Mount Pleasant, SC - Thomas C. Cario Middle School is proud to announce it is one of 12 finalists for the 2025 Palmetto's Finest Awards, an honor from the South Carolina Association of School Administrators (SCASA) that goes to schools that offer the best in innovative, effective educational programs. The Palmetto's Finest Award is celebrating its 45th year and is one of the most coveted and respected awards among educators.

Cario Middle is the only school in Charleston County School District to be a finalist this year and one of just two middle schools in the state to advance to this stage in 2025.

"We are incredibly honored to be selected as a finalist for such a prestigious award," said Principal Bryan Coleman. "We strive every day to find the perfect balance between achievement, innovation, and culture for our students and families. This recognition is truly a result of the amazing students, staff, and parents of the Cario community. We are one!"

This selection comes after extensive evaluations by a committee of fellow educators and previous Palmetto's Finest winners. The application process includes elements on student achievement, instructional programs, professional learning communities, and school culture.

Last fall, 29 South Carolina schools submitted a 20-page application followed by an onsite examination visit from a review committee. The finalists undergo a second onsite evaluation before the winners are selected this spring.

Each school will have the opportunity to celebrate with their local community, as the winners will be announced through a live stream via South Carolina ETV to each finalist school on April 30, 2025.
