Parents or guardians are responsible for bringing any new, unopened medication to the nurse's office.


This includes cough drops.

Helping Your Child Hear Word Sounds

The ability to hear individual sounds in words supports the development of strong reading and writing skills. Here are some ways to help build this skill:


- Ask your child to blend (put together) two sounds to make a word.
 - \circ m $\bar{e} \rightarrow$, me \check{a} t \rightarrow at n $\bar{o} \rightarrow$ no
- When you say a word, you can add a sound to a word part to make a new word. Tell your child: "say ate, add /g/ to the beginning and the word is...." and your child would say: "gate". Other words to use:
 - -eep, add /k/ to the beginning → keep
 - \circ -et, add /j/ to the beginning \rightarrow jet

Phonemic Awareness

Phonemic awareness activities take place orally. Try these fun language play activities to build reading flexibility:


- Give your child a word and have them repeat it back to you. Then add a sound to the beginning and see if they can tell you the new word
 - Say race→ add */b/ to the beginning and the word is? → brace
 - Say car → add */s/ to the beginning and the word is?→ scar
- Give your child a word and have them repeat it back to you. Then, take away the first sound and see if they can tell you the new word.
 - Say blink→ without */b/ what's left is? → link
