

















# About Tom Leick-Burns: Director of the Grand Théâtre de la Ville de Luxembourg

Tom Leick-Burns trained as an actor at the Drama Centre London. He worked extensively in both theatre and film, including a Shakespeare production of The Tempest and the comedy The complete works of William Shakespeare (abridged), before joining the team of the Grand Theatre, Luxembourg, in 2005. He completed an MBA at Sacred Heart University in 2012 and was appointed artistic director and general manager of the Theatres de la Ville de Luxembourg in 2015. He lives with husband David, their twin girls Billie and Tippi and their dog Coco in Beggen.

#### About James Cooney: Adjudicator

James trained as an actor at LIPA and has an MA in Actor training and coaching from the Royal Central School of Speech and Drama, London.

James has worked across a range of media over the last ten years. He was nominated for Best Actor at the Off West End Awards for Bottleneck by Luke Barnes. In 2016, James began working with The Royal Shakespeare Company. His credits include Hamlet, King Lear and The Taming of the Shrew amongst others. His recent work includes The 47th by Mike Bartlett at The Old Vic.

TV credits include the Disney+ Star Wars spin-off series Andor, as well Casualty, The ABC Murders and Silent Witness for The BBC. James has also worked in radio and voice over for commercials and video games.

As an acting tutor, James is currently course leader of the Acting: The Play short course at Central. He has facilitated acting workshops for Italia Conti, Arts Ed, The Central School of Speech and Drama and North West End Acting school, as well as sessions across East Sussex. James has sat on the audition panel for the LIPA BA Acting course and ArtsEd Acting foundation.



#### A Note from the Festival Director, Ms Williams

This festival aims to give young people who attend schools in Luxembourg the opportunity to play with Shakespeare's texts, to make them relevant and to tell the stories in whatever way they want to, even if that means turning a tragedy into a comedy or a comedy into a tragedy. They can use music, dance, stage combat or slapstick comedy, as long as they have fun telling their story as a piece of theatre.

Studying Shakespeare is a challenge for anyone. The old language can be a barrier to understanding the stories when reading anything by Shakespeare. But when performed on stage, these old stories still entertain and enthral an audience. Even now, 400 years after his death, the themes of love, ambition, death, fate and free will, to name a few, are still relevant and can be seen in almost every modern movie

# A Midsummer Night's Dream by William Shakespeare

Lycée Ombrosa is a French international school located in the beautiful city of Lyon, France. We are a group of Year 11 students presenting our interpretation of a scene from A Midsummer Night's Dream. Our version is set in a contemporary context, highlighting the tempestuous relationship between the 'power couple,' Titania and Oberon, King and Queen of the fairies. The conflict revolves around a young changeling boy whom Titania refuses to give up, fueling Oberon's jealousy. This leads to Oberon enlisting the trickster Puck to interfere, using a magical flower containing a love potion. Meanwhile, the servant fairies, despite their loyalty to Titania, are easily distracted in the chaos.



#### The Tempest by William Shakespeare

AIS students take on the challenge of adapting Shakespeare's The Tempest into a 25-minute performance, focusing on the key moments of the story. The play follows Prospero, a powerful magician and the rightful Duke of Milan, who was betrayed and stranded on an island with his daughter, Miranda. When his enemies sail nearby, Prospero uses his magic to create a storm, shipwrecking them. With the help of the spirit Ariel and the resentful islander Caliban, he seeks revenge—but ultimately chooses forgiveness. Through this adaptation, students simplify the language and action while keeping the heart of the story intact.
