

The Pheasants hosted the Miller Rustlers on Sept. 22. The match started off with a win in the 1st set for the Pheasants, 25-14. Battling for the 2nd set, they couldn't put it away and lost 17-25. The 3rd set was lost 21-25, but the Pheasants were given another chance to take control of the game in set 4. It was a point by point fight to see who would win the 4th set. The Pheasants completed their tasks and won the set, 28-26. The final set, much like the

On Sept. 22, the Pheasant golf team traveled to Mitchell to compete in the pre-region tourney at the Lakeview golf course. Redfield placed fourth as a team with a 374 behind Winner (371), Moberidge-Pollock (370) and Parkston (337). Isaac Suchor finished in 3rd place (85), Jaxon Frankenstein finished in 7th (90). Mitchell Mack golfed a 97, Jaxen Campbell a 106, Thomas Shantz a 108, and Henry Weller a 109.

The Pheasants hosted their local invite on Sept.

15; they competed against Groton Area, Milbank, Sisseton, Sioux Valley, Tiospa Zina and Aberdeen Roncalli. Isaac Suchor and Jaxon Frankenstein led the team, with Suchor finishing with a 91 and Frankenstein a 96. The team placed third with a score of 410 finishing behind Aberdeen Roncalli (348) and Sioux Valley (387).

The Groton Invite was held on Sept. 10. Redfield finished in 4th place as a team with a 398.

The team competed at the Hub City Invite a in Aberdeen on Sept. 1. Around

70 golfers participated in the event, and the Pheasant team ended up placing 9th out of 12 teams. Jaxon Frankenstein led the team with a score of 90 in 24th place, Isaac Suchor golfed a 92, Jaxen Campbell finished 48th, Mitchell Mack 49th, Kevin Weller 53rd, and Thomas Shanta 54th.

The NEC golf tourney was held in Groton on Aug. 25. The Redfield Pheasants tied with Milbank for fourth place with a score of 398. Ahead of them were Groton in third place (369), Sisse-

ton in second, and Aberdeen Roncalli in first with a score of 312. Isaac Suchor and Jaxon Frankenstein finished in the top ten. Suchor took 9th place with an 86 and Frankenstein took 10th place also with an 86.

On Aug. 20 the Redfield Pheasants traveled to Milbank and placed 5th with a score of 396. Isaac Suchor was the lead golfer for the Pheasants team earning 10th place with a score of 84, Jaxon Frankenstein with a score of 90, Jaxen Campbell with a score of 109, Kevin Weller with a score


Senior Spotlight

The second annual CORE Day kicked off in the Ken Greeno Building on Oct. 7, as student in grades 6-12 prepared to hear the agenda for the day.

CORE stands for Character, Opportunity, Resilience, and Excellence. Students learned these characteristics throughout the day by hearing from Eddie Slowikowski, Cara Filler, and the Fallout Shelter Ministries.

Students were also given the opportunity to speak to Rick Birt the National SADD CEO, Amanda Hossle the SD Director of Highway Safety, and Stephanie Kinnander from the NE Prevention

Resource Center.

Planning started immediately following last year's core day. Jade Jensen, Student Chairperson for the event, oversaw inputs from staff and students, factoring in the pandemic, and simplifying the schedule.

"The difficult part in regard to planning, was to plan something safe and flexible for changing conditions. With only a few days' notice, we made several adjustments with the presenters and space for physical distancing. While this affected some of the presentations, the student responses were positive overall for CORE Pre-

vention Day 2020!" said SADD Director LeAnn Wasmoen.

While practicing social distancing and wearing masks, students listened and interacted with the speakers of the day. Eddie Slowikowski from Chicago, IL, got students involved by telling real life stories and encouraged everyone to "Determine the Dream" and "Believe It's Possible."

Cara Filler flew to Redfield from Vancouver, WA. She led off her speech with roller-coaster of emotions for students after having then think of life with the people they love the most not in it. She told the story of her own twin sister's high speed car accident to tell others that choices count every day.

"I really enjoyed Cara. Her story and her speech were really touching, and I feel that it was really prevalent to today with teens and how the decisions you make decide your future," Alison Larson said.

Fallout Shelter De-

fense from Watertown taught the students to use mental and physical tactics to manage fear, gain confidence, and learn effective safety skills. They used real life scenarios to make students feel comfortable in possible situations.

The day was made possible by the staff of the Spink County Coalition: Cassie Metzinger, Chessa Quenzer, LeAnn Wasmoen in partnership with the Redfield Public School administration brought Core Day to RHS. It was \$14,500 expense. The Spink County Coalition received some grant funding from the SD Department of Highway Safety, Department of Health Tobacco Control Program, Redfield SADD, and the Redfield Lions and Kiwanis service organizations that covered just less than half of the expenses.

Grants from 4imprint offset the cost of the hand sanitizers that were distributed to students and staff that day.

The Redfield School Tier 2 consists of the following: School days will remain the same, school hours remain the same, masks will stay on the moment the students, teachers and other individuals that enter the school. Masks can be put down if the students and teachers are taking a drink and/or eating. The teachers are required to wear a mask with a face shield when they

are within less than 6 feet from other students while teaching, helping and/or lecturing them.

The school allows different classes to have 5 minute mask breaks throughout the day by going outside on the playground to let them and take off their masks, get some fresh air and have a little fun while social distancing.

Superintendent Mr. Seiler said, "Tier 2 was part of the Back to School Well plan developed by the Back to School Task Force. The thought process is to decrease the

amount of spread that we have within our school and community. In discussion with Community Memorial Hospital and our local nursing homes, we know we must do our part to keep our most vulnerable population protected. The students and staff have done an outstanding job adhering to Tier 2, and this minor inconvenience of mask-wearing will help us avoid going up another Tier."

The school administrators will meet with health officials to re-evaluate periodically to see whether or not the school will

drop back to Tier 1 or move to Tier 3.

The next tier has students being split into two groups - one would be in the building while

the other would join class through Microsoft Teams.

Then, the students would trade places. Wednesdays would have only

teachers and maybe students who may need help being in the building. This would also allow for cleaning in the building.



Serious Prose was done by Breanna Roth; she advanced to State in this category.


Tahlur Lambert performed a Humorous segment at the Region 4A competition.

Why Get Vaccinated?

Covid vaccinations have made their way across nations with nearly half a million doses being received a day. In America, the Pfizer was first authorized by the FDA for emergency use in anyone 16 years or older, then shortly after Moderna was authorized for people 18 and older. Both vaccines have been effective at preventing COVID-19 in clinical trial patients, Pfizer's proved to be 95% effective and Moderna's proved to be 94.5% effective.

Many people still question whether or not the vaccine is safe due to known side effects and symptoms people have experienced. Those that have received the Pfizer or

Moderna vaccines have experienced similar side effects after vaccination, including injection-site pain, fever, chills, headaches, muscle aches and joint pain. The symptoms, however, are temporary and can be experienced with any kind of vaccine like the flu shot. There have been documented cases of severe allergic reactions, which can be treated right away with medicines such as epinephrine. Because of this, the CDC has recommended to people who have severe allergies to not receive the vaccine. Other serious cases documented include patients who develop Bell's Palsy, a paralysis of the face. There have only

been seven reported cases and they are being monitored by health care experts.

Dr. Anthony Fauci, director of the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases, has advised that everyone should accept the vaccine in order to get our country back to a normal way of living. Fauci and numerous other doctors received the vaccine on national television and their symptoms were documented for the world to see. Fauci said that he only ever had a sore arm the day after otherwise felt completely great. The vaccines are part of a historic global effort to combat the virus and help us return to a form of normality.

Receiving the Vaccination!

Many people in our community have started to receive the corona virus vaccine. The first few shots were given on Dec. 29 to healthcare personnel in

the hospital and local nursing home staffs, including me. I personally though the experience was very similar to receiving the flu shot. We all were directed to a room to receive the vaccine from local nurses. I didn't even realize when I received the shot because it was pain free and the easiest shot I have ever gotten. I didn't experience any instant side effects or symptoms, but to be sure I was asked to wait 15 minutes after receiving the vaccine. The next day my arm was sore, and it hurt to lift it too high, but that was worst it ever got. I know a few coworkers who had noticeable red marks around their injection sights and some had headaches, but no one had anything too severe. Overall, I am glad I got the vaccination because it brings my workplace and this world one step closer to normal.

The Redfield Pheasant's wrestling team traveled to Rapid City on Feb. 25-27 for the 2021 State B Wrestling Tournament with 12 wrestling individual and a full team for dual competition. The team finished 4th in dual competition and finished 5th overall at the state tournament.

Of the 12 individual wrestlers that made it to state, 6 made it to placings. At 106# sophomore Brady Risetter pinned Kingsbury County wrestler Gannon Gilligan in a fall time of 4:42, placing Risetter at 5th. Sophomore Keaton Rohlfs placed 6th at 126# after a decision match 3-6 against

Kale Ask of Canton. Bringing home 3rd at 145#, junior Mason Fey beat Skyler Swatek of Elk Point - Jefferson in overtime 2-1. At 160#, senior Dylan Whitley lost a close decision 2-3 to Kimball-White Lake/Platte-Geddes wrestler Kale Hanson, placing Whitley at 4th. In another decision match, junior Corbin Schwartz came out with 3rd place after beating Clark/Willow Lake wrestler Gage Burke in overtime 6-1.

At this year's state tournament, as the crowd cheered him on, senior Bradyn Robbins ended his final match with a 10-3 decision over Canton wrestler Braden Sehr, honoring

Robbins as the 2021 138# State Champion.

The year before, Sehr beat Robbins in the 132# championship match but that didn't stop Robbins from making his way back. Robbins took control and reigned victorious as not only the Redfield section cheered him on, but almost the entire arena. "The crowd at finals was crazy. 
On April 9, The Redfield track team also attended the Huron invitational.


