It is hard to believe that we are a little more than halfway through the 2024-25 school year!

I'd like to take a moment to recognize and celebrate the incredible efforts and achievements that help to shape our school community. The success of our District is a direct reflection of the hard work and commitment of our students, staff, and families who strive daily to make our schools an exceptional place to learn, work, and grow.

L-C continues to be one of the highest-performing districts in Northeast Wisconsin and across the state based on the 2023-24 District Report Cards from the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction (DPI). L-C ranked among the top 20% of state school districts, finishing 82nd of 421 districts and earning an Exceeds Expectations designation. This type of achievement occurs because of L-C's highly qualified and dedicated teachers and staff. Their unwavering passion, patience, and dedication make a profound difference in the learning and growth of our students.

L-C High School has 47.6% of students (153) participating in Youth Apprenticeship or other work-based learning programs. This is nearly triple the state average! Additionally, nearly 1 in 10 L-C High School students earned at least one- industry recognized credential last year. These results could not have been achieved without the support and collaboration of our community and business partners. Their forward-thinking, engagement, and monetary, supply, and equipment donations have been instrumental in driving our career-readiness vision forward.

Primary School News

Reading Assessments

The middle of the year brings about student assessments in reading and math to determine where students are in their learning. In 2023, the State of Wisconsin passed a law called Act 20. This law states that each student in grades 4K-3 will take an assessment called the AimswebPlus Early Reading Screener. A screener is an assessment that quickly checks students' reading skills. While utilizing screeners has been done for a number of years in the Luxemburg-Casco School District, this is the first year we are utilizing AimswebPlus.

The screener will check important literacy skills including alphabet knowledge, letter sound knowledge, phonemic awareness, decoding, and oral vocabulary. The skills are tested differently based on the student's grade level. The AimswebPlus Early Reading Screener will take place 3 times per year. The screening took place in fall and will be repeated again in the winter and spring.

Beginning with the winter screening window, parents will receive their student's reports sharing their student's percentile rank which helps show how the student's score compares to others at the same grade level. The information from the early reading screener is one way that our teachers will learn about and monitor students reading skills. If a student's score is below the 25th percentile, a reading plan will be developed to help that student meet grade-level goals. This is called a Personalized Reading Plan, or PRP, PRPs are now required by the state. While plans for reading intervention have been in place for many years in our district, this will be the first time a formal plan is required by law. Our district is in a very good position to meet the requirements of Act 20 thanks to the hard work of our staff and our teaching practices.



College & Career Skills At the Primary School

In today's rapidly evolving world, employers are increasingly looking for candidates who possess technical knowledge and have a strong foundation of interpersonal skills and emotional intelligence. In the Luxemburg-Casco School District, we recognize the importance of preparing our students for the workforce by focusing on sof skills—qualities such as communication, teamwork, empathy, problem-solving, and adaptability. At a young age, we begin teaching these skills and qualities to support students in practicing and developing their interpersonal-emotional skills. The old saying, "Everything I need to know I learned in Kindergarten," does have merit when it relates to these skills. To support this at the Primary School, we have introduced the Character Strong curriculum, this school year.



Character Strong is a comprehensive program designed to help students develop essential soft skills that are critical for success in their personal, academic, and eventually, professional lives. The curriculum has an overarching monthly focus for the school with grade-specific engaging lessons that align with the monthly focus. The focus characteristics include Respect, Responsibility, Gratitude, Empathy, Perseverance, Honesty, Cooperation, Courage, Creativity, and Kindness. By actively engaging with these components, students have begun to develop an in-depth understanding of interpersonal and social-emotional skills. Additionally, they are beginning to build the foundational skills employers highly value.

Embedded into the curriculum each month is a song that supports the students' learning relating to the monthly theme. The students enjoy learning the songs and singing them each day during their Character Strong time. During school assemblies, the songs are replayed and students sing along showing the whole school what they have learned about that month's theme. Furthermore, Character Strong encourages students to take ownership of their actions, practice emotional regulation, and engage in constructive problem-solving—skills that are crucial for self-regulation, managing stress, and maintaining a positive school/work environment. As we continue to prepare our students for the future, the Character Strong curriculum will play a key role in helping them develop the soft skills needed to become kind, caring, and well-rounded individuals.

After a successful first year, the Whoa Board is back! The Whoa Board is a student accountability system that focuses on positive student behavior. When students act using our Spartan Way expectations: being safe, responsible, or respectful, they earn a Whoa ticket from a teacher. Once a student earns a Whoa ticket, they fill out their information on the ticket, place it in the ticket box, and initial an open box on the Whoa board itself. Once the board is filled, Mrs. Mleziva draws between 8-12 student tickets and those students earn a reward such as T-shirt, popcorn, or ice cream party.



Middle School News

Semester Transition As Part of Exploration

Once a student gets to the middle school level, their academic pathway becomes much more of a secondary one than an elementary one. LCMS students are scheduled into classes that are traditionally referred to as "required" or "core content" including English language arts, math, science, social studies and physical education. Additionally, we have seventh graders take an introductory level computer course, while we have eighth graders take a course that serves as an introduction to word processing and personal finance. However, they also begin to have more choices in their schedule.

Each year our students have the opportunity to select elective courses they are interested in or they would like to try. They are able to select classes in art, family and consumer science, music, Spanish and tech. ed. During the middle of January, when the first semester transitions to the second, the majority of our students experience changes in their schedules that have them completing one of those courses and starting a new one. These opportunities are valuable experiences for them during the current school year; and, they can be very informative when they begin the process of course selection for the upcoming school year. For our eighth graders looking forward to high school, it adds a height-

ened level of excitement.

Supporting Personal Finance:

A Partnership with Fox Communities Credit Union and Bank of Luxemburg

This fall, Luxemburg-Casco High School took a significant step toward equipping students with essential financial skills by partnering with Fox Communities Credit Union and Bank of Luxemburg. Through innovative tools, engaging presentations, and interactive events, these partnerships emphasized the importance of financial literacy and saving habits.

Empowering Students with "Cashy" and the Savings Challenge

One of the standout features of the initiative was "Cashy," an investment tool sponsored by Fox Communities Credit Union and Bank of Luxemburg. This program, along with in-class presentations and the Reality Store event, encouraged students to think critically about their financial futures.

To inspire students to practice real-life saving skills, Fox Communities Credit Union introduced the Savings Challenge. Students were tasked with saving \$10 weekly throughout the semester, using accounts at any local bank or credit union, and submitting proof of their savings to their teacher.

Although 15 students began the challenge, only two persevered to the end. Their

The Reality Store: A Glimpse into Real-Life Finances

Participants began with a career of their choice and navigated through various stations representing real-life expenses and decisions, such as insurance, vehicle choices, and budgeting.

The exercise highlighted the connection between career choices and financial planning, helping students understand the challenges of maintaining a balanced budget while managing day-to-day expenses.

Things are ADDING up for the Math Team!

The Luxemburg-Casco Math Team is back up and running and the team will tell you math and fun absolutely mix.

The fun includes competing in the Packerland Conference math league. The LC team currently has 19 members, freshmen through seniors. They hold their practices on Mondays during Spartan Time, and the Packerland league meets are held Monday evenings virtually.

What happens during the competitions? High school mathematics teacher and Math Team Advisor Kyle Schleis explains: "At each meet, students take four individual tests that are 15 minutes in length. The tests are comprised of four questions, two of which are two points and two questions that are 3 points for a total of 10 points on each test."

The test topics typically cover Algebra, Geometry, Algebra 2 and other problem-solving topics. After the four individual tests, there is a 20-minute team test consisting of six questions each worth 10 points.

The top five scores for each grade earn a medal at the meets. There are 9 schools competing in the League with a JV level as well. At the end of the season the top 2 varsity and top 2 JV teams earn plaques for their schools

At the first meet this year, Emma Schraufnagel earned a fourth-place medal for the seniors, Rylen Hinckely earned fourth among juniors, and Eva Waigand earned a fifth-place medal among sophomores. As a team, varsity earned a fifth-place finish in a very competitive meet while the JV team earned a 3rd place finish.

If you want to try out your skills and see what type of problems the students work on, here is a sample question provided by the Wisconsin Mathematics Council for a state-wide meet: "How many different combinations of 1, 2, and 3 point baskets are there to score 10 points in basketball?"

Remember, the clock has started...and it's a great day to think mathematically! By the way, there are 14 different combinations of 1, 2, and 3 point baskets for a player to score 10 points in a game of basketball.


