Creating and maintaining a safe and orderly environment is essential for learning. We maintain a comprehensive school safety plan and have emergency preparedness coordinators to train and instruct our staff. Our safety plan addresses disaster preparedness, personal characteristics of students and staff, school rules, routines and procedures, and Newport Coast Elementary physical and social environment. Our school safety team meets to address safety issues for students and employees. NCE participates in school-wide emergency drills every month using the Standard Response Protocol.

The 2024-2025 School Safety Plan was approved by the School Site Council on January 10, 2024 and approved by the Local Board of Education on February 13, 2024. The plan was last updated and reviewed with faculty on August 14, 2024.
