A job shadowing experience entails spending time "in the shadow" of a person performing his or her job functions. It's typically a day-long workplace visit with an individual working in a position, career or industry of interest to a student. The Oneida-Herkimer-Madison BOCES School and Business Alliance (SABA) worked with the Office of Counseling and Career Services and the Oriskany Transportation Department to provide this opportunity for our students.

Pre-K/Kindergarten PARENT REGISTRATION

Registration for the pre-kindergarten program for four-yearolds and for kindergarten in the Oriskany Central School District for the 2025-2026 school year is underway.

#### **Eligibility:**

- Pre-kindergarten is open to all children residing in the Oriskany Central School District who will be four (4) years old on or before December 1, 2025.
- Kindergarten is open to all children residing in the Oriskany Central School District who will be five (5) years old on or before December 1, 2025.

Registration materials can be obtained from the N.A. Walbran Elementary School Main Office or District Registrar Tammy Vaughn, who is located at the Jr./Sr. high school. Registration packets must be returned with two (2) proofs of residency (ex. utility bill, mortgage statement, tax document, etc.) and proof of your child's age (ex. birth certificate). Please call 315-768-2065 if you need a packet mailed. Current Oriskany pre-K students will receive kindergarten registration packets through their pre-K classroom teacher.

All pre-kindergarten slots are assigned by lottery. If more registrations are received than the number of available slots for the program, then a lottery is held at the Board of Education meeting on Tuesday, April 15. All applications and documents must be on file with the Registrar's Office by 4 p.m. on Friday, April 11 to be included in the placement lottery.

Thank you for taking an active role in your child(ren)'s education. Your involvement and partnership with the school plays a key role in the growth and development of your child!

The Oriskany Central School District will hold a Pre-K Parent Orientation on Tuesday, May 6 from 6-7 p.m. at N.A. Walbran Elementary School for all parents/guardians of eligible children entering pre-kindergarten for the 2025-26 school year. Incoming pre-kindergarten students are welcome to attend the orientation with their families. Tours of the school will be given to all families that attend.

## ParentSquare: Where Our Community Stays Connected!

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The Oriskany Central School District is excited to take its community engagement to the next level with the addition of a ParentSquare Community Group.

The community group allows nonschool age community members who do not currently have children enrolled in the Oriskany CSD to receive email and push notifications on all things happening in the District. ## A MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTOR OF SKYHAWKS ATHLETICS

#### Dear Families and Community Members of Oriskany,

As we enter 2025 and reach the halfway point of winter sports, Oriskany Skyhawks Athletics thrives in numerous ways. While many school districts are losing programs and opportunities for children, Oriskany is committed to expanding its offerings and creating new opportunities.

In partnership with Westmoreland, our girls basketball team has brought together 11 players to participate across modified, JV and varsity levels. We are also excited to announce the addition of a wrestling program through a partnership with the New Hartford Central School District. For the first time in many years, we have established a second girls modified basketball team, comprising 20 players, only four of whom are from Westmoreland.

Once again, all of our fall varsity teams have been honored as Scholar-Athlete teams, which means that more than 75% of our roster maintained an average of 90 or above. Congratulations to our student-athletes and staff!

Oriskany continues to achieve success on the playing field. All of our winter programs are performing exceptionally well. The Oriskany/Westmoreland Lady Skyhawks basketball program's varsity team has been crowned Holiday Hoops Champions, while the JV Lady Skyhawks finished as runners-up. Our varsity girls have also been ranked in the state several times this season. Additionally, the varsity and JV boys basketball teams were runners-up in the Madison Holiday Tournament. The indoor track team is breaking school records and has had many athletes qualify for Sectionals after just one meet.

This winter, we have welcomed new coaches to our outstanding coaching staff: Marc Smith, who coaches the Boys Varsity Basketball Team; Jane Fahy, who coaches indoor track; and Mackenzie Buck, who coaches modified girls basketball. These coaches are alumni of Oriskany, and we are also thrilled to have former student teacher Sara Hovey coaching our girls varsity basketball team. They are all eager to contribute to our wonderful community.

Our winter JV and varsity sports, in partnership with the Varsity Club and Oriskany Sports Boosters, participated in the "More than Game" cancer fundraiser games this winter. All proceeds benefit Upstate Golisano Children's Hospital and Upstate Cancer Center. We are also raising funds for our own Sara Smith.

We remain committed to updating our equipment as we grow and succeed. The Oriskany Sports Boosters have generously donated a new shooting machine for our basketball program, a state-of-the-art tool that major colleges and professionals use nationwide. With a generous grant from the Wadas Foundation, we have purchased a new scorers' table for basketball featuring our new Skyhawks name, along with new outdoor batting cages for baseball and softball.

As we progress through 2025, we look forward to further enhancing the success and growth of our Oriskany Skyhawks Athletics programs.

This program plays a vital role in helping students explore their future options, ensuring they are well-prepared for life beyond high school.

Pre-ETS is a free program funded by Adult Career and Continuing Education Services - Vocational Rehabilitation (ACCES-VR). It provides students with essential support in identifying career interests, developing crucial employment-related soft skills, exploring post-secondary education options, and gaining valuable work experience. Most recently, our students participated in a Financial Reality experience, offering them hands-on learning in financial literacy and real-world decision-making.

Our staff remains dedicated to discovering and implementing new resources to support our secondary students in their transition from high school to post-secondary opportunities. We continuously seek ways to enhance our programs, ensuring students have access to the tools and experiences they need to succeed.

At the elementary level, we are prioritizing social-emotional support, recognizing the importance of building strong relationships with our students. Our team is actively exploring various strategies to nurture emotional well-being and foster a positive learning environment for all.

# SOPHOMORES TOUR LOCAL BUSINESSES

On October 30, members of the sophomore class had the opportunity to tour different local businesses. The students were divided into four career clusters. Each student was assigned into one of the career clusters based on a survey that they completed in English class. Students visited the following businesses: CNY Veterinary Medical Service, New York State Police, S.R. Sloan, Inc. and Indium Corporation. The Oneida-Herkimer-Madison BOCES School and Business Alliance (SABA) worked with the Office of Counseling and Career Services to provide this opportunity to our students.



Anatomy and Physiology students studied regions of the brain by making brain hats. Once completed, they wore the brain hats around the school and had faculty ask them questions to reinforce what they had learned. These brain hats were also incorporated into the brain assessment. Students also performed an autopsy on sheep brains where they located and identified brain traumas including hematomas, impalements, gunshot wounds and embolisms. They created a story of how they thought the trauma could have occurred, the region of the brain and how the damage would affect brain functions.

HOSTS Blood Prive On November 22, TATF hosted a blood drive in the Jr./Sr. high school auditorium and had a great turnout!

There were 12 registered donors, including three first-time donors who were all juniors and seniors. First-time donors don't just represent extra units at the drive, they also represent lifetimes of potential future donations that we didn't have prior. Growing the donor base means that more patients will be able to receive needed blood transfusions.

The drive yielded 11 precious units of blood, including four type O units. O+ and O- blood types are the most in-demand and the first to run out in a shortage. Type O donors are needed to help patients facing life-threatening conditions and emergencies each day.

Each donation brings hope, saves lives and even helps seniors earn scholarships. We are currently two thirds of the way there to the first level of earning scholarships!

### STUDENTS ATTEND FINANCIAL REALITY CHECK AT MVCC

On December 19, several ninth and tenth grade students had an opportunity to attend Financial Reality Check: A Hands-On Money Management Simulation at Mohawk Valley Community College. # Oriskany Central School District Unveils New Skyhawks Logo

The Oriskany Central School District is proud to reveal the District's new logo featuring the Skyhawks mascot.

Students, staff and community members gathered at the Oriskany Jr./Sr. High School on February 7 for the official unveiling of the new logo, which features a hawk wearing aviation goggles and the tagline, "Anchored in history. Ready for battle." The logo pays homage to Oriskany's storied history with silhouettes of a Prototype A-4E Skyhawk and the USS Oriskany Naval aircraft carrier, which can be seen in the reflection of the hawk's aviation goggles.

The Oriskany CSD partnered with SchoolMark to create the new logo, which was carefully crafted after months of hard work and collaboration. The school community had the opportunity to weigh in on the process and offer feedback, answering questions such as what it means to be a Skyhawk at Oriskany Central School and what makes you most proud to be associated with the District. The new logo isn't just a symbol; it's a reflection of the Oriskany community, its history and dedication to excellence, and the bright future being built within the District.

The Skyhawk name, which was selected and announced at the end of the 2023-24 school year, pays homage to the village of Oriskany's role in American history dating back to the Revolutionary War, and the District's commitment to tradition.
