Scholars in Years 9-13 presented a range of interactive workshops over the course of a week to girls in Years 7 and 8, with a focus on peer-to-peer learning. Workshops ranged from learning about economics through sweet trading to making a vehicle operational using coding. There were also options related to psychology, music, fake news, linguistics, history and Shakespeare, amongst others. Dr Schuldenfrei spoke on 'The Bauhaus: Living with Modernism'. She gave a fascinating overview of the impact of this influential German art, craft and architectural design school during the 14 years of its existence before it was closed by the Nazis. This was a most enjoyable and informative lecture as shown by the many questions from students and staff at the end.



Climate Conference

11 students attended a MUN Conference at Cobham Hall on Climate Change; it was a great opportunity to meet and debate with students from other schools, and to discuss some really interesting topics. Model United Nations

Polar Explorer visits Mayfield



Lucia in Year 13 reflects on the talk: "Alex Hibbert gave a fascinating depiction of his experiences as a Polar explorer, captivating us with stories of the harsh conditions that he braved from as young an age as 19, giving him a passion for exploration which continues to this day. He began the talk by portraying his first experience in the polar world which he undertook in his second year at Oxford University and managed to break the world record by spending 4 long months on the icecaps. He went on to convey his more recent adventures where he learnt the art of dog sledding, a far more difficult challenge than thought to be. He portrayed the tiny frozen villages where he spent time getting to know the locals, learning of their fishing and hunting trade. As a qualified photographer he accompanied the presentation with incredible photos taken by him first hand on the ice. To conclude, his presentation was thoroughly enjoyed by the entire audience, and several students including myself went on to buy his books to learn more about this incredible winter world."



Clubs and Societies

Lower School Science Club

The girls in Lower School Science Club had a lot of fun this year investigating various aspects of science in the world around them. They made their own indicators from red cabbage, and investigated the properties of a non-Newtonian fluid with Oobleck that changed colour depending on its pH. They also competed to build the tallest tower using only marshmallows and spaghetti.



STEM Club

In STEM club, the girls have been conducting experiments - using an interferometer with a laser - to determine the wavelength of the laser light. They also recreated an experiment, first conducted in 1848 by a physicist called Fizeau, to measure the speed of light!

Psychology Club is aimed at girls in Middle School and is a good opportunity for younger students to get an understanding of what Psychology as a subject is all about. Anabelle and Alex in the Upper Sixth ran this club and worked incredibly hard to enthuse students about psychological issues which can be seen in everyday life. They covered topics from how the brains of bilingual people differ from unilingual brains, to the role of psychology in the criminal justice system, to fun food tasting experiments and the different types of learning. Many thanks to Anabelle and Alex for all the time and effort they put into running this successful club.



Co-curricular Activities

Farm Club

Farm and Land Management is an Enrichment activity for Year 12s and involves weekly visits to Froghole Farm to see how the farm runs.

In February, Farmer Guy Brickell gave the girls a tour of the machinery that he uses. They learnt how the tractor has evolved over the decades to become more efficient and even had an opportunity to test their driving skills!

They also learnt about the importance of maintaining healthy animals, with the girls helping out with the worming treatment for the young calves. They


