thinkers, problem-solvers, and effective communicators in the workplace, at home, and in our community. And finally, we hope that they are collaborators who understand that the value of working together as a team exceeds the value that individuals have when they work alone.

Our work with the Portrait will remain an ongoing focus in our district. Moving forward, we will identify exemplars at every grade level to bring these dispositions to life across all grades. As we grow more comfortable with them and incorporate them into our classrooms, we will create more opportunities for our students to learn and demonstrate them as they continue through our schools.

There is enormous pride in our tight-knit community, and we hope that our efforts to develop these eight dispositions in all of our students contribute to the "more" in Sycamore for generations to come. Go Spartans!

BIG SPARTANS, LITTLE SPARTANS: MENTORSHIP

PROGRAM CONNECTS SYCAMORE STUDENTS

At the start of the 2024-25 school year, Sycamore Community School District 427 launched a new student mentorship program, Big Spartans, Little Spartans. This program strengthens connections between Sycamore High School and West Elementary School students. Big Spartans, Little Spartans was brought to life through the dedicated efforts of Emily Waller, West Elementary Principal; Molly Tucker, MTSS Coordinator; and Mollie Momenteller, Instructional Coach at Sycamore High School. This initiative fosters positive relationships across grade levels, with high school students serving as mentors

The idea for the program was inspired by a similar successful initiative observed in another district. Molly Tucker, the program's liaison, shared how the proximity between West Elementary and the high school made Sycamore an ideal candidate for such a program.

to younger students.

"Last school year, we visited a school in District 204 with a mentorship program that had great success," Tucker said. "We saw an opportunity to replicate that model, giving West students a high school role model and fostering a stronger school community."

Each week, high school mentors travel to West Elementary to spend time with their "Little Spartans." They collaborate on a variety of activities designed to build confidence, creativity, and problemsolving skills. The weekly visits have quickly become a highlight for students on both ends of the mentorship.



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MORE THAN A GAME: HOW ESPORTS IS **EMPOWERING SYCAMORE STUDENTS**

In the world of high school sports, a new contender is rising—one with headsets instead of helmets, controllers instead of cleats, and a digital arena where strategy and teamwork reign supreme. At Sycamore High School, eSports has evolved from a weekly virtual student gathering into a thriving, competitive club, fostering connection, confidence, and a sense of belonging among its

The idea for an eSports club came during the time of the COVID-19 pandemic when the district was teaching via remote learning. Students in Ms. Keca's class were invited to join Google Meet sessions on Fridays to hang out with one another and play video games. While not competitive at the time, Keca says that it existed as a safe space for her students to overcome feelings of disconnection.

"When it first started, we only had a few students in attendance because it was very casual, but it quickly grew to nearly a dozen students," Keca said. "It was clear there was a need for students to connect through their main passion-video games."

Upon returning to in-person learning, students continued to voice their desire to game together and turn their weekly informal hangouts into an official club.



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
