According to Caren Atanackovic, orchestra director, a recent highlight for the WHS orchestra was performing at Baldwin Wallace University's Conservatory for the North East Ohio String Festival. The orchestra, including select groups from the region, had the opportunity to work with professional adjudicators and clinicians, and experience performances from other schools. The WHS Best Buddies program has been a fast-growing program aimed at inclusion for students. The Best Buddies website bestbuddies.org states their mission is as a nonprofit organization that "creates opportunities for one-to-one friendships, integrated employment, leadership development, inclusive living, and family support for individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD)."

Lauren Michel is the adviser at WHS and has held this position for almost three years. Michel said, "I am amazed by the students at Wooster High School. We have incredible peer members who connect with their buddies and reliably attend events."

Membership for the Best Buddies program is also increasing, with Michel reporting an increase from 30 to 78 members.

Members have the unique opportunity to make a difference in others' lives. Hailey Padden (11) is the secretary of Best Buddies and has been a member of the program for two years. "We have gained so many members this year that we have more peer members than buddies, when some schools don't even have enough peers to make one on one matches. It's so exciting to be a part of a new and impactful club because it changes the lives of more than just the buddies, but the peers as well," Padden said.

On Dec. 1, the Best Buddies Program held its quarterly auction fundraiser.

Leading the Best Buddies Program as the president is Calin Baxtrom (11), who has been a member of the program for two years. "Our main goals for this event is to spread awareness of what we do throughout our community and also to raise money. We are self-sufficient so in order to host fun events and keep our club cost free we do fundraisers," Baxtrom said.

Adviser Michel, Holly Pope and Brent Dillon organized the fundraiser and reached out to other people in the community to assist with their initiatives. "We've connected with member families and local organizations to provide raffle baskets and items for the auction. Students members have helped make the bidder paddles, share flyers, and get ready for the event," Michel said.

The proceeds of the event go to group activities and items like socks, snacks, craft supplies and funding for members to attend the Best Buddies Leadership Conference over the summer.
