Cancer is a struggle in today's society, and 24% of people who die of cancer do not receive a cancer diagnosis before their death. Mihalik wants to conduct a survey next year about what the students would want to do in the Relay For Life.

"I think next year what I would like to do is do a survey of events because this year we just had the same events that we normally have, plus the student council picked a few new ones, but because we moved it to October, we found out that a lot of athletes weren't allowed to take part in like athletic events because of games and things like that."

Timothy Pancake, the middle school principal, also said the Relay for Life went well. Pancake says Relay For Life teaches students the impact of cancer and its effect on life. One thing Pancake wishes had gone better were the transitions from event to event. "I think there's some things that can make transitions a little bit easier. For example, when Mr. Beilhart finished speaking and everyone did a lap, for all the teachers' sake to make sure everyone was safe, I think there's a way like 'hey, when everyone is done finishing with their lap, you need to go to your fire drill yard line.' That way, every kid was accounted for; they were in their spot."

Relay For Life is an amazing fundraising event that teaches such a big message, while still making it enjoyable for students. All kids pay money to get concessions, do the bounce-houses, and for extra things like root beer floats. This year's Relay For Life was amazing; hopefully next year, it will be even better and raise even more money for those in need.
