**Teacher Qualification Data**

- Identifies the number and percentage of inexperienced teachers, principals, and other school leaders
- Reports teachers who are teaching with emergency or provisional credentials
- Includes teachers who are not teaching in the subject or field for which they are certified

**NAEP Data (National Assessment of Educational Progress)**

- Provides state results of the national assessment in Mathematics and Reading every other year in grades 4 and 8

**Civil Rights Data**

- Provides information on school quality, climate and safety

Review the table below listing our schools. During the 2020-21 school year, schools were identified using definitions and labels as required in the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA). A Targeted Support and Improvement (TSI) school is one that has at least one underperforming

student subgroup. An Additional Targeted Support (ATS) school is one that has a student subgroup performing at the same level as the lowest 5% of all schools in the state. A Comprehensive Support and Improvement (CSI) school is one whose performance is in the lowest 5% of all schools in the state or has a graduation rate at or below 67%. Some schools are not identified with any of these labels. In these cases, no status label is given.

Our students are among the top performing students in the state of Michigan. All of our buildings have attained achievements above the state average. The district embraces a continuous improvement model for staff and students, and the district has identified specific goals at district and building levels. Haslett Public Schools has implemented a K-12 “multi-tiered system of support” for students at risk for failure. Each of our school buildings has a professional “Response to Intervention” coach who works closely with building principals to support struggling students.

Based on the Spring 2023 M-STEP scores, Murphy Elementary School and Haslett Middle School were each named a Reward School by the Michigan Department of Education. Murphy Elementary School and Haslett Middle School aggregate M-STEP scores were in the top 5% for the state of Michigan.

The Haslett Board of Education supports active parent involvement in our schools. The Board understands that parents play a central role in the education of our children. Parents can provide a strong educational foundation by maintaining regular contact with their children's teachers, volunteering at school, attending planned parent/teacher conferences, open houses, and other school events.
