How is your 504/IEP accommodations transfer to college?

- There is no Special Education at the college level. Educational rights covered by IDEA (Individuals with Disabilities Education Act) do not apply to postsecondary education.
- Colleges must comply with ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act), Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act and the civil Rights Restoration Act.
- College students have civil rights, but not "education" rights.
- Please be aware that documentation policies differ from one institution to another.
