ATHLETICS

Carter boasts a long tradition of strong club and school teams active throughout the year, including:

Carter serves grades 9-12, operates on a four-block schedule, from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. every day, except Wednesdays when classes start at 8:50 a.m., and on the four half days when school ends at 12 p.m.

ACADEMICS

Carter High School gives students the opportunity to earn college credit by offering a number of Advanced Placement (AP) and Dual Enrollment (DE) classes.

AP classes are high school courses that follow a rigorous college-level curriculum for which students can earn high school credit; they may also earn college credits with a qualifying score on an optional final exam.

DE classes are college courses for which a high school student is enrolled simultaneously at a postsecondary institution. Successful completion of the course results in both high school and college credits. The school works with a number of partners for this purpose.
