Notes from the Nurse


The fun of the holidays is over and now we are left with cold, dreary, short days. Beat the winter "blahs" by making sure you and your family stay active! It is still important to get in 60 minutes of physical activity each day, even when it's too cold to be outside. This website, http://whatmomslove.com/kids/active-indoor-games-activities-for-kids-to-burn-energy/, has a lot of awesome ideas to keep kids active when they are stuck indoors.

It is also easy to fall into bad habits this time of year. Be sure you are still eating healthy and limiting sweets and high-calorie "comfort foods". It's ok to treat yourself from time to time, but don't overdo it. Screen time limits are important to keep track of when you are spending less time outdoors.

Please remember to dress your student appropriately for the weather! If the wind chill creeps above freezing, we will be outside for recess. The fresh air is good for us!

Library Happenings

Book characters create a story to entertain or give us information. How would you describe your favorite character? What makes you describe the character that way? Can different characters have similar traits? Is there a time that you have demonstrated that trait as well (self to text connection)? Utilizing this information and incorporating fun, students have played Book Character BINGO during Library time. Characters are called along with their character trait. Mini discussions can also be had for word meaning and examples supporting the word. Making connections draws readers to the text.















Science

In Kindergarten, students learned about clouds and rain through a fun experiment using shaving cream, water, and colored water "raindrops." We filled a jar with water and added a layer of shaving cream to represent a cloud. Then, we slowly dripped colored water onto the shaving cream and watched as it became heavy like a cloud getting full of water. When the shaving cream couldn't hold any more, the colored water "rained" down into the jar, helping students understand how rain forms and falls from clouds.

First graders created sun finders to observe how the sun rises in the east and sets in the west. They also learned how the sun can be used as a natural tool to help find your way if you are lost.

Second graders wrapped up their unit by exploring the differences between oceans, lakes, and rivers. They learned about the unique features of each type of water body and their importance to the environment.

Third graders investigated the best location to build a snow fort and the science behind their choices. They considered factors like sunlight, wind direction, and insulation to create a strong and lasting structure. One third-grade class enjoyed an indoor snowball fight to make up for the fun they missed before the long break. It was a lively activity that brought smiles and plenty of energy to their day!

Fourth graders explored the question "Will a mountain last forever?" through an experiment with colored sugar cubes. By shaking the cubes in a container, they observed how weathering and erosion gradually break down even the strongest structures over time.

Fifth graders tackled the challenge of "How can you save a town from a hurricane?" by designing and rebuilding structures using construction paper, popsicle sticks, straws, and tape. They tested their creations to see how well they could withstand simulated hurricane conditions (a hairdryer) and learned about engineering solutions for natural disasters. Miss Rundell's fifth-grade class studied water quality and distribution by conducting a hands-on experiment. They filtered dirty water through layers of rocks, sand, and activated charcoal to learn how natural processes clean water.

FLC 1-4 students explored why raindrops form and why it gets colder in the winter. They had fun coloring pictures of raindrops and snowmen to connect their learning to the changing seasons.















Art Corner

Welcome back to the Art Corner! We have just completed our January winter scenes. February will be just as busy. First and second grades will create mosaic collagraph prints. Third and fourth grades will make a seascape, using watercolor and collage techniques. Fifth grade will design a book cover using a gelli printmaking method. They will then bind their own journal/sketchbook. Each project will introduce new techniques for creating our masterpieces. We look forward to displaying these works of art at home!

Kindergarten

Our students wrapped up their exciting exploration of community parts and structures! Through imaginative play, they built various community buildings, from bustling markets to cozy libraries, sparking creativity and teamwork.

<u>Eight Ways to Help Kids Improve Their</u> <u>Self-Esteem, Confidence and Self-Worth</u>

Raising children who are confident can be a challenge. Fortunately, there are things you can do to help children feel good about themselves, and boost their self-esteem.

- 1. Help kids set realistic goals for themselves to improve self-esteem. When children have a clear and attainable goal, it gives them a sense of purpose and when they achieve this goal, it can help to boost their self-esteem. Furthermore, when children are successful in achieving their goals, it reinforces their self-worth and helps them to feel more confident in their abilities.
- 2. Encourage kids to take on new challenges to boost self-worth
- 3. It's important to encourage kids to take on new challenges, even if they're anxious, scared, or unsure of themselves. By taking risks and facing their fears, kids learn that they are capable and strong.
- 4. Praise kids for their efforts to enhance self-image. One way we can help our kids develop a healthy sense of self is by praising their efforts instead of their outcomes. When we focus on praising the process instead of the product, we encourage a growth mindset and teach our kids that it's okay to make mistakes.
- 5. Let kids make mistakes they'll learn from them! It's only natural to want to protect our children from hurt and disappointment. However, research has shown that making mistakes is an essential part of learning and developing a growth mindset.
- 6. Teach kids how to use positive self-talk to increase self-confidence. One of the best things you can do for children is to teach them the power of their thoughts, how to identify helpful versus unhelpful thoughts, and how to use positive self-talk. Doing so will help them to develop self-confidence and self-esteem, and it will also provide them with a tool they can use for the rest of their lives. Positive self-talk can take many forms, but one of the most effective is using affirmations. Affirmations are positive statements that you can say to yourself to help reframe unhelpful thoughts
- 7. Give kids positive reinforcement when they display qualities like kindness, compassion, and generosity. It's so important to give them positive reinforcement when they display qualities like kindness, compassion, and generosity. When you do this, you're helping to build their self-confidence. In turn, they'll be more likely to act with these qualities in the future.
- 8. Use Games to Help Children Improve Their Self Confidence, Self Worth, and Self Esteem. Games (besides video games) such as board games or card games help children learn the skill of working cooperatively together, taking turns, being a good sport, and accepting themselves despite the possibility of losing a game.
- 9. Use Craft Projects to Help Children Improve Their Confidence, Self Worth, and Self Esteem. Children feel valued and worthwhile when they create something of their own. Arts and crafts also give children a creative outlet to express their own unique personalities.
