<a href="#">PreACT Secure</a>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Grades 9 and 10</li> </ul>	PreACT Secure is a summative assessment given to 9th and 10th grade students that is aligned to the ACT and the ACT College and Career Readiness Standards. PreACT Secure measures what students have learned in the areas of English, Reading, Mathematics, and Science. It can be used for college enrollment, scholarships, and NCAA eligibility requirements. <a href="#">ACCESS</a>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Grades K-12, English language proficiency for students identified as English learners (ELs)</li> </ul>	ACCESS allows educators, ELs, and families to monitor EL's progress in acquiring academic English in the domains of speaking, listening, reading, and writing.	Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) and Wisconsin State Statute 115.96(1)	The ACCESS test is untimed, and students have the time needed to produce scorable content. ACCESS typically takes 1-4.5 hours to complete, depending on grade and test format.	ACCESS is administered annually in the winter. <a href="#">AimswebPLUS Early Literacy Assessment, Act 20</a>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Fundamental Skills Screening (4K) and Universal Reading Screening (5K through grade 5)</li> </ul>	AimswebPLUS is an early literacy screener used for ensuring fundamental skills screening and universal reading screening.	Wisconsin State Statute 118.016	AimswebPLUS is an assessment of essential early reading skills such as concepts of print, phonemic awareness, phonics, and fluency. Portions of the subtests are timed.	Reading Readiness assessments must be administered in Fall, Winter, and Spring.	Individual score reports are available and shared with parents/guardians within 10 days of screening.

<a href="#">Math Screener</a>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Grades 4K-5 Math screener</li> </ul>	.AimwebPlus informs daily instruction and provides growth results to caregivers and district/state audiences in reading and math achievement using curriculum-based assessment and standards-aligned content for students in PreK through Grade 12	Wisconsin State Statute 118.016	AimwebPLUS is an assessment of essential early math skills. Portions of the subtests are timed.	Math screeners are administered in Fall, Winter, and Spring.	Individual score reports are available and shared with parents/guardians.
<a href="#">National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP)</a>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Grades 4 and 8 for reading and mathematics (only if the school is selected to participate)</li> </ul>	NAEP assessment results help produce the Nation's Report Card. NAEP is a survey given each year to a sample of schools selected to participate. Districts that receive Title-I funds agree to have schools participate.	Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA)	Students typically spend 1.5-2 hours to complete the NAEP, depending on grade and test format.	Each sample school has one test date, between the last week of January and the first week of March. <a href="#">Fastbridge Screeners</a>	Grades 3-5 for reading and math	Fastbridge screeners assess student proficiency in reading and math skills and inform teachers of students who are at-risk and may need additional support	Act 20	Students will be screened 3 times per year- fall, winter, and spring. It should take approximately 30-60 minutes per student.	<a href="#">Assessment Calendar</a>	Results are shared during parent-teacher conferences or mailed within 15 days after the testing window closes.
<a href="#">Fastbridge Progress Monitoring</a>	Grades K-5 for reading and math	Fastbridge progress monitoring assessments inform teachers of progress or lack thereof		It should take 3-5 minutes per assessment.	Students will be monitored for progress weekly or bi-weekly, depending on the intensity of the intervention they receive.	Results may be communicated with parents at parent-teacher conferences or problem-solving meetings

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
