#### Governor Newsom Signed 75% of Governor Brown's Vetoed Bills

Almost two weeks removed from taking his final actions on legislation for the 2019 year, the Capitol community continues to analyze Governor Gavin Newsom's legislative actions in his first year as governor. In particular, many were wondering what Governor Newsom would do with the numerous bills that were vetoed by former Governor Jerry Brown and reintroduced by lawmakers this past year with the hopes that Governor Newsom would sign those measures into law. Research by policy consultants and other Capitol insiders have found that there were eighty-eight bills that were vetoed by Governor Brown during his tenure that were reintroduced this past year and made it to Governor Newsom's desk. Of those eighty-eight bills, Governor Newsom signed sixty-six into law and vetoed the other twenty-two.

Some of the previously vetoed bills that were signed into law by Governor Newsom that will have implications for the K-12 system include:

- Assembly Bill (AB) 218 (Chapter 861/2019) extends the time for commencement of actions for childhood sexual assault to forty years of age or five years from discovery of the injury; provides enhanced damages for a cover up, as defined, of the assault; and provides a three-year window in which expired claims would be revived
- AB 1507 (Chapter 487/2019) eliminates the authorization for a charter school to be located outside the boundaries of its authorizer and allows a charter school to establish resource centers within the jurisdiction of the school district where the charter school is located, if explicitly approved by the charter authorizer
- Senate Bill (SB) 126 (Chapter 3/2019) requires charter school governing boards to comply with a variety of the same open meeting, conflict-ofinterest, and disclosure laws as traditional school district governing boards
- SB 223 (Chapter 699/2019) authorizes the governing board of a school district, a county board of education, or the governing body of a charter school to adopt a policy that allows a parent or guardian of a pupil to possess

and administer nonsmokeable and nonvapeable medicinal cannabis to the authorized pupil at a school site

- SB 328 (Chapter 868/2019) requires the school day for middle schools and high schools, including charter schools, but excluding rural school districts, to begin no earlier than 8:00 a.m. and 8:30 a.m., respectively, by July 1, 2022, or the date in which a district's collective bargaining agreement that is operative on January 1, 2020, expires
- SB 419 (Chapter 279/2019) extends the permanent prohibition against suspending a pupil enrolled in K—3 for willful defiance to include grades 4 and 5 permanently and grades 6–8 until July 1, 2025, and applies these prohibitions to charter schools

Some of the education bills that were previously vetoed by Governor Brown that were also vetoed by Governor Newsom this year include:

- AB 171 (Gonzalez, D-San Diego) would have prohibited an employer from discharging, discriminating, or retaliating against an employee who is a victim of sexual harassment and would have established a rebuttable presumption of unlawful retaliation based on the employee's status if the employer took certain action within ninety days of receiving notice or obtaining knowledge of the victim's status
- AB 500 (Gonzalez) would have required school districts, charter schools, and community colleges to
  provide at least six weeks of full pay for pregnancy-related leaves of absence taken by certificated,
  academic, and classified employees
- AB 751 (O'Donnell, D-Long Beach) would have required the State Superintendent of Public Instruction
  to approve one or more nationally recognized high school assessments, such as the SAT or ACT, and
  would have allowed local educational agencies (LEAs) and charter schools, at their own discretion, to
  administer in lieu of the grade 11 Smarter Balanced Summative Assessment
- SB 695 (Portantino, D-La Cañada Flintridge) would have required an LEA, upon a parent's request, to translate a pupil's completed Individualized Education Program (IEP) and any revisions to the pupil's IEP as well as any evaluation, assessment, or progress data used to determine eligibility or to develop the IEP that is discussed at an IEP team meeting

It is important to note that some of the issues that Governor Newsom has vetoed this year does not necessarily mean that he is against that specific proposal. In fact, he may be willing to use some of those issues as future bargaining chips in budget and policy negotiations with the Legislature, or he may be more inclined to sign certain measures into law a few years from now particularly if public opinion or the political climate changes on a certain issue.

#### Petitions for a Property Tax Change are Coming to a Grocery Store Near You. Here's What To Know

Signature gatherers are coming to a grocery store near you armed with petitions to put an initiative on the 2020 ballot that would change property tax law in California.

Supporters, including top Democratic presidential candidates and labor unions, say it will make big corporations pay their fair share to help fund schools and local services. Opponents, mostly business interests, argue raising taxes on them will drive up prices for everyone.

Here's what you need to know about the new initiative proposal:

#### WHAT WOULD THE 'SPLIT ROLL' INITIATIVE DO?

The proposed ballot measure aims to charge big businesses more in property taxes. Right now, California taxes all property based on its purchase value, with increases over time to account for inflation and reassessments when a building is renovated.

The proposed initiative would tax commercial properties worth more than \$3 million based on current assessed value. That would require local governments to assess business property periodically and split their tax rolls between those taxed based on current value and those still taxed on purchase value.

Property tax rates would remain at 1 percent.

The measure exempts residential and agricultural property, and delays implementation for properties that are mostly rented out to small businesses. The measure would also end taxes on personal property, such as equipment and furniture, for businesses with fewer than 50 employees to insulate small businesses from rising costs. It would also exempt up to \$500,000 worth of personal property from taxation for larger businesses.

The Legislative Analyst's Office estimates the measure would generate between \$7.5 billion and \$12 billion annually for schools and local governments.

#### MARK ZUCKERBERG, BERNIE SANDERS SUPPORT IT

California's teachers unions and the Service Employees International Union have thrown their weight behind the measure. To date, Facebook founder Mark Zuckerberg and his wife Priscilla Chan's philanthropic arm, the Chan Zuckerberg Initiative, is the campaign's largest donor.

A handful of top Democratic presidential candidates have also endorsed the measure, including California Sen. Kamala Harris, Massachusetts Sen. Elizabeth Warren and Vermont Sen. Bernie Sanders.

"A corporate tax loophole has allowed billions to be drained from our public schools & local communities to benefit wealthy investors. No more," Harris tweeted earlier this month, mentioning SEIU and the California Teachers Association. "Proud to support @seiucalifornia and @WeAreCTA's efforts to close this loophole."

Tyler Law, a spokesman for the initiative, said the current law benefits older businesses over newer ones and that bought their property more recently. The initiative will level the playing field, he said, and raise money for schools and local services like firefighters and police.

"Most of us all want similar things, good schools for our children, safe neighborhoods, and yet for many decades wealthy investors in big corporations have not been paying their fair share," Law said. "This initiative closes that corporate loophole."

#### **BUSINESS GROUPS, RETAILERS OPPOSE IT**

Groups representing businesses and property owners are driving the opposition to the measure, which they see as a big threat to their profits.

"When I talk to my members, small, medium and large, this is the No. 1 issue that scares them," said Rachel Michelin, president of the California Retailers Association. "They are terrified about the split roll initiative, they are terrified about what it will do to their bottom line."

California Taxpayers Association President Rob Gutierrez argues the protections for small businesses aren't strong enough. Because many small businesses are renters, higher property taxes on the buildings they rent space in will result in more expensive rent for them, he said.

"What that translates into is higher prices for consumers and brick and mortar stores," he said. "Dry cleaners, grocers, companies that cannot move, will have to find a way to pass these costs on."

Opponents characterize the measure as an attack on Proposition 13 of 1978, which created California's current property tax rules to keep property taxes low for both businesses and residents. The proposed initiative would only change parts of Proposition 13 applying to businesses, not residential property, but opponents are highlighting the law's residential property tax protections.

California Business Roundtable President Rob Lapsley says his group is funding a multi-million dollar effort to convince Californians to defend Proposition 13. Many of the group's talking points and materials focus on residential property tax rates. They're building an email list of Californians who say they support the current law, Lapsley said.

That effort isn't currently registered to campaign against the split roll proposal, but if the measure makes it to the ballot, Lapsley said they'll train their sights on defeating it. The Business Roundtable is also a major donor to the official campaign against the measure.

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#### WHEN CAN I VOTE ON THE PROPOSED INITIATIVE?

Backers of the split roll proposal were cleared to begin gathering signatures last week. They have 180 days to collect nearly 1 million signatures from supporters to place the measure on the November 2020 ballot.

Note: Not only could there be a potential referendum for AB 5 on the November 2020 ballot, but there could also be a number of bills introduced in 2020 that will attempt to modify the ABC test and add additional exemptions to the law.

#### The Political and Policy Tensions of AB 5 (Dynamex)

Some have questioned the business community advocating a "support, if amended" position on AB 5 (Gonzalez), the bill that seeks to codify last year's California Supreme Court ruling in *Dynamex Operations West* regarding worker classification and impose the "ABC Test".

The Supreme Court and subsequent appellate court decisions have ruled up to this point that the *Dynamex* decision applies only to the IWC's Wage Orders governing meal breaks and rest periods, overtime, etc. AB 5 would expand the reach of the court's decision.

However, for practical purposes, the California Supreme Court is unlikely to make a different determination than it did in *Dynamex* if other Labor Code claims (e.g., employee expense reimbursement) or a UI claim were brought forth and the business claimed that the "ABC Test" did not apply. Hence, while AB 5 does expand the scope of the court's decision, it is probably just a matter of time before those expansions occur judicially.

In addition, AB 5 would apply to all industries even though the *Dynamex* decision only interpreted one of 17 Wage Orders (Wage Order # 9, Transportation Industry). However, all of the IWC Wage Orders have the same language that was interpreted by the Supreme Court in *Dynamex*, so there is no reason to believe the Court would rule differently if cases were brought under the other Wage Orders.

AB 5 represents a tension between achieving some success (i.e., limiting the reach of the court decision) or possibly no success. Without a statute, the *Dynamex* decision is the "law of the land" in California. Hence, if there are to be any changes to the ABC Test, or if any industry or profession wants to be excluded from the ABC Test, it needs a statute to do so.

Other bills were introduced earlier this year to codify the previous test used for determining independent contractor status (the *Borello* case) or invoke the federal test, but those measures were unsuccessful. As such, the business community was left with AB 5.

There are essentially three issues that should have been addressed in AB 5: the ABC Test itself (no changes were made to it); the industries exempted (many professions received an exemption, while numerous ones did not); and, the effective date whether the law is prospective or retroactive (only addressed for those exempted from the ABC Test).

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Unfortunately, AB 5 did not modify the ABC Test itself. The *Dynamex* decision's application of the ABC Test is among the strictest of the states because it does not provide any flexibility. For example, other states allow two of the three prongs to be met; or they are less limiting in the B Prong dealing with workers in the "usual course of business" of the hiring entity.

The second issue concerns the "exemptions." More than thirty occupations have been provided exemptions. However, there are dozens of professions that are licensed and regulated pursuant to the Business & Professions Code, for example, that are not included in AB 5. Moreover, there should be several generalized exemptions, such as a business-to-business agreement or workers who meet temporary staffing demands.

Finally, but certainly one of the most critical issues, is the effective date of the ABC Test. As a matter of public policy and fundamental fairness, it should be made prospective. While the Supreme Court's decision was silent on the issue, changing the law really should ensure this new test is not applied retroactively. The only way to do so is with a statute.

In the end, while some of these core issues were only partially addressed, passing AB 5 was basically the only "game in town." Hopefully, during the upcoming 2020 Legislative Session, there will be changes made to the ABC Test itself and additional exemptions added to the law.

#### 2019 CAASPP Results Show Modest Growth

The 2019 results for the California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress (CAASPP) were released on Wednesday, October 9, 2019. The CAASPP results serve as the foundation for the academic indicators in the California School Dashboard.

Statewide, the percentage of students meeting or exceeding standards for English-language arts (ELA) and math increased by roughly 1% from the prior year. Over a three-year period, the percentage increased by nearly 3% on both assessments.


While students as a whole are showing modest progress across the state, the results are very different when reviewed by student group. The number of economically disadvantaged students achieving or exceeding the

standards in ELA increased by 1.27% from the prior year. The growth for this group in math was similar at 1.24%.

However, the percentage of students not classified as economically disadvantaged remained relatively flat, with less than half a percent increase in math proficiency and a 0.2% increase in ELA proficiency.

State Superintendent of Public Instruction (SPI) Tony Thurmond expressed concern over the performance disparities among white and Asian students compared to other students of color. Students of color consistently scored below the statewide average for proficiency in both ELA and math. Only 28% of Hispanic students were proficient in math compared to nearly three-quarters of their Asian peers. For ELA, only one-third of African-American students met the standards compared to nearly two-thirds of white students.



SPI Thurmond indicated an intent to work with data experts to evaluate what might be causing such a dramatic difference between student groups; noting, "All students should have an equal opportunity to succeed academically and enter the workforce prepared with the needed skills to compete in the industries that drive our state forward."

The CAASPP results are an excellent resource for K-12 school agencies to measure student progress and assist in monitoring the needs of students. In addition, examining comparative data from districts that share similar student demographics can also provide critical insight on student progress and in the development of the instructional planning process. Regarding: High School Class Sizes for Core Classes

The purpose of this communication is to provide the Board information on high school core class sizes.

The collective bargaining agreement with the Fresno Teachers Association (FTA) includes staffing ratios for grades K-12. For grades 9-12, the ratio is 1:29. Staff monitors classes to ensure class sizes stay at a reasonable and equitable level.

In the past, teachers in core classes with enrollment greater than 37 received additional mitigations. Beginning in the 2019/20 school year, the class size that included these mitigations was reduced to 36 and Career Technical Education and Visual Arts were included along with core classes.

The chart below shows the number of classes over 36 for 2019/20 and over 37 for the prior years. To ensure consistency, the data was pulled for each year based on the California enrollment census date, which is always in early October. The Board's additional investments and staff diligence to balance core classes have resulted in only three classes over 36 for 2019/20. One of the three classes over 36 was Latin I at Fresno High with enrollment of 37. For this class, FTA submitted a specific request to allow an exception on behalf of the teacher.

On September 25, 2013, the Board of Education approved participation in the CERBT administered by CalPERS. As a reminder, the CERBT is a Section 115 trust, which is dedicated to prefunding Other Post-Employment Benefits (OPEB). The first contribution was made in February 2014. Since that time, the district has contributed \$39.6 million, with the last contribution of \$3.5 million in 2018/19. CalPERS provided an annual update in October 2019 which showed the annual internal rate of return was 6.05% since the first contribution and had earnings of \$11.3 million. If these same funds had remained with the County Treasurer, the district would have earned \$2.6 million. Therefore, district resources are approximately \$8.7 million higher due to these deposits being held in the irrevocable trust. 







The purpose of this communication is to provide the Board information for the agenda item on November 6, 2019, to approve the positions and adopt job descriptions for Laborer – Filter Changer, Laborer – Maintenance, Equipment Operator I, and Equipment Operator II.

The Maintenance Unit has evolved over time due to changes in technology and an emphasis on labor savings through use of equipment and district growth. These positions reflect the need to focus on more specific areas of maintenance duties and applicable license requirements.

In accordance with the Side Letter Agreement between Fresno Unified and Fresno Teachers Association-Trades, job titles and job descriptions will be eliminated for Maintenance Worker I (Grades, M-03, M-06, M-09), Maintenance Worker II (Grade M-15), Maintenance Worker III (Grade M-24), and Maintenance IV (Grade M-39); and new job titles and job descriptions will be Laborer – HVAC/Filter Changer (Grade M-15), Laborer – Maintenance (Grade M-15), Equipment Operator I (Grade M-24), and Equipment Operator II (M-39).

Laborer – HVAC/Filter Changer (formerly Maintenance Worker I and Maintenance Worker II): performs a variety of unskilled and semi-skilled maintenance work on school facilities, building facilities and equipment. This position does not require a DMV Class A license.

Laborer – Maintenance (formerly Maintenance Worker I and Maintenance Worker II): performs a variety of unskilled and semi-skilled construction, maintenance and repair work on school grounds, buildings facilities and equipment. This position does not require a DMV Class A license.

Equipment Operator I (formerly Maintenance Worker II): operates a variety of power equipment and machinery, requiring skilled level of the removal of excess soil and refuse, and supports other departments with installation, construction, maintenance and repair work on school grounds, buildings facilities, and equipment. This position may serve in a lead capacity for other maintenance personnel. This position requires a DMV Class A license.

Equipment Operator II (formerly Maintenance Worker III & IV): performs a variety of heavy equipment operation and fence installation, operates power equipment and machinery for the removal of excess soil and refuse, supports other departments with installation, construction, maintenance and repair work on school grounds, buildings facilities, and equipment. This position may serve in a lead capacity for other maintenance personnel. This position requires a DMV Class A license.

The purpose of this communication is to provide the Board information regarding the recommendation to approve the Provisional Internship Permits.

The Provisional Internship Permit (PIP) was created in response to the phasing out of emergency permits. It allows an employing agency to fill immediate staffing needs by rehiring a candidate who is enrolled in a credentialed program. The candidate will receive staff development targeted to the needs of our students and will be required to make progress in becoming fully credentialed.

Requirements for Initial Issuance and Renewals (Title 5 California Code Regulations, Section 20021.1)

- Initial issuance requirements require possession of a baccalaureate degree or higher from a regional accredited college or university, verification of passage of CBEST, and successful completion of course work for the permit type requested
- One-time renewal issuance requirement allows employing agency to request a one-time renewal
  of the PIP if the holder has taken all appropriate subject matter examinations (CSET) as
  determined by the college or university

Regarding: Student Neighborhood Resource Officer Program Update

The purpose of this communication is to provide the Board information regarding the 15 Student Neighborhood Resource Officers (SNROs) assigned to middle schools. The Fresno Police Department (FPD) informed the district that to provide adequate coverage for officers throughout the community, there is a possibility that SNROs may be reassigned from school campuses to patrol duties for up to 50% of their shift. The district pays half the cost of each SNRO, and the adjustment in duties is allowable per the district-FPD agreement, which states: "... availability shall be in the sole determination of FPD's Chief of Police ... taking into consideration any factors including, without limitation, health of officers, shortage of manpower, funding, and duty assignment of officer(s) to higher priority matters."

This information is being conveyed to the affected schools. The Safety Office will be notified, and will notify site administration, when a SNRO is to be reassigned away from a school. If there is a specific concern or incident at a school during the time an officer is not on site, there will be a priority response.

The SNRO agreement covers May 1, 2016 through April 30, 2020, for officers hired under a Community Oriented Policing Services grant through the US Department of Justice. Staff are in discussions with FPD regarding the future of the SNRO program.

The purpose of this communication is to provide the Board information regarding Fresno Adult School's (FAS) recently awarded 2019 United States Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) Citizenship Assimilation grant in the amount of \$250,000.

The 2019 Citizenship and Assimilation grant provides the opportunity to prepare lawful permanent residents for citizenship by offering both citizenship instruction and naturalization application services. FAS provides citizenship classes that are required for the program and partners with the San Joaquin College of Law (SJCL) to provide naturalization application services.

- FAS provides citizenship instruction to prepare lawful permanent residents for the naturalization test and interview required by the program
- SJCL provides naturalization application services, within the scope of immigration law, to support lawful permanent residents in the naturalization application and interview process required by the program

During the 2019/20 and 2020/21 school years, FAS will partner with SJCL to provide these services to over 200 students who qualify under the USCIS provisions.

Students who qualify may enroll in these classes at FAS. Classes include 40 hours of citizenship instruction in conjunction with legal support from SJCL who will prepare and submit necessary applications and provide on-going case management for naturalization.
