Think About It: HAZING

Hazing is a plague in our society. Incidents are on the rise - particularly among younger and younger kids committing increasingly more violent acts. Take a look at some statistics:

1.5 million high school students are hazed each year; 47% of students came to college already having experienced hazing.

40% of athletes who reported being involved in hazing behaviors report that a coach or advisor was aware of the activity; 22% report that the coach was involved.

2 in 5 students say they are aware of hazing taking place on their campus. More than 1 in 5 report that they witnessed hazing personally.

In 95% of cases where students identified their experience as hazing, they did not report the events to campus officials.

Nine out of ten students who have experienced hazing behavior in college do not consider themselves to have been hazed.

36% of students say they would not report hazing primarily because "there's no one to tell," and 27% feel that adults won't handle it right.

82% of deaths from hazing involve alcohol.

The final cost of the Europe trip will be an all-inclusive (food, lodging, travel, etc...) total cost of near \$5,000. The only cost that the money does not cover will be for souvenirs and knick-knacks that travelers may want to purchase to bring home with them.

If you are a student with a job, saving money to go on a trip of this magnitude may be easier than you think. At a total of nearly \$5,000, a sum of money that is in no way small, payment for the trip can be saved up if you have the patience and dedication to do so.

On November 1, there is a \$95 down payment to attend the trip, which is already added to the total. With the actual cost being \$4,670, having the downpayment paid reduces the cost to \$4,575. One must save \$270 over the course of 17 months to total to \$4,575.

Those embarking on the Europe trip will leave June 18th and will arrive back to the States on July 2nd; however, the arrival to and from Europe are subject to change a couple days both ways.

If anyone is interested in going on this trip to Europe, more information is available. There will be a meeting in the high school auditorium on October 23 where Mr. Olson will explain the trip in detail to those who are interested.

The boys came out with a win at NEC's and regions. Girls came out with third place at NEC's and second place at regions. Both boys and girls will be attending the state


meet in Huron on October 22.


"I am really proud







Many students participate in sports not only in school, but outside of school as well. Soccer, softball, and baseball are some of the many activities high school students like to participate in during the spring and summer months.





11:19.93, and got 10th place. In these races Nicolette got her season best in both


Cooper Baulon ran the 110 hurdles with a time of 15:39 and placed 13th; he also ran the 300 hurdles with a time of 42:52.
