La Mariposa offers arts enrichment through music education, grade level theatrical performances, and visual arts instruction. The school was recognized as a 2008 California Distinguished School. ## 2024-25 Quality, Currency, Availability of Textbooks and Other Instructional Materials

Instructional Materials (School Year 2022-23)

The school district held a public hearing on October 20, 2022 and November 17, 2022, and determined that each school within the district had sufficient and good quality textbooks, instructional materials, or science lab equipment pursuant to the settlement of Williams vs. the State of California. All students, including English learners, are given their own individual standards-aligned textbooks or instructional materials, or both, in core subjects for use in the classroom and to take home.

Textbooks and supplementary materials are adopted according to a cycle developed by the California Department of Education, making the textbooks used in the school the most current available. Materials approved for use by the State are reviewed by all teachers and a recommendation is made to the School Board by a selection committee composed of teachers and administrators. All recommended materials are available for parent examination at the district office prior to adoption.

La Mariposa was originally constructed in 2002 and is comprised of 28 permanent classrooms, three portable classrooms, one multipurpose room, a library, a Maker Space, a staff lounge, a kitchen, a playground, three resource rooms, two work rooms, and two conference rooms.

### Cleaning Process

Two full-time custodians ensure that the cleaning of the school is maintained to provide for a clean and safe school.

### Maintenance and Repair

District maintenance staff ensure that the repairs necessary to keep the school in good repair, and work orders are completed in a timely manner. A work order process is used to ensure efficient service and highest priority is given to emergency repairs.

##### Parent and Community Involvement

Our School Site Council (SSC), helped develop and approve our School Plan for Student Achievement. Our English Learner Advisory Committee (ELAC) is encompassed into our SSC, and we have a parent representative that attends the District ELAC meetings and reports back to the SSC. We are fortunate to have a very active PTA, with more than 600 members who fund field trips, art instruction, physical education, instructional assemblies, and classroom enrichment materials and activities. Parents/caregivers volunteer many hours in our Teacher Assistance Program to help coordinate the home reading program, work in the classroom, assist in the library and chaperone on field trips.

The school is also very involved in the community. La Mariposa participates in the Stuff a Bus drive and Veterans/Military supply collection. La Mariposa has 15 classroom gardens.

and regulations pertaining to hazardous materials and state earthquake standards. The School Site Safety plan is reviewed and updated in the fall and spring of each year by school staff. All revisions are communicated annually to both the classified and certificated staff. The school's disaster preparedness plan includes steps for ensuring student and staff safety during a disaster. Fire and disaster drills are conducted on a regular basis throughout the school year. Lockdown drills are held twice per year. All certificated and classified staff have been trained in active threat response in 2022. Students are supervised before and after school by teachers and campus supervisors, as well as during lunch and break periods. There is a designated area for student drop off and pick up. Visitors must sign in at the office using the Raptor system. Unauthorized visitors are not permitted on campus.
