

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The author of the month for the 2024-2025 school year will focus on authors of books that are considered 'classics'.

Continuing the year long series focusing on classic novels, the author of the month for February is Richard Wright. Wright was born on September 4, 1908 in Natchez, Mississippi. He was the son of a sharecropper who abandoned his family. Wright was subsequently raised by a single mother. He received only a ninth grade education. However, he had a love for reading and writing at an early age. When he was 16 an article he wrote was published in a Southern African American newspaper. He worked various odd jobs and his free time was consumed with reading as many books as possible.

Wright grew up in poverty eventually moving to Chicago where he was offered a chance to pursue writing through the Federal Writers Project. He became disenchanted with American capitalism and decided to join the Communist party in 1932. After moving to New York City in 1937 he became the Harlem editor of the Communist Daily Worker. Then in 1944 he left the party due to political and personal differences.

Wrights' literary career began to soar when in 1938 Wright received commercial and critical success with the novel, Uncle Toms Children-this earned him a Guggenheim Fellowship. This was followed in 1940 by the novel, Native Son, which is now considered a classic. Adding to his prestige as a writer was the novel, Black Boy, which was released in 1945. Wright became increasingly dissatisfied with both the Communist and American ways of life. He eventually decided to move to Paris where he lived the remainder of his life. Other notable novels by Wright include, The Outsider (1958), The Long Dream(1958), Black Power(1954), and White Man, Listen! (1957).

Wright died at the age of 52 of a heart attack on November 28,1960.


















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February Highlights
