Principal's Message

Welcome to Robert Bruce School. We are located on the west side of Santa Maria. Our enrollment is currently 1,058 transitional kindergarten through sixth grade students which includes six district extensive services classes. Our facility also hosts a state preschool, a county Migrant Head Start preschool, migrant preschool, and a county Physical Therapy Unit.

Robert Bruce provides school activities and parent education opportunities at convenient hours for parents. We are proud of the high level of parent participation we have for Family Night activities and Parent Teacher Club (PTC) events, Parent Classes, and FACTOR for parents.

Robert Bruce staff and parents believe that everyone working together, building on our strengths, and taking responsibility enables us to provide an educational program that prepares students for a changing world by emphasizing high academic standards, cooperation, self-respect, and respect for others. The staff is committed to our mission, which is to provide a focused curriculum with high academic standards, to prepare all students to be successful and productive citizens who make meaningful contributions to our culturally diverse community, and to provide students with a safe and nurturing learning environment.

Mission

The Robert Bruce school community is committed to cultivating confident, successful, self-motivated, problem-solving students. We will be digitally empowered to innovate through technology which will lead to independent thinkers who have high expectations for themselves and their futures.

The Bruce staff and students will encompass a culture of respect and a love for learning. This will lead to an environment that promotes safety and kindness for all.

School Description

Robert Bruce Elementary School is located in Santa Maria and serves students in grades pre-kindergarten through six following a traditional calendar. At the beginning of the 2023-24 school year, 998 students were enrolled, including 12.6% in special education, 76.5% qualifying for English Language Learner support, and 93.1% qualifying for free or reduced price lunch.

Student Achievement

Physical Fitness

In the spring of each year, Robert Bruce Elementary School is required by the state to administer a physical fitness test to all students in grade five. The physical fitness test (PFT) for students in California schools is the FITNESSGRAM. The main goal of the test is to help students in starting life-long habits of regular physical activity.

The FITNESSGRAM has six parts, though California currently requires five parts be completed annually, that show a level of fitness that offer a degree of defense against diseases that come from inactivity. The test results can be used by students, teachers, and parents. Comparative District and state results can be found at the CDE's web site www.cde.ca.gov/ta/tg/pf.

California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress

The California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress (CAASPP) System includes the Smarter Balanced Summative Assessments (SBAC) for students in the general education population, and the California Alternate Assessments (CAAs) for students with the most significant cognitive disabilities. Only eligible students may participate in the administration of the CAAs. CAAs items are aligned with alternative achievement standards, which are linked with the Common Core State Standards (CCSS). CAASPP results are a measure of how well students are mastering California's standards in English language arts/literacy (ELA) and mathematics, and are given to grades three through eight and grade eleven. SBAC tests assess student performance in ELA/Literacy and mathematics utilizing computer-adaptive tests and performance tasks, and CAAs test items are aligned with alternative achievement standards which are linked with the Common Core State Standards (CCSS).

The CAASPP results shown in this report include overall results comparing the school, district and state scores as well as the school's overall score in each applicable subgroup. Results are shown only for subgroups with ten students or more taking the exam. For those categories that are blank in the tables, no students met subgroup criteria. School Facilities & Maintenance

The district takes great efforts to ensure that all schools are clean, safe, and functional through proper facilities maintenance and campus supervision. Robert Bruce Elementary School's original facilities were built in 1956; ongoing maintenance and campus improvements ensure facilities remain up to date and provide adequate space for students and staff. District maintenance and site custodial staff ensure that the repairs necessary to keep the school in good condition are completed in a timely manner. A work order process is used by school and district staff to communicate non-routine maintenance requests. Emergency repairs are given the highest priority. During the 2023-24 and 2024-25 school years, the following campus repairs or improvements were completed or planned:

2022-23 Campus Repairs or Improvements

- Installation of shade structure in assembly area in front of library
- Restroom improvements
- Solar improvements
- Renovation of fields
- Addition of walking path

2024-25 Planned Campus Repairs or Improvements

- Create fenced area to accommodate increase in TK and Kinder enrollment called Kinderland

Every morning before school begins, the custodian inspects facilities for safety hazards or other conditions that need attention prior to students and staff entering school grounds. One day custodian and three evening custodians (two full-time and one part-time) are assigned to Robert Bruce Elementary School. The day custodian is responsible for:

- Classroom cleaning
- Cafeteria setup/cleanup
- Groundskeeping
- Office area cleaning
- Restroom cleaning

Restrooms are checked throughout the day for cleanliness and subsequently cleaned as needed. The evening custodians are responsible for:

- Classroom cleaning
- Office area cleaning
- Restroom cleaning

The principal communicates with custodial staff daily concerning maintenance and school safety issues.

Rating Description

Good: The school is maintained in good repair with a number of non-critical deficiencies noted. These deficiencies are isolated, and/or result from minor wear and tear, and/or are in the process of being mitigated.

Campus Supervision

School administration and staff place a high priority on providing adequate adult supervision on campus before, during, and after school. As students arrive on campus each morning, administrators, and student supervision staff are strategically assigned to designated entrance areas and the playground. During recess, administrators and student supervision staff and special education staff supervise playground activity. Administrators and student supervision staff and special education staff monitor lunch time activity in the cafeteria and on the playground. At the end of the day when students are dismissed, administrators and teachers monitor student behavior to ensure a safe and orderly departure. Students in grades TK-1st grade are dismissed straight to an appropriate adult.

Robert Bruce Elementary School is a closed campus. During school hours, all visitors sign in at the school's office with a valid state issued identification card to be scanned through the Raptor security system and wear the printed identification sticker while on school grounds.

School Site Safety Plan

The Comprehensive School Site Safety Plan was developed for Robert Bruce Elementary School in collaboration with local agencies and the district office to fulfill Senate Bill 187 requirements. Components of this

plan include child abuse reporting procedures, teacher notification of dangerous pupil procedures, disaster response procedures, procedures for safe arrival and departure from school, sexual harassment policy, and dress code policy. The school's most recent school safety plan was reviewed, updated, and discussed with school staff in August 2024.

Classroom Environment

Discipline & Climate for Learning

Robert Bruce Elementary School's discipline practices and behavior management strategies comply with approved board policies and are designed to create effective learning environments and minimize classroom disruptions. Restorative practices and, when necessary, progressive discipline is employed in the classroom for those students experiencing difficulty following school rules, and proactive measures are utilized for those demonstrating positive behavior. Disciplinary intervention is managed by school administrators in a fair, firm, and consistent manner based upon the nature of each situation. In addition to progressive discipline, the site provides a Multi-Tiered System of Supports (MTSS) to improve student behavior and academic achievement.

Staff Development

All training and curriculum development activities at Robert Bruce Elementary School revolve around the California State Content Standards and Frameworks. During the 2023-24 school year, Robert Bruce Elementary School held staff development training devoted to:

- Behavior Response Intervention Strategies

Decisions concerning selection of staff development activities are performed by all staff using tools such as teacher input and data analysis to determine the areas in which additional teacher training may enhance classroom instruction and increase student achievement levels. Robert Bruce Elementary School supports ongoing professional growth throughout the year on early release days. Teachers meet in grade level teams to conduct data analysis to identify areas of need. Teaching staff are provided the opportunity to participate in district-sponsored staff development workshops or training sessions as 1) a supplement to site-based staff development, 2) for reinforcement of or follow-up on previous training, or 3) follow-up training for newly implemented programs/curricula.

Instructional Materials

All textbooks used in the core curriculum at Robert Bruce Elementary School are aligned to the California Content Standards and Frameworks. Instructional materials are selected from the state's most recent list of standards-based materials and adopted by the State Board of Education. The district follows the State Board of Education's eight-year adoption cycle for core content materials (English/language arts, math, science, and social science).

On Wednesday, September 11, 2024, the Santa Maria-Bonita School District's Board of Education held a public hearing to certify the extent to which textbooks and instructional materials have been provided to students. The Board of Education adopted Resolution 24-04 which certifies as required by Education Code §60119 (1) that textbooks and instructional materials were provided to all students, including English learners, in the district to the extent that each pupil has a textbook or instructional materials, or both, to use in class and to take home, and (2) sufficient textbooks and instructional materials were provided to each student, including English learners, that are aligned to the academic content standards and consistent with the cycles and content of the curriculum frameworks in math, science, history-social science, and English/language arts.

In addition to core subject areas, districts are required to disclose in their SARCs the sufficiency of instructional materials used for their visual/performing arts curricula. During the 2024-25 school year, Santa Maria-Bonita School District provided each student, including English learners, enrolled in a visual/performing arts class with a textbook or instructional materials to use in class and to take home. These materials complied with the state's content standards and curriculum frameworks.

Specialized Instruction

All curriculum and instruction are being aligned to the California State Standards approved by the State Board of Education. The instructional program is structured so that all students receive instruction appropriate to their learning level. Teachers use a variety of research-based instructional strategies and techniques using state-approved instructional materials to ensure academic success.

For students whose primary language is not English and who have limited English proficiency, Robert Bruce Elementary School offers programs to help them acquire English as quickly as possible and prepare them to meet the state's academic content standards. English learners work with bilingual aides in a small group and/or individualized setting in the general education classroom. Instruction focuses on reinforcement of class lessons, frontloading of upcoming lessons, and reading intervention. All students receive English Language Development instruction as a supplement to their regular language arts instruction. Robert Bruce Elementary School's teachers utilize Benchmark for grades K-5 and Study Sync for grade 6, both state-approved textbook adoptions. English learners are assessed annually using the English Language Proficiency Assessment for California (ELPAC) exam; results are used to evaluate student progress, intervention programs, and teaching strategies.

Robert Bruce Elementary School's special education program is staffed by special education teachers, a Resource Specialist Program Teacher, a speech therapist, and an adaptive physical education specialist. Instruction is provided in the least restrictive environment and based on each student's Individual Education Plan (IEP). Students have access to a comprehensive curriculum and are mainstreamed into the general education class, with small group and individualized instruction in the resource room. The IEP team meets annually to establish goals and objectives, define academic instruction, evaluate the effectiveness of the student's plan, and make instructional adjustments as necessary. Robert Bruce Elementary School takes advantage of the district's participation in the Santa Barbara Special Education Local Plan Area, which provides a pool of professional resources and expertise in the field of special education. The County offers a severely Handicapped class at the site and added services to accommodate.

Robert Bruce Elementary School provides a variety of intervention and remediation programs to support students' efforts to achieve academic success and reach grade level expectations. Using district benchmark assessments and end-of-unit exams, teachers and administrators can identify students who are struggling or performing below state proficiency grade level standards. For those students who need extra help in any subject area, an MTSS Team pulls together school and family resources to identify and develop strategies to help students improve academic and/or behavioral performance. Intervention strategies include:

Supplementary instructional materials are purchased as needed to support intervention programs. Classroom teachers monitor student performance on district benchmark assessments, daily classwork, homework, and end-of-unit tests to measure ongoing academic progress and adjust instructional needs.

Professional Staff

Counseling & Support Staff

Robert Bruce Elementary School provides professional, highly qualified staff that provide additional services and support centered on the whole student academically, physically, and mentally. The Counseling and Support Services table in this report illustrates the availability of non-instructional support staff to Robert Bruce Elementary School's students. Full-time equivalent (FTE) is a standard measurement used to identify an employee's regular work load on a weekly basis. For example, an FTE of 1.0 designates a full-time position and the employee is on campus and available all day every day of the week; an FTE of 0.5 indicates that the staff member is available and on campus a portion (50%) of the week.
