- Assessed on technical ability, creativity, critical understanding, and reflection.

2. Component 2: Externally Set Assignment (40%)

- Students select a theme or question from a paper provided by AQA.
- Includes:
 - A preparatory period to develop ideas and experiments.
 - A final 15-hour supervised practical session to produce a finished piece.
