Woodrow Wilson Elementary School provides a warm, stimulating environment where students are actively involved in learning academics as well as positive values. Students received a standards-based, challenging curriculum by dedicated professional staff and based on the individual needs of the students. Ongoing evaluation of student progress and achievement helps us refine the instructional program so students can achieve academic proficiency.

We have made a commitment to provide the best educational program possible for Woodrow Wilson Elementary School's students, and welcome any suggestions or questions you may have about the information contained in this report or about the school. Together, through our hard work, our students will be challenged to reach their maximum potential.

### School Description

Woodrow Wilson Elementary School is located in the city of Selma and serves students in grades transitional kindergarten through six following a traditional calendar. At the beginning of the 2023-24 school year, 342 students were enrolled, including 20.5% in special education, 37.1% qualifying for English Language Learner support, and 86.8% qualifying for free or reduced price lunch.

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## Student Achievement

### Physical Fitness

In the spring of each year, Woodrow Wilson Elementary School is required by the state to administer a physical fitness test to all students in grade five. The physical fitness test (PFT) for students in California schools is the FITNESSGRAM. The main goal of the test is to help students in starting life-long habits of regular physical activity.

The FITNESSGRAM has six parts, though California currently requires five parts be completed annually, that show a level of fitness that offer a degree of defense against diseases that come from inactivity. ### California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress

The California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress (CAASPP) System includes the Smarter Balanced Summative Assessments (SBAC) for students in the general education population, and the California Alternate Assessments (CAAs) for students with the most significant cognitive disabilities. Only eligible students may participate in the administration of the CAAs. CAAs items are aligned with alternative achievement standards, which are linked with the Common Core State Standards (CCSS). CAASPP results are a measure of how well students are mastering California's standards in English language arts/literacy (ELA) and mathematics, and are given to grades three through eight and grade eleven. SBAC tests assess student performance in ELA/Literacy and mathematics utilizing computer-adaptive tests and performance tasks, and CAAs test items are aligned with alternative achievement standards which are linked with the Common Core State Standards (CCSS).

The CAASPP results shown in this report include overall results comparing the school, district and state scores as well as the school's overall score in each applicable subgroup. Results are shown only for subgroups with ten students or more taking the exam. For those categories that are blank in the tables, no students met subgroup criteria. ## School Facilities & Maintenance

The district takes great efforts to ensure that all schools are clean, safe, and functional through proper facilities maintenance and campus supervision. Woodrow Wilson Elementary School's original facilities were built in 1980; ongoing maintenance and campus improvements ensure facilities remain up to date and provide adequate space for students and staff. District maintenance and site custodial staff ensure that the repairs necessary to keep the school in good condition are completed in a timely manner. A work order process is used by school and district staff to communicate non-routine maintenance requests. The following campus improvements or repairs were completed in 2023-24 and planned for 2024-25:

2023-24 Campus Improvements:

- Installation of a shade structure to playground
- Installation of a PA system and projector in the cafeteria
- Calshape water conservation project
- Restroom modernization

2024-25 Planned Campus Improvements:

- restroom modernization
- Universal Pre-K/ELOP building project

Every morning before school begins, the custodian inspects facilities for safety hazards or other conditions that need attention prior to students and staff entering school grounds. One day custodian and three part-time evening custodians are assigned to Woodrow Wilson Elementary School. The day custodian is responsible for:

- Cafeteria setup/cleanup
- General grounds maintenance
- Office area cleaning
- Restroom cleaning
- Trash removal

Restrooms are checked regularly throughout the day for cleanliness and subsequently cleaned as needed. The evening custodians are responsible for:

- Classroom cleaning
- Cleaning desktops and whiteboards
- Common use area cleaning
- Office area cleaning
- Restroom cleaning

The principal communicates with custodial staff daily concerning maintenance and school safety issues.

Rating Description

Fair: The school is not in good repair. Some deficiencies noted are critical and/or

widespread. Repairs and/or additional maintenance are necessary in several areas of the school site.

### Campus Supervision

School administration and teaching staff place a high priority on providing adequate adult supervision on campus before, during, and after school. As students arrive on campus each morning, the principal and campus safety assistants are strategically assigned to designated entrance areas, the breakfast area and playground. During recess, campus safety assistants supervise playground activity. Campus safety assistants monitor lunch time activity in the cafeteria and on the playground. At the end of the day when students are dismissed, the principal and campus safety assistants monitor student behavior to ensure a safe and orderly departure.

Woodrow Wilson Elementary School is a closed campus. During school hours, all visitors must sign in at the school's office and wear identification badges while on school grounds.

### School Site Safety Plan

The Comprehensive School Site Safety Plan was developed for Woodrow Wilson Elementary School in collaboration with local agencies and the district office to fulfill Senate Bill 187 requirements. Components of this plan include child abuse reporting procedures, teacher notification of dangerous pupil procedures, disaster response procedures, procedures for safe arrival and departure from school, sexual harassment policy, and dress code policy. The school's most recent school safety plan was reviewed, updated, and discussed with school staff in January 2025.

## Classroom Environment

### Discipline & Climate for Learning

Woodrow Wilson Elementary School's discipline practices and behavior management strategies comply with approved board policies and are designed to create effective learning environments and minimize classroom disruptions. Progressive discipline and proactive measures are employed in the classroom for those students experiencing difficulty following school rules and demonstrating positive behavior. Disciplinary intervention is managed by school administrators in a fair, firm, and consistent manner based upon the nature of each situation. Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS) structures are in place to support and promote positive behavior.

### Staff Development

Decisions concerning selection of staff development activities are performed by all staff using tools such as teacher input, state assessment results, and data analysis to determine the areas in which additional teacher training may enhance classroom instruction and increase student achievement levels. Woodrow Wilson Elementary School supports ongoing professional growth throughout the year during weekly PLCs and during staff meetings. Teachers meet in grade level teams to conduct data analysis to identify areas of need. Teaching staff are provided the opportunity to participate in district-sponsored staff development workshops or training sessions as 1) a supplement to site-based staff development, 2) for reinforcement of or follow-up on previous training, or 3) follow-up training for newly implemented programs/curricula.

**Instructional Materials**

All textbooks used in the core curriculum at Woodrow Wilson Elementary School are aligned to the California Content Standards and Frameworks. Instructional materials are selected from the state's most recent list of standards-based materials and adopted by the State Board of Education. The district follows the State Board of Education's eight-year adoption cycle for core content materials (English/language arts, math, science, and social science).

On Tuesday, September 24, 2024, the Selma Unified School District's Board of Trustees held a public hearing to certify the extent to which textbooks and instructional materials have been provided to students. The Board of Trustees adopted Resolution #25-15 which certifies as required by Education Code §60119 (1) that textbooks and instructional materials were provided to all students, including English learners, in the district to the extent that each pupil has a textbook or instructional materials, or both, to use in class and to take home, and (2) sufficient textbooks and instructional materials were provided to each student, including English learners, that are aligned to the academic content standards and consistent with the cycles and content of the curriculum frameworks in math, science, history-social science, and English/language arts.

In addition to core subject areas, districts are required to disclose in their SARCs the sufficiency of instructional materials used for their visual/performing arts curricula. During the 2024-25 school year, Selma Unified School District provided each student, including English learners, enrolled in a visual/performing arts

class with a textbook or instructional materials to use in class and to take home. These materials complied with the state's content standards and curriculum frameworks.

Full-time equivalent (FTE) is a standard measurement used to identify an employee's regular work load on a weekly basis. ### Expenditures Per Student

For the 2022-23 school year, Selma Unified School District spent an average of \$20,025 of total general funds to educate each student (based on 2022-23 audited financial statements and in accordance with calculations defined in Education Code §41372).
