#### STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT



In ELA, Kindergarten students are focusing on short vowel sounds such as a, i, and o to sound out consonant-vowel-consonant words such as fan, sit, and dog. In addition, they are focusing on reading their heart words such as *the*, *said*, and *see* with increased fluency. In Wit and Wisdom, Kindergarteners have started their new module: Once Upon a Farm. Here they are learning to write informative animal facts that they have learned about in their reading and about how authors create settings in their writing. First graders are focused on vowel-consonant-e as a spelling pattern and learning how it changes short to long vowel sounds in UFLI such as in kite and late. In Wit and Wisdom, they have started

their second module: Creature Features. In this module, they are exploring what lessons they can learn about animals through stories and what looking at illustrations and photographs can reveal to a learner. In Second Grade, students are focusing accuracy and automaticity with diphthongs such as /ow/ and /oy/ as well as common silent letter patterns like in the words know, wrong, and comb. In Wit and Wisdom, Second Graders are starting their new module: The American West. They are exploring how the actions of American Indians and early Americans impact the prairie in the American West as well as what life was like for the plains Indians.

In math, our Kindergarten students are adding and subtracting within five as well as using objects and models to write and solve equations using both operations. First graders are continuing to strengthen their number sense by working on counting numbers up to 120. They are using a number chart to count by 1s and 10s, and finding patterns to help them build their number flexibility and prepare them for upcoming skills like comparing numbers. Students in second grade are finishing up their money unit and beginning to learn how to read time and solve problems with elapsed time.

#### **ENGAGEMENT**

PCS buzzed with excitement as we celebrated the 100th day of school! It was a day dedicated to hands-on learning, where students connected the concept of place value to the real world in a multitude of engaging ways. From exploring their calendars and manipulating tens and hundreds blocks, to the thrilling activity of bringing and counting sets of 100 objects, classrooms were filled with the joy of mathematical discovery. And the learning doesn't stop there; our Kindergarten classes are extending the celebration with a "101 Days of School" theme inspired by a 101 Dalmatians, using it as a springboard to master counting beyond 100 and further solidify their understanding of number sequences.









We're thrilled to have Remmy back at school, adding a special touch of inspiration to our morning Lexia Lab! Students participating in Lexia Lab with Cory Mazon are diligently working to strengthen their reading skills through a multifaceted approach. The program incorporates the interactive Lexia platform, focused small group sessions and individualized guidance from Mrs. Mazon, and targeted practice with decodable texts. As a reward for their consistent effort and dedication, students get the unique opportunity to read aloud to Remy every Friday. We commend these hardworking students for their



commitment to learning, arriving bright and early at 7:30 am each day to dedicate an extra hour to increasing their reading abilities!
