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

- College (awards bachelor degrees)
- University (awards bachelor and master degrees)

COST

• Community College



PROGRAMS OF STUDY

- Certificates
- Associate degrees
- Bachelor Degrees

WHY GO TO COLLEGE?

- People who earn a college degree earn three times the lifetime income than people who have no education after high school
- To advance in certain fields, you must have a college degree

- Approximately \$7,000/year at a community college
- Approximately \$13,000/year at George Mason (least expensive state public university)
- Approximately \$25,000/year private college or university (range up to \$100,000/year)



What's the difference?



College/University

Community College

4-year degree (Bachelor degree)	2-year degree (Associate degree)	
Most have on-campus housing	Most have no on-campus housing	
Prepares you for career or graduate study	Prepares you for employment or transfer to a 4-year college or university	
You apply and attend when you get accepted	Universal enrollment (once you graduate from high school you can enroll)	
Most majors are broad and not always linked to a specific job/certification	Many majors are career-specific	
Higher cost	Lower cost

You earn benefits/salary as you serve	You have benefits/salary from your first day	You may or may not have a scholarship	Your tuition, housing, food is all provided for 4 years and you earn a stipend
Your job is based on ASVAB score, your interests, and what the service needs	Your job is based on ASVAB score, your interests, and what the service needs	Your service is separate from your major - you are learning the military	Your service is separate from your major - you choose a branch after junior year



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Trades/Apprenticeships

<u>WHY</u>

- Enter the workforce quickly
 - You may earn income during or right after graduation while you train
- Can earn credentials in 2 years or less

<u>COST</u>

- Community College is often more affordable than a for-profit trade school
- State funding (FAFSA, G3, Fast Forward)
 - You can train for FREE

PROGRAMS OF STUDY

- Associate Degrees
- Certificates
 - Welding, Real Estate, InfoTech
 - \circ Health Care
 - $\circ~$ Early Childhood Education

ADDITIONALLY

- Many trades are in fields that are high in demand
 - \circ Willing to pay
 - $\circ~$ Good benefits
 - Educational Benefits
 - Job Growth/Security
