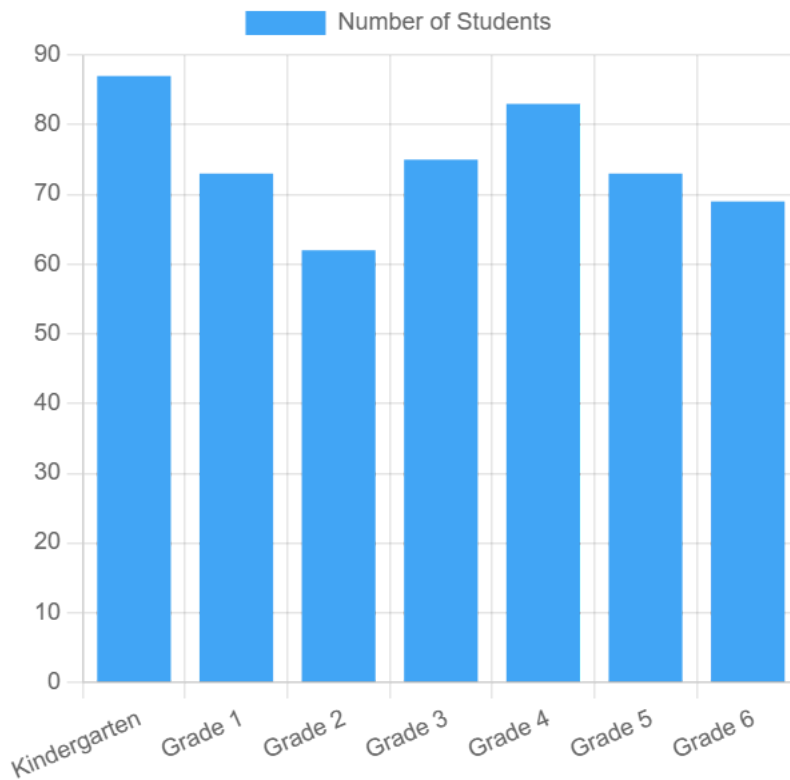
Goal 3 - We will provide an inclusive learning environment for students with disabilities.

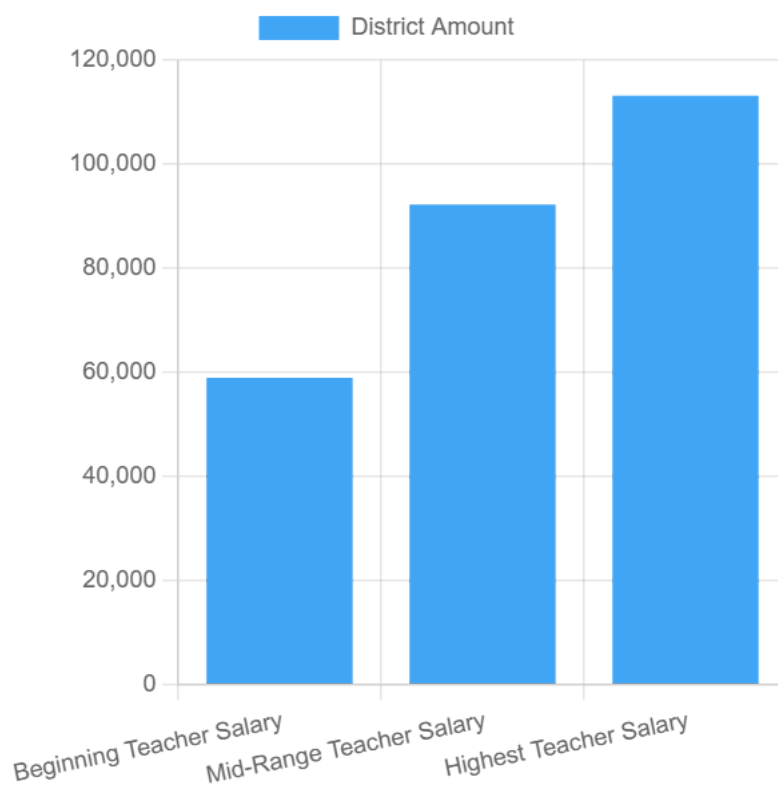

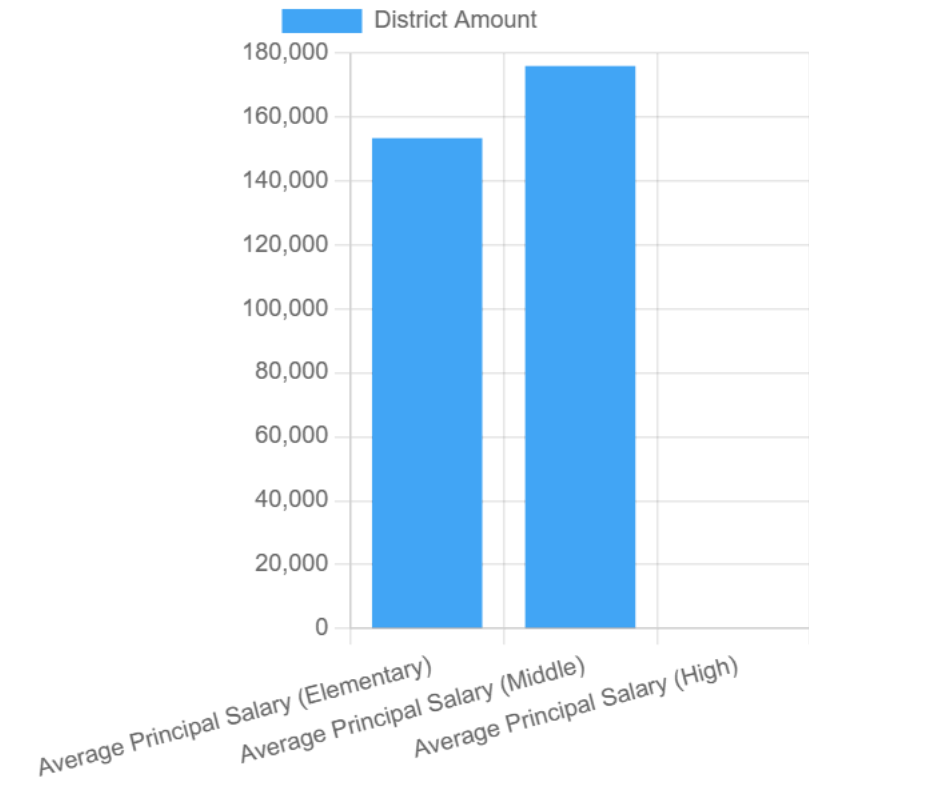
