






Jackhammer Wrestling Tournament

School Board Continues Facility Planning

The Pequot Lakes School Board is set to consider authorizing a Special Election on April 8, 2025, at their January 6, 2025, Organizational meeting. The details of the plan are listed below:

- 1. Question 1: \$55 million for facility improvements in four categories:
 - a. Safety and Security Items (\$9.5M)
 - b. Maintenance Items (\$19M)
 - c. Career, Technology and Trades Spaces (\$16M)
 - d. Addition and Remodel of Student Instructional Spaces (\$10M)
- 2. Question 2: Capital Project Levy for roughly \$600,000 per year for 10 years. This will pay for curriculum and technology, in order to open up the general fund for other costs that have not kept up with inflation.
- 3. Question 1 & Question 2 are independent questions.
- 4. The estimated cost for an average residential property value of \$400,000 is a total of \$16 per month (\$13 for Question 1 and \$3 for Question 2). This is a \$12 per month reduction from the November 2023 election proposal of \$28 per month, resulting from a board prioritization process that included input from teachers, other staff, parents, and community members.

If the school board approves the Special Election at the January 6 meeting, more details and information will be shared with district residents.
