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


Superintendent's Corner

This week our Hawthorne Wildcats celebrated winter and writing in a variety of ways.

First grade families gathered yesterday for Family Literacy Night. Teachers dressed as snow people and read books to students and their parents in the multi purpose room and cafeteria. Families then participated in a variety of activities to strengthen ELA skills including word searches and scrambles, "fishing" for rhyming words, and reading stories with purpose to answer questions and find clues to solve puzzles. As an added bonus, students were asked to donate books for a book swap and each family was left with a new book to add to their personal collection. In kindergarten math classes, students practiced dividing shapes into multiple parts and then wrote and read sentences about the shapes they were studying. This multi-step activity reinforces the importance of reading skills in math studies. In art, second graders embarked on an imaginative journey to the Arctic, where they developed their drawing skills by creating polar bear habitats. Using Model Magic, students created a 3D polar bear by learning how to properly form a ball, divide clay into pieces, and roll pieces into different-sized coils. Look for these special projects to make a reappearance at the 2nd Grade Celebration of Learning later this year.
