COMETS WERE STREAKING THROUGH THE FALL SEASON

BOYS AND GIRLS SOCCER:

The Varsity Boys Soccer team finished 14-4 in the fall and captured another Center State Conference Division Title. The Varsity Girls Team was also successful on the field, capturing a Division Title and finishing the season at 12-5. Special recognition to Senior Henry Schweitzer, who finished his stellar high school career at Clinton with over 100 career points. He scored 56 points this year, which was 2nd in all of Section III Class B. Henry was recognized by coaches, teammates, and opponents, as one of the best, earning Small School All-State Team honors.



FOOTBALL & CHEER:

The Football & Cheer Teams returned to action this Fall, with Football playing its first season of 8-Man. The boys made an instant impact, and qualified for a playoff contest. While the team benefitted from contributions of all, Freshmen through Seniors, they relied heavily on their eight Seniors. Notably, QB/LB Benjamin Copperwheat who led all of Section III 8-Man in completions and ranked third in TD passes. WR/DB Ronan Milne led all of Section III 8-Man in receptions, receiving yards, and receiving TDs (regular season only). Ben and Ronan were both named to the All-CNY 8-Man Football First Team, with fellow Senior Zach Spaven making the Second Team. Clinton had one Senior Cheerleader in the Fall, Emily Stockbridge.

CROSS COUNTRY:

Both Boys and Girls Cross Country Teams experienced success in the Fall as well. The Boys won their 3rd straight CSC Title, and the Girls finished second to Adirondack. Both teams performed well in the Sectional Championship race as well, with the boys finishing second, and the girls fourth. For the Girls, the Sectional Championship was the final run for CCS by dedicated Seniors Natalie Heselton, Beatrix Rioux, Josie Rioux, Wynni Davignon & Emily Tinkler. On the Boys side, it was the final race for John Musante, Lees Divine, Wyatt Forbes, and Sean Shreppel. Special shout out to John Musante who finished first for Clinton all season, and missed qualifying for States by just one position.
