





Board of Education

The Board of Education consists of five members who are elected to serve four-year terms with the terms staggered so that as nearly equal to one-half as possible will expire every two years. All elections are nonpartisan and are held at the time of the primary election in even-numbered years. Board of Education members must reside in the district they serve, but they are elected county-wide. The superintendent is appointed by the Board and serves as secretary to the Board.

The Jackson County School Health Advisory Council (SHAC), Healthy Carolinians, Mountain Wise, and Jackson County Health Department partnered to sponsor the 12th Annual Healthy Snack Master Competition. This competition is open to all Kindergarten through 12th grade students enrolled in Jackson County Public Schools. Students either entered as an individual or as a group and created their own original recipe with unique name. Submitted recipes were reviewed by members of SHAC. The top student and group entries competed in the Healthy Snack Master Competition. At the Snack Master Competition, a panel of judges determined the winning healthy snack based on taste, appearance, presentation, healthfulness, and creativity. Superlatives were also awarded for the People's Choice, Most Creative Name, and Best Bite.

Lenovo Qualified Technology Department





State and National Recognition Awards

Outstanding Communication



The North Carolina School Public Relations Association (NCSPRA) honored JCPS for excellence in communications. JCPS earned a total of three Blue Ribbon Awards for outstanding and effective



ceremony held in High Point, NC. JCPS received one gold level award –Photography-JCPS Special Olympics, one silver level award-Special Events & Programs-Back to School Bash, and one bronze level award-Special Events & **Programs-Excellence in Education Awards Evening.**

The National School Public Relations Association (NSPRA) also honored JCPS with two awards in their 2024 Publications and Digital Media Excellence Awards. JCPS received one Honorable Mention-Social Media Engagement and one Award of Merit-Photography-JCPS Special Olympics.

Each entry was created by Public Information Officer, Shaneka Allen, who is responsible for district communications.



Jackson County Public Schools approved CharacterStrong as the Social and Emotional Learning (SEL) curriculum for 6th-12th grade students to be used during the 2023-2024 school year. Currently, 47 staff members have been trained.

Through the use of the CharacterStrong curriculum, we have an opportunity to help our children learn the value of empathy, service, and connection.

Preschool Classroom Ribbon Cutting

Dogwood Health Trust

In August, members of the JCPS staff and representatives from Dogwood Health Trust celebrated a new preschool classroom at Smokey Mountain Elementary School. This classroom is the third JCPS preschool classroom funded by Dogwood Health Trust, in addition to a preschool coordinator position for five years.







Thanks to a partnership with the United States Department of Agriculture, the following schools were selected as part of Community Eligibility Provision (CEP) to provide meals at no cost to students: Blue Ridge Early College, Blue Ridge School, Cullowhee Valley, Jackson Community School, and Smokey Mountain Elementary.

With this program:

- All students enrolled at the identified schools received free breakfast and lunch.
- Families at the identified CEP schools did not have to complete school lunch forms.

\$411,000 CTE GRANT

Dogwood Health Trust



Jackson County Public Schools was awarded a grant from Dogwood Health Trust in the amount of \$411,000 for "Promoting Career Readiness and Workforce Development Within Career and Technical Education (CTE) Programming for Jackson County." The central priorities of this grant are increasing educational and economic opportunities for students. Funds from this grant were used to advance education by hiring a staff person to assist students with career development activities, purchasing equipment to modernize high school CTE labs, a paid internship program for students, contributing to student travel and participation in Career and Technical Student Organizations, and providing CTE staff with high-quality professional development to prepare students for a dynamic and rapidly evolving workforce.

School Safety Single-Entry Point







In the spring of 2018, in response to the school shooting in Parkland and JCPS experiencing 8 bomb threats, students from Smoky Mountain High School, Blue Ridge Early College, Jackson Community School and Jackson County Early College requested a meeting with the Jackson County School Board and the Jackson County Board of Commissioners. At this meeting the students laid out three requests to help with feeling safe at school. First was a school resource officer at every school in JCPS. Second, was additional counselors so that students with mental health needs could access help. Lastly they requested that schools be single entry points. Both boards agreed and the County Commissioners raised taxes to pay for additional counselors and school resource officers. Also, they approved funding for security walls and now all JCPS schools are single entry points.

Facilities & Maintenance



Our Maintenance Department plays a crucial role in maintaining safe and clean facilities and promoting a positive educational experience for students and staff.

The Student Support Services Department is made up of school nurses, school counselors, school social workers, and the staff in the Exceptional Children Program. The goal of this department is to provide prevention, intervention, transition, and followup services for students and families. Mental Health

JCPS is unique as we have our own Mental Health Team of 8 trained staff to serve our students, staff and faculty throughout the district. This year, the team developed a JCPS Risk Assessment Protocol and trained 45 staff members.
