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Ringgold Moves Forward with New Comprehensive Plan

Some exciting work is taking place at the District, as we are rolling out a new Comprehensive Plan, focused on improving student outcomes through curriculum, instruction and assessment. The Comprehensive Plan looks to build upon commitments made in our Strategic Plan, enhancing the student and employee experiences while maintaining organizational excellence and paving the way for a brighter future.

"We are aligning our efforts with the goals of our Strategic Improvement Plan to create a unified vision for the future. Together, these initiatives will guide our district toward long-term success by fostering innovation, enhancing student outcomes and building a strong foundation for every learner," said Superintendent Mr. Randall Skrinjorich.

The Pennsylvania Department of Education mandates all local educational agencies to continuously engage in Comprehensive Planning, an essential component of ensuring enhanced student performance and quality results. Comprehensive Planning requires districts to demonstrate continual growth through research-based programs, ongoing staff development, aligned resources and active public participation in the planning process.

The plan was developed over the last two years by a committee of stakeholders, including educators, administrators, community members and school board officers. It states that over the next three years, the District will create curriculum maps utilizing the Understanding by Design (UbD) curriculum framework. The structured model requires educators to begin by identifying desired learning outcomes, then plan assessments to measure those outcomes, followed by learning activities leading students to achieve the intended understanding, essentially working backwards.

"This approach emphasizes deep student comprehension and enables students to transfer their knowledge and skills to different situations, both in the classroom and beyond," said Mr. Skrinjorich.

The plan was delivered to the school board for review in January and will be available to view on the District's website after March 31. ■

2025-2026 Kindergarten Registration on March 12



Kindergarten registration for the 2025-2026 school year will be held from 9 a.m. to 6:15 p.m. on Wednesday, March 12, at both Ringgold Elementary School North and South. Parents can reserve their timeslot for <u>Ringgold Elementary South</u> <u>here</u>, and for <u>Ringgold Elementary School North here</u>.

The child must be <u>five years old by July 31, 2025</u> to be eligible for kindergarten enrollment in the 2025-2026 school year. The documents listed below must be provided in order to complete the registration process.

- Birth certificate
- Current immunization records
- Two forms of proof of residency, such as mortgage statements, rental/lease agreements or utility bills (must include the name, address and date within the last three months)

The registration visit will include an assessment administered to incoming kindergarteners, which provides an understanding of a child's early learning and development.

"We will do some screening of the kids, which will allow us to see where they are academically and evaluate their behavioral and regulation skills. This will take place while the parents are completing the enrollment process," said Mrs. Sherry Black, Director of Pupil Services at Ringgold School District.

Those unable to attend the March 12 registration can contact their child's elementary school to reschedule.

To ensure a child is prepared for kindergarten, parents and guardians should make sure their child can...

Kindergarten Readiness Checklist

- Zip and unzip their lunchbox, backpack, jeans/pants and jacket on their own
- Open drinks, snacks and lunches
- Independently use the bathroom and wash their hands
- Sit and listen for 10 minutes
- Follow one to two step directions
- Quietly wait and take turns
- Count to 10 out loud
- Write their full name and recognize it in print
- Say their ABCs and identify most letters of the alphabet
- Use scissors to cut a line

Lil' Rams Pre-K Summer Camp, ESY Program Begins on June 16

Lil' Rams Pre-K Summer Camp and Extended School Year (ESY) Program will be held simultaneously from Monday, June 16, to Thursday, July 3, at Ringgold Elementary School South. Both camps will run from 9 a.m. to 12 p.m., Monday through Thursday, and provide breakfast and lunch. Bus transportation will be offered, starting at 8:30 a.m., and passes will be mailed to the residence before June 16.

Lil' Rams Pre-K Summer Camp

Lil' Rams Pre-K Summer Camp acclimates incoming kindergarteners by introducing the classroom setting with lesson plans, including early literacy, math, arts, music and physical education. Limited space is available and families can sign up during the March 12 registration after their child is fully enrolled. An orientation will take place on Friday, June 13, at 11 a.m. in the Ringgold Elementary School South Cafeteria.

ESY services are special education and related services provided to students, who must qualify under their Individualized Education Program (IEP) to attend the summer program.

Kid Writing Program Serves as a Strong Example for Nearby School District



They say imitation is the greatest form of flattery, and the District was honored to host Brownsville Area School District to observe its new foundational literacy and writing program in action, *Kid Writing*.

The K-2 supplemental teaching approach adopted at the beginning of the school year is designed to accelerate reading and writing skills through both structured and unstructured activities that help individualize instruction. Furthermore, the program's framework helps young learners develop the writing stamina needed to complete more advanced writing assignments, such as Text-Dependent Analysis (TDA), which make up approximately 25 percent of the English Language Arts section of the Pennsylvania System of School Assessment (PSSA).

Representatives from Brownsville Area School District observed 30 minutes of kindergarten and first-grade instruction in Ms. Cassandra Davies' and Ms. Chelsy Bowker's classrooms, then convened with Dr. Saraceni and Superintendent Mr. Skrinjorich, discussing the program's accomplishments, logistics, implementation and long-term goals.

"The *Kid Writing* program focuses not only on developing creativity and writing capacity among students, but also promotes the key component of writing stamina, a skill that will only strengthen students' writing ability and probability of future success on state assessments. We want to thank all the individuals who made this collaborative effort possible," said Mr. Marc Berry, Principal of Ringgold Elementary School South.

Mr. Jim Muraco Named November's WTAE-TV Teacher of the Month

When a surprise assembly was called, Mr. Jim Muraco thought he was there to welcome a special guest for the senior class. Instead, he was honored with the announcement that he was the WTAE-TV November Teacher of the Month.

"Students are excited to go to Mr. Muraco's classes. He makes learning fun by engaging students, whether through modeling an experiment, having students complete a lab or engaging in a real-life application discussion about the content," said Dr. Greg Saraceni, Ringgold High School Principal.

Each month, WTAE-TV selects one teacher to be honored and receive a \$1,000 check to use on the education website <u>DonorsChoose.com</u>.

Ringgold High School senior, Sam Alvarez, nominated Mr. Muraco for the award, echoing the sentiments of his fellow classmates that Mr. Muraco makes the learning process exciting while maintaining a high level of rigor.

"He makes us want to come into class every time and actually learn what he's teaching," Alvarez told WTAE-TV.

Mr. Muraco's entire family attended the event to celebrate his achievement, including his parents, both of whom are educators. Mr. Muraco has been a science teacher at Ringgold High School since 2016, and has helped instill a passion in students for learning and drive to reach their full potential.

"I just want them to have the best education they can, and I think we try to give that to them. I want to play some small role in making sure that they succeed," Mr. Muraco told WTAE-TV.

Stakeholder Survey Data Shows Positive Growth

The District has unveiled the results of its annual stakeholder experience surveys, and the data reveals significant improvements. With marked gains in student engagement, parent communication, employee morale and community involvement, results affirm Ringgold's commitment to boosting the overall stakeholder experience.

Administered annually by Studer Education since 2022, the employee, parent/guardian and student experience surveys enable the District to regularly compare growth, assess stakeholder perceptions and identify areas for improvement.

Tailored surveys were delivered to each stakeholder group and utilized a five-point Likert scale response rating of strongly agree (5), agree (4), neutral (3), disagree (2) or strongly disagree (1). In the review of the data, the overall mean score for each question and the distribution of the responses across a five-point scale was analyzed and compared to the mean score of previous years.

The employee survey included an average score of 3.65 with 259 responses. The highest-rated items expressed a clear understanding of job duties, feeling appreciated and respected by leaders, and seeing work positively impact those they serve. For the parent/caregiver survey, 424 respondents found their child's school school to be well-maintained and clean, and feel comfortable approaching administration about issues or concerns, resulting in a mean score of 3.5. The student survey, featuring insight from 1,806 students, had an average score of 3.68. Results showed students enjoy the special electives offered, believe their principal is a good leader and find learning to be prioritized at their schools.

"We are extremely appreciative to all of our stakeholders who participated in this year's survey, as it is a crucial component of our Strategic Improvement Plan. Your feedback allows us to pinpoint areas in need of improvement, identify tailored strategies from the District Strategic Improvement Plan and implement the identified strategy," said Mr. Randall Skrinjorich, Ringgold School District Superintendent.

Buildings and Grounds Upgrades



Revitalizing Joe Montana Stadium's Bleachers

Slated to be completed next fall, the stadium renovation encompasses a complete restoration of the bleachers, focusing on making the structure more user-friendly, enhancing ADA accessibility and general safety.

Renovations include improvements to the bleachers' exterior wall facing the field, applying a primer and two-part epoxy to the bleachers with anti-slip properties, sealing of joints, widening aisles, adding handrails and a ramp or lift. The existing locker rooms will remain unchanged beneath the bleachers. The press box exterior will receive a facelift, new stairs to improve access, and improvements to the interior will include new countertops, flooring and lighting, which are just a few of the much-needed improvements. The upper ticket booth will also be replaced.

Construction of Bus Garage and Maintenance Facilities

The existing building that houses the District's maintenance and transportation departments was originally built as an elementary school in the 1920s. To meet the demands of both departments and address the deteriorating structure, a new site will be built, consisting of three garage bays, multiple storage areas and office rooms. The grounds will receive new asphalt, and electrical upgrades such as parking lot lighting and new outdoor receptacles for the buses to plug into.
