To our WRA & Project SEARCH Community,

As 2024 comes to a close we want to take this opportunity to reflect on the tremendous effort that our students make each and every day to not only improve themselves, but also to encourage, motivate and inspire those around them to do the same. Students have explored ways to understand kindness from a variety of perspectives this month. Lessons have focused on the " five

senses" of kindness to give students an opportunity to express what and how kindness can look, feel, and sound. Students also participated in a month-long kindness challenge in which they learned to make a conscious effort to keep small acts of kindness in the forefront of their thoughts and ideas. Students have been supported in finding ways while at school, home and out in the community to "pay it forward" in an effort to spread positivity and joy to those around them. We recognize that during the holiday season opportunities to spread kindness are more easily accessible. With that in mind, our students continue to volunteer weekly at a local food pantry to remind ourselves that we should always "do things for others, not because of who they are, or what they do in return, but because of who we are," Harold S. Other highlights in the month of December included:

- The students at Project SEARCH participated in a first ever modified Patient Care
 Technician/Nursing Assistant skills training where they learned how to take vital signs including temperature, pulse, blood pressure, and oxygen saturation! The training was part of our ongoing participating in Atlantic Health System's Federal Grant to promote the training and hiring of more nurses and patient-facing staff across all hospitals including Overlook Medical Center in Summit.
- Our annual **Student Holiday Party** that brought together students from both of our programs for food, games (including Tracie's annual holiday Kahoot), and socialization!

This is a great opportunity to come meet and speak with agencies who provide services to students and young adults with disabilities after they graduate from high school and leave our program. 







December Classroom Spotlight with Sharlene McQuade




Staff Member of the Month: Deb Italiano

What do you love best about your job? Working out in the community with the students, and building new relationships.



We are offering virtual information sessions prospective students, families, or referring school district staff on the following dates:







Students Unleash Inner Peace During Yoga Elective





of yoga, as well as Yin Yoga and a restorative practice. So far the restorative style of yoga featuring slow movements and lots of relaxation is the group favorite.














Understanding Supported Employment Options Available AFTER Graduation

SUPPORTED EMPLOYMENT IN NEW JERSEY

Supported Employment helps individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD) secure and maintain **competitive employment**, or work in a setting to prepare for competitive employment. An individual's interests, likes, and dislikes are important factors when considering a job or career path.

Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA)

An initiative that outlines that competitive employment is the preferred post-education activity. It presumes that all individuals, including people with IDD, are capable of integrated employment.

EXAMPLES OF SERVICES

Pre-Employment Transition Services

- Offered to high school students to plan and prepare for entering the workforce.
- Job Development
- Assists individuals with a job search, interview skills, and resume development.
- Job Sampling
 - Gives the individual the opportunity to explore different types of employment and identify areas of interest and ability
- Job Coaching
 - Provides assistance with learning essential job tasks, transportation training, social skills, and can act as a liaison between the employer and employee.
- Long-Term Follow Along
 - Ongoing support through worksite visits designed to help individuals maintain skills built during job coaching. **Trial Work Experience**
 - A workplace readiness assessment administered by a Supported Employment provider agency, such as Project HIRE
- *This is not a fully inclusive list. Services may vary between agencies, school districts, and funding sources.

NJ WORKABILITY

NJ WorkAbility offers people with disabilities who are working, and whose income would otherwise make them ineligible for Medicaid, the opportunity to receive full Medicaid coverage.

Through NJ WorkAbility, individuals can earn up to \$65,196 of gross annual income and maintain less than \$20,000 in assets without threatening their Medicaid status. About the Work Readiness Academy

The Work Readiness Academy serves students ages 18-21 with disabilities and provides a comprehensive employment training experience that incorporates both classroom-based instruction and community-based work-learning experiences. While in the

training classroom, students work cooperatively with similar aged peers to learn critical skills related to employment and socialization. Students also work on career exploration and planning, including the development of a person-centered, post-secondary vision and plan with clear goals and action steps. Program staff remain on-site during the internships to provide and fade support and assistance as needed. Students also participate in field trips focused on career discovery, independent living skills, recreation and independent travel training.






Ms. Caryn from the Behavior Department!

The sensory packs include various items that our students use to help self regulate and refocus both in their classrooms as well as out in the community on community based field trips. Some of the items included stress balls, pop tubes and pop-it keyrings, putty, a timer, and bubbles. In addition, our students often use their fanny packs to carry individual reinforcing items to earn when traveling around the school or in the community. The students store important visual supports needed when they are on the go, allowing them to learn how to manage and utilize their own materials and increase independence.




December - Design

Teacher's Corner:

Mrs Arora - Biology/Forensics

Biology: Students covered the *Microscope* and *Cell Transport* units. They learned how to use a microscope and studied the function of each part. After mastering the basics, they participated in a handson virtual lab to practice these skills. Students also prepared their own onion cell and cheek cell slides, gaining firsthand experience in microscopy techniques.



In the *Cell Transport* unit, students explored how oxygen, nutrients, and wastes move through the cell membrane in the human body using diffusion, facilitated diffusion, osmosis, and active transport. To deepen their understanding, they conducted potato experiments, analyzing osmosis and diffusion. Classroom discussions connected these concepts to real-life applications such as why plants cannot grow on the beach and why pasta sauce develops mold after five days in the refrigerator even when stored properly.

Forensic Science: In the *Forensic Anthropology* unit, students studied the 206 bones in the human body and their significance pertaining to investigations. They learned how forensic anthropologists analyze human remains and burial contexts to uncover critical evidence, such as determining the identity of the deceased, the cause of death, and the time since death. To help memorize the bones, students watched various videos and listened to educational songs.







Mr Lund - Environmental/Computer Science

Environmental: This month, students worked on creating pamphlets that promoted saving endangered animals. Each student researched an animal chosen at random so that all animals had a fair chance to receive an advocate on behalf of their survival and recovery.

Computer Science: Students worked on Interactive Animations and Games in an online resource called code. org. Students had an

opportunity to write about and discuss the future of AI based on an article in Scholastic Magazine titled "The Bright Side and the Dark Side of AI."

Therapy Spotlight - Ms. Alayna, Ms. Jillian, Ms. Brianna -Speech Therapists





December Tips and Ideas from the Behavior Team:

Supporting Neurodiverse Children During the Holidays

The holiday season can be a joyful time filled with celebration, connection, and tradition. However, for neurodiverse children, the changes in routine, sensory overload, and social expectations can also make this time challenging. With thoughtful preparation and strategies tailored to their unique needs, families can create an inclusive and enjoyable holiday experience for everyone. This guide offers practical tips to help families navigate the season, from maintaining predictability and managing sensory needs to adapting traditions and practicing social scenarios. By prioritizing comfort, understanding, and flexibility, you can ensure that the holidays are meaningful and stress-free for your neurodiverse child and your family.

1. Maintain Routine and Predictability

- Stick to a Schedule: Try to keep consistent wake-up, meal, and bedtime routines.
- Use a Visual Schedule: Display daily plans with pictures or words to provide clarity on what to expect.
- **Prepare for Changes:** If routines will shift (e.g., travel or guests), discuss and rehearse them ahead of time.
- 2. Prepare for Sensory Needs
 - **Create a Safe Space:** Ensure there's a quiet, sensory-friendly area for retreat if the holiday environment becomes overwhelming.
 - **Pack Sensory Tools:** Bring headphones, weighted blankets, fidget toys, or other calming items when visiting new places.
 - **Monitor Overstimulation:** Keep an eye out for signs of sensory overload and plan breaks when needed.
- 3. Practice Social Scenarios
 - **Role-Play:** Rehearse holiday greetings, gift exchanges, or dining scenarios ahead of time.
 - **Explain Expectations:** Share clear, specific expectations for social situations, such as how long an event will last or how to ask for a break.
 - Use Social Stories: Create or use pre-made stories that describe what will happen during holiday events.

4. Be Flexible About Traditions

- Adjust Traditions: Adapt holiday traditions to be more inclusive and comfortable (e.g., quiet lighting instead of blinking lights).
- Simplify Events: Focus on a few key activities rather than trying to do everything.
- Honor Their Preferences: Respect preferences for food, activities, and clothing, even if they differ from traditional norms.

5. Plan for Travel

- **Prepare for Delays:** Pack snacks, entertainment, and sensory items to manage long waits or changes in plans.
- **Practice Ahead:** Visit transportation hubs or watch videos about flying or taking a train to familiarize them with the experience.
- Notify Staff: Inform airlines, hotels, or hosts about specific needs to receive accommodations.

6. Manage Gift-Giving

- Set Expectations: Let your child know what to expect during gift exchanges.
- Be Selective: Choose gifts that align with their interests and sensory preferences.
- **Respect Boundaries:** If opening gifts in front of others is overwhelming, allow it to happen in private.

7. Incorporate Interests

- Holiday Themes: Integrate their special interests into holiday decorations, activities, or stories.
- **Offer Choices:** Let them choose how to engage in holiday activities (e.g., picking decorations or helping with baking).

8. Take Care of Yourself

- Plan for Breaks: Caregivers need rest too! Schedule downtime for yourself.
- **Seek Support:** Connect with support groups, family, or friends who understand and can help during the holidays. Your Crossroads Behavior Team is here to support you in any way we can.
