



Hudson City School District received a four-star rating on the State of Ohio Auditor's Star Rating System. This is the Highest Achievement for the Award. A four-star rating means that the district was compliant with all Sunshine Law requirements and has implemented at least five best practices.

Local Property Taxes

The chart to the left shows the distribution of the district's revenue sources for its main Operating Fund, the General Fund. Property taxes* make up 79% of all district operating revenue. Property taxes are supported by operating levies. After 12 years with no new operating levies, we want to thank the Hudson community for passing a new 5.5 mill operating levy in November of 2023.

State Funding

State foundation funding and all of its components represent 16% of the district's revenue. The Ohio formula that governs state funding places Hudson on the "State Guarantee." As a guarantee district, Hudson receives a fixed amount of state funding that has limited growth due to Hudson's property and income wealth. In fact, in 2010 Hudson received 21% of its revenue from the state; today the district only receives 16% of its funding from the state.


Expenses by Purpose

The chart to the right depicts the district's actual operating expenses for Fiscal Year 2024. When the categories of Instruction, Instructional Support, Transportation, and Extracurricular are combined, 80.4% of all expenditures are directly tied to the student experience.

The district regularly endeavors to contain costs and reduce expenses through market and data analysis. Notably, a bus route audit completed in 2023 led to a reduction in transportation costs while maintaining safe and reliable service for our students.

New levy operating funds have allowed the district to:


- Maintain current class sizes
- Continue student support services provided by aides, intervention specialists, and small group instructors
- Provide learning resource centers and labs for PreK-12
- Fund investments in safety, health, and wellness including: a third School Resource Officer; maintaining clinical/school counselors; and increased access to mental health providers


DISTRICT PER PUPIL EXPENSE COMPARISON

The chart below compares categories of spending per pupil among 14 comparable, high-performing school districts in Northeast Ohio. Spending per pupil varies among school districts based upon the total funding available and the number of students enrolled. The Hudson City School District spends \$15,730 per pupil, which is less than the average (\$16,187) of this peer group.



District Performance Ranking vs. Spending Per Pupil

The Performance Index is a state-wide comprehensive academic measurement that measures the test results of every student in a school district. The higher the performance level on state tests, the higher the index score. The chart below illustrates Hudson's comparably high performance index alongside district per pupil spending. While maintaining very reasonable spending levels, Hudson City Schools has been able to achieve extraordinary academic results and experiences compared to its peers.

FINANCIAL FORECAST


The Hudson City School District has maintained a positive cash position over the last several years due to the continued financial support of the Hudson Community and the passage of the November 2023 operating levy. Revenue from new residential and commercial construction has also helped to sustain the district financially. In addition, the district has consistently employed efforts to contain and reduce spending, including staffing and programming reductions, staffing efficiencies, operational efficiencies, and a recent operational budget reduction. Inflationary increases in basic operational costs as well as a rise in expenses related to student learning and supports following COVID-19 have prompted the district to continually evaluate ways to operate in the most effective and efficient manner, while maintaining the high-quality programming our community has come to expect.

DISTRICT CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS

In Fiscal Year 2024, Hudson City Schools invested \$8.2 million (8% of district expenditures) into district facilities and equipment that directly impacts the comfort, safety, security, and learning of Hudson students. These capital investments include a major upgrade in the High School HVAC system, Hudson Memorial Stadium turf replacement, instructional technology, as well as over \$500,000 that was dedicated to directly improving the safety and security of our students.



- High School HVAC: New building wide HVAC system designed to greatly improve the air quality and comfort for High School students and staff while improving efficiency. This allowed for air conditioning in certain areas of the High School for the first time.
- Safety & Security: Improvements to enhance the safety/security of our students such as new cameras throughout the district, building card readers, security film for windows, and new two way radios to improve emergency communication.
- Athletic Facilities: Replaced the artificial playing surface, repaired the track, and installed a new lacrosse netting system at Hudson Memorial Stadium; installed a new diving board at the Ada Cooper Miller Natatorium.
- Technology: Upgraded student facing technology to enhance the learning experience, including new Chromebooks and classroom smartboards.
- Building & Grounds: Routine upkeep on district facilities such as roofing, paving, windows, and doors; playground safety enhancements at Ellsworth Hill.
