Dear WPS Families,

We are excited to share some best practices for helping students master their basic math facts! Strong math fact fluency provides a foundation for problem-solving and boosts confidence in tackling more complex math concepts.

Here are some practical tips to keep in mind:

### 1. Make It Fun and Engaging

- Use games like flashcards, board games, or apps that turn math practice into a fun activity.
- Encourage activities like math scavenger hunts, where students look for everyday numbers to solve simple problems.
- Incorporate math into daily routines (e.g., while cooking or shopping) by asking them to add, subtract, or count.

#### 2. Keep Practice Short and Frequent

- Keep math practice sessions brief (10-15 minutes) but consistent. Short, daily practice helps build fluency without overwhelming the child.
- Break up longer sessions into multiple short bursts to keep them light and enjoyable.

### 3. Focus on Understanding, Not Just Memorization

- Emphasize strategies like using doubles (e.g., 6 + 6) or making 10 (e.g., 7 + 3) to develop a deeper understanding of how numbers relate to each other.
- Ask your child how they got their answer. This can reinforce mathematical thinking.

#### 4. Use Math Fact Songs or Rhymes

• Songs or chants can help students remember math facts in a rhythmic, enjoyable way.

#### 5. Be Positive and Celebrate Progress

- Celebrate your child's progress and growth, no matter how small. Positive reinforcement can build confidence and motivation.
- Don't show frustration if your child struggles. Instead, encourage them to "keep trying."

#### 6. Practice in Different Ways

- Mixing up practice methods (oral, written, visual, and hands-on) can keep children engaged. Using manipulatives like coins, buttons, or blocks can also help make abstract math more concrete.
- Try interactive activities like skip-counting or using objects to represent math problems.

#### 7. Focus on Fluency, Not Speed

• Focus on your child understanding the math facts rather than racing to complete problems quickly. Speed can come with time as they become more fluent.

#### 8. Incorporate Technology (Sparingly)

• There are great math apps or websites for supplemental practice, but balance screen time with hands-on activities.
