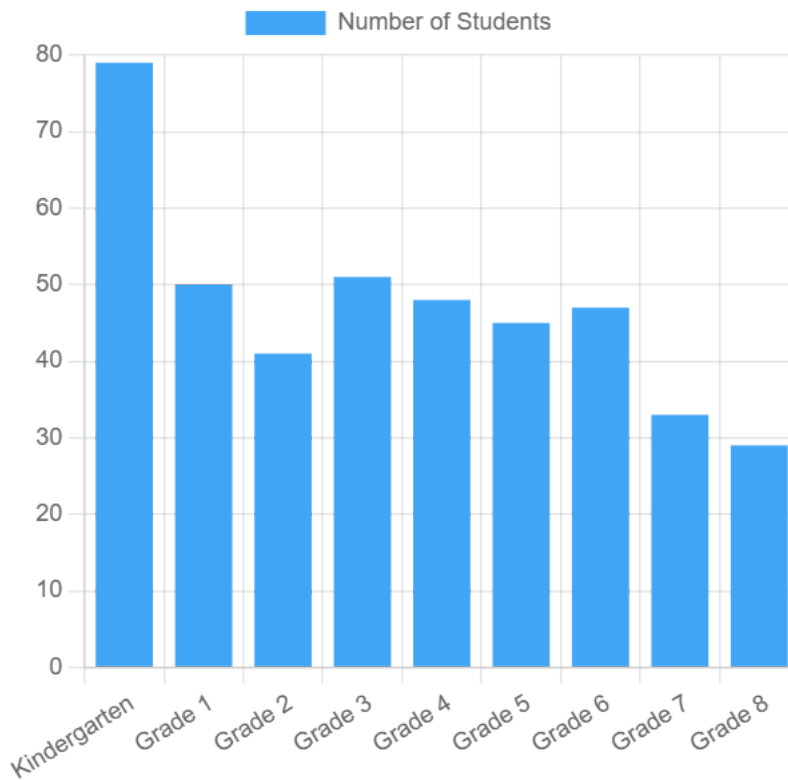

School Facility Conditions and Planned Improvements

Christopher Elementary is a traditional elementary campus with several classroom building wings and a central building for administration, cafeteria, and library.

The Summer 2024, the student restrooms along the blacktop were renovated with new interior finishes, accessibility upgrades, new toilet fixtures, and new partitions. The staff restrooms were also renovated to provide three individual restrooms that are non-gender.

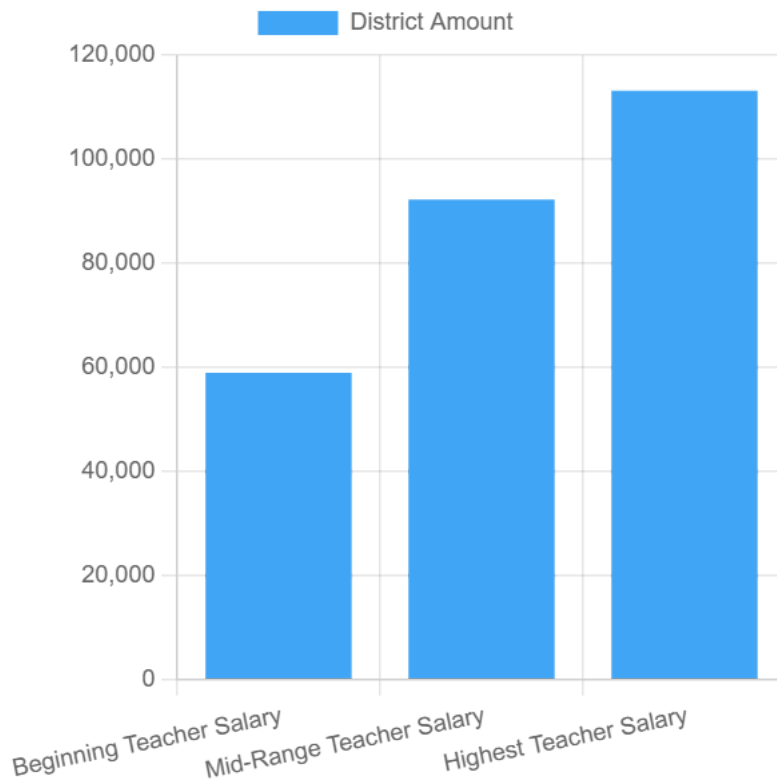

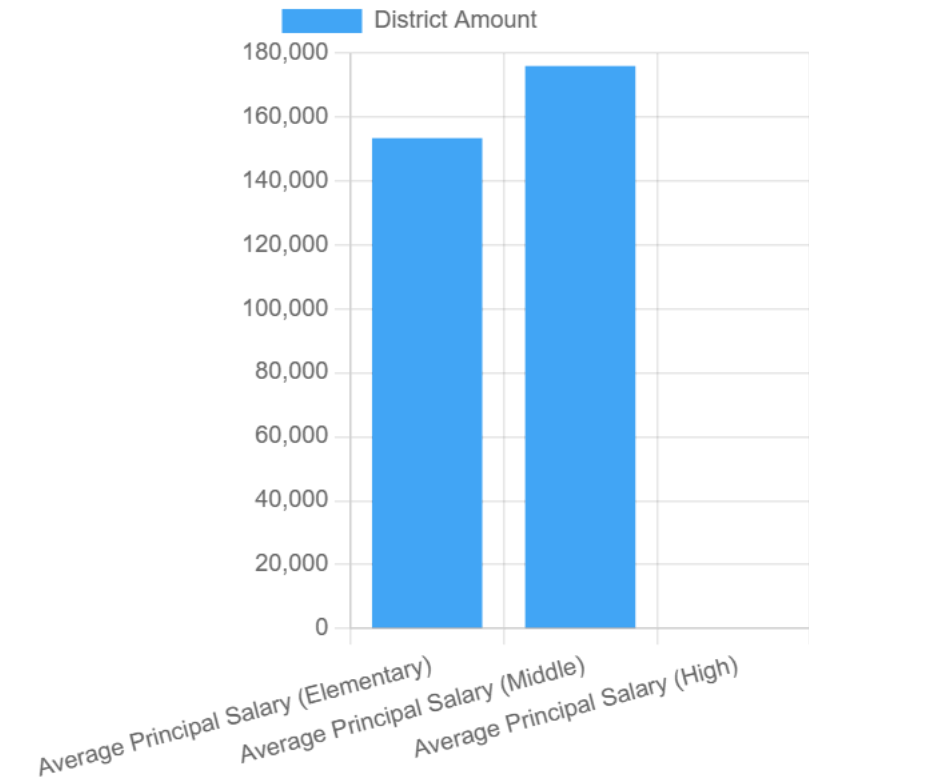
