Preventative. Working with community & 5th precinct.





AREAS FOR IMPROVEMENT





AREAS FOR IMPROVEMENT: Security Within Buildings

Suggestions: A/C, Shatterproof window film, clearer room number displays

Improve protocols for visitor check-in at large events

Single point of entry to building

Tighten protocol for Parent IDs, procedures for student pick-up from office Explore consequences for repeatedly propping doors. Look into Door Ajar system Door procedures after school/SCOPE are less stringent, inconsistent.



AREAS FOR IMPROVEMENT: Security Outside of Buildings

Recess in session during UPK pickup.
Parents can access recess field.

Anyone can come to outdoor events, Field Day, etc.

Single point of entry to campus

Suggestions include:
Privacy Fencing,
Guard Booths,
Single Entry/Exit

Gates should always be locked. Need better perimeter monitoring.

Need better oversight of arrival/dismissal. Some doors left ajar. Should verify who students are released to.



AREAS FOR IMPROVEMENT: Technology & Communication

Cameras: complete coverage. Sensors?

Better cell service, ensure RAVE App works even in poor wifi Enhance communication about security protocols and procedures.

Continue Trainings such as Active Shooter and Stop the Bleed

Buildings need better cell service

Better/widely equip buildings with supplies & equipment for emergency.
Outdoor AED.




QUESTION #3

Some community members are asking us to provide armed perimeter guards in cars, outside of each school building. Please let us know how you feel about this proposition.




PERIMETER GUARDS





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PERIMETER GUARDS Comments in Support

Armed guards perimeter or inside will know building and can respond quickly.

Schools without guards are a target.

I am very comfortable with armed perimeter but not armed inside.

Working in district with armed guards and feel safe (5)

A practice employed elsewhere: rotate who is armed and nobody knows who it is.

Is there research to not support this?



PERIMETER GUARDS Comments in Opposition

False sense of security.

Threat can come from inside or outside.

Data shows high number of school shootings that had armed guards present.

Money should be spent on other ways to improve security. I do not feel advantages outweigh costs.

I am concerned about human error, gun getting into wrong hands.

The role of guns should remain on police, will disrupt culture. Schools should not need this level of protection.



PERIMETER GUARDS Other Comments

Would a perimeter guard be effective for a student who brings a gun to school?

What would be a better deterrent?

Marked or unmarked?

What would the expectations be of perimeter guards?

What qualifications, training, type of firearm, communication between perimeter guards and building?

Will there be further discussion if armed inside guards are considered?

Should be a research-based decision and a more detailed plan.





A lot is being done (5)

My child uses the strategies she learns (2)

STRIDES, Connect Day, Community Events, Color Run, Carnival. Great idea to bring on PM Pediatrics.

Good communication, well-staffed. Commendation to Mrs. Makris.

Frost Valley is essential for SEL.

Continue providing parent education.

Continue to normalize the conversations surrounding mental health to reduce stigma.

Some students worry about confidentiality.

How are we being more inclusive, especially for students at risk?



MENTAL HEALTH

Peer-to-peer restorative justice and mediation.

Students need to be reminded that their confidentiality will be protected.

What is counselor role in SEL learning? Should have a K-5 counselor.

Important to focus on the negative effects of social media, phone, and other tech that is harming this generation

Cyberbullying - good job teaching but need better follow-through when issue arises.

Make and share plan to better identify "at risk" students

Instruction for students on following gut feelings/instinct for threats

Elem-MS Transition is toughest. Kids need more help navigating difficult years.

How do we support students' mental health after they leave? Are there programs for graduates?



MENTAL HEALTH Questions



If kids are bullied, how are they being supported?

Should mental health be part of this forum, is this what parents should be teaching? Do we know if mental health services result in fewer fights, issues, school refusals?

Do students know where they can go in a crisis or need help?

Is anonymity upheld if a student reports? If so, do students know that?



ADDITIONAL COMMENTS Policy

Do teachers, guards have a say? Can they have an opportunity to comment (anonymously if they wish)?

The armed guard petition was brought to light but it seems like other avenues weren't explored.

We should explore doing a community vote for this decision. Possibly at same time as budget.

Need to clarify that perimeter guard enters in case of incident. Does that individual intervene if threat is from inside?

Other support to explore: dedicated SRO, other tools for guards (Taser), are vestibules bullet proof?

Policy focus should be: how can we secure entry to delay danger and buy time?



ADDITIONAL COMMENTS Improving Current Protocols

Can we invite local law/first responders to drills? Evaluate, give feedback, familiarity.

Reinforcing with students to not let people in. Will cameras catch if they do?

More detail on current procedures (unless confidential). What do guards do? How do we monitor students returning from suspension for making threats?

Pre-Screen List for Open/Special Events (ex: Trunk or Treat) Would like to hear from families affected by school shootings.

ADDITIONAL COMMENTS General

Small groups were a great format for this conversation.

There are some people who still don't feel comfortable sharing their opinion at risk of being ostracized by louder voices.

It is good to be proactive.

More communication is good, but streamline.
Color code priority notices? Consistent system across buildings.

Overcommunication is key. Don't keep us wondering. That's when chatter happens.

Concerned for everyone in the building - staff, students.
